2.—When any of the offences hereafter specified, shall be committed, and the Secretary shall hereafter receive notice thereof, the same shall be advertised in one or more of the Canterbury Papers, at the expense of the Society, and hand-bills distributed.

3.—If any expense shall be incurred by advertising any Horse, Mare, or Gelding, or other cattle as stolen, and the same be found afterward only to have strayed, the whole of the expense shall then be repaid by the Subscriber, who made the complaint of such loss.

4.—That an Annual General Meeting shall be holden on the First TUESDAY in July, at twelve o'clock precisely—when a report of the proceedings of the last year be read, all accounts relating to the Association be examined and passed, all new regulations shall be proposed and decided upon, the Committee for the ensuing year be chosen, and any other general business of the Association be settled.

Hamburg Papers to the 1st inst. also reached town on Wednesday night. They contain no article of interest except the following official contradiction of the report which has made so much noise abroad, that we intended to send Hanoverian troops to Portugal.

Hanover, July 23.—Our Official Gazette contains the following article:—"Various public Journals, having of late so frequently spoken of the sending of a corps of Hanoverian troops to Portugal, we think it our duty to remark, for the information of the public, that according to the latest accounts received from the Kingdom of Portugal, the sending of any corps of troops thither is not thought necessary."

Wednesday forenoon were received Lisbon Papers to the 18th ult. but they contain no intelligence of interest. Several vessels had arrived from Rio de Janeiro, and other parts of the Brazil: and one vessel in 120 days from Monte Video, with 400 troops and General Maudo. The Lisbon Gazette of the 17th, contains a long article on the policy of the British Government, which is justly praised for its prudence in preserving the country in peace, when some basty politicians wished to precipitate us in a war for the sake of the imbecile Cortes of Spain, and the partisans of a Government who did not think it worth fighting for.

By the arrival of a Jamaica Mail on Wednesday morning, Papers to the 19th of June, have arrived bringing an account of an insurrectionary movement on the part of the slaves on Argyle Estate, in the parish of Hanover. This intelligence excited considerable alarm among the West India Merchants in the City, and the most extravagant rumours were circulated on Change. One report was, that the Slaves had been joined by five thousand Maroons; now it so happens that there are not more than twelve or fourteen hundred Maroons on the whole island. The affair, which does not appear very serious, is said to have arisen in consequence of the slaves not being allowed Saturday for themselves, as had been promised.

From the Jamaica Courier of the 17th June. The Ringdove brig, from Laguaira, was coming to anchor when the Packet left Barbadoes, and the Gauges, 84, was lying at St. Vincent.

It is said that the Superb, 74, is to come from Barbadoes to this Island, for the purpose of receiving the flag of Vice-Admiral Halsted, when Captain Thomas Forrest will remove into that ship, and Capt. Sir Thomas Staines will take the command of the his. of 50, and the Gauges, 84, Captain E. Brace, C. B. will return to England.

The Jamaica Mail, brings no confirmation of the reported victory of Bolivar. The latest accounts from the General are of the 27th of May, via Panama. In April, his head-quarters were at Truxillo, when he had a force of 19,000 men; and letters from Carthagena, of the 14th May, state, that he had demanded more men and money from his Government, which it was not able to supply to the extent of his demand. Another account, of a later date, represents him as having received reinforcements, and about to commence offensive operations.

By the De Cock, arrived at Antwerp, advices have been received from the Mauritius to the 3d of May. We regret to learn that no doubt was entertained there of the Delight sloop of war, Capt. Hay, having foundered off that island, and that the whole of her crew, with 500 recaptured slaves, had perished. A part of the wreck of the vessel had been picked up at sea.

Yesterday, the Chancellor of the Exchequer came to town, from Charlton, Kent, and after transacting business at the Treasury, returned in the evening.

Monday, being the Anniversary of the Accession of the House of Brunswick to the Throne, the Fishmongers' Company, according to annual custom, gave a grand Dinner to commemorate that event. Among the distinguished individuals present were the Duke of Sussex, the Lord Mayor, Sir James Macintosh, Mr. Bonner, Mr. Lambton, Lord A. Hill, Lord Darnley, the Honourable Agar Ellis, Sir T. Lawrence, W. Williams, Esq. M. P. General Quiroga, the Greek Deputy, General Orlando, and Colonel Riego, the brother of the late Spanish General. General Mina had promised to attend, but was prevented by indisposition. There was also a number of other celebrated Spanish Officers present. Mr. Marjoribanks and Mr. Astell, and a number of other Gentlemen eminent in the commercial world, were present.

