LITTLEBOURNE, BRIDGE AND PATRIBOURNE.

LITTLEBOURNE is a village and parish, in the lathe of St. Augustine and hundred of Downhamford; situated on the road from Canterbury to Deal, 4 miles from the former and 14 from the latter place. A branch of the Stoure runs by the village, and turns two corn mills, which are the only works of trade in the place. The church, which is dedicated to St. Vincent, and situated at the east end of the village, offers nothing to induce remark or attention; the living is a vicarage, in the patronage of the dean and chapter of Canterbury. Littlebourn parish contained, by the returns for the year 1831, 733