Wednesday the despatches for China by the ship Moffat, were closed at the East India House.

EXPLOSION OF A STEAM-PACKET ON THE MERSEY.—We are greatly concerned to state, that a fatal accident happened on Sunday afternoon, in the Mersey, which has proved disastrous in its consequences. Just after three o'clock in the afternoon, when the Earl of Bridgewater steam-packet, which plies between Liverpool and Ellesmere Port, was leaving the pier head, and but a few minutes after the steam was put on, the boiler suddenly burst, with a tremendous explosion, forced up part of the deck, and otherwise greatly injured the vessel. We are not yet acquainted with the cause of the disaster. It is however, with grief we learn, that eight persons on board were most seriously scalded, two of whom, it is said, are dead.—Chester Courier.

MAIDSTONE FAIR.—Our Fair was on Monday most numerously attended, and the town was literally thronged with visitors, who were highly amused by the novelty of the exhibitions, with all the bustle, being held in a pleasant field between the Barming and London roads, commanding a delightful prospect of the whole town, with a distant view of the adjacent hills. The weather was unusually favourably, giving additional zest to the festivities of the day. There was a tolerably supply of fat and lean Stock, the latter at high prices; and a large supply of Horses, which also fetched high prices. The Hop trade was rather heavy: Bags from 90*s.* to 105*s.*; Pockets, 100*s.* to 115*s.* The light-fingered gentry began their operations very early, and were but too successful.

SINGULAR INSTANCE OF ANIMAL INSTINCT.—On Wednesday evening, a post chaise and pair belonging to Mr. Wright, of the Ship Hotel, at Dover, left the Fountain Inn, at Canterbury, on its return home; but the post-boy who had been unwell, finding himself chilly, stopped at the Star, in that City, for the purpose of putting on his great coat, and whilst in the act of doing so, the horses, started off; they passed the Gutteridge Gate, at the top of the New Road, which was open, and also several vehicles on the road, without the slightest obstruction, until they arrived at the Turnpike Gate, at Charlton, which being shut, they sprung at it, and having divided it, proceeded through the town, turning the dangerous corner of Bench-street, with as much accuracy as if guided, [and took their course down the Rope-walk, in a gallop. 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DARING OUTRAGES.—On Monday night a carpenter's shop, at Bridge, was broken open; the depredators stole from the tools there deposited several implements for breaking open doors, and on their departure left a right-hand glove. The villains then proceeded to the church, which they forcibly entered, and stole the prayer books and baptismal basin. It is supposed that the same gang subsequently proceeded to the house of Baron Montesquieu, and broke into the servants' room, from which they stole a quantity of wearing apparel: one of the servants, hearing a noise, struck a light, upon which the robbers decamped. The same night the same depredators went to the parsonage at Beakesbourne, from whence they stole two hives of bees and the garden line; and here they left the fellow glove to the one left at Bridge. They made a secure retreat with their booty, and no clue to discovery has yet been obtained.

On Tuesday night, a cottage at Nonington was broken open, supposed to be by the same gang, and two one pound notes, a quantity of wearing apparel, silver tea spoons, &c. were stolen therefrom.

On Sunday night last, some daring villains forced two strong locks, and entered the hen roost of Mr. Blackburn, of Hinxhill, and stole several couple of fowls. A Pointer dog, belonging to a friend of Mr. B.'s, was tied up in a house adjoining the hen roost door, but being young and not of a surly disposition, the robbers were not interrupted by him: before leaving the premises, they wrote with chalk, on the door, "Sir, you have a dog, kill him. I did not know where your fowl-house was: if you want your fowls, you must come to Ashford immediately."—On the same night, Mrs. Brown, a near neighbour of the above gentleman, lost five or six couple of fat ducks and four geese.

On the night of the 27th ult. the house of Mr. George Newport, of Dean Farm, Elmsted, was attempted to be entered by a lattice window, but the villgins were frustrated in their object by the alarm of a dog which laid in the house; they then paid a visit to Mr. H. Gambrill, of the same place, but were equally unfortunate, as they made off on hearing the children, who were afflicted with the whooping-cough; they next directed their attention to Mr. Joseph Gambrill's, Dowl's Farms, where they succeeded in breaking into the fowl-house and stealing twelve couple of fowls, and wrote on the door, "if you go to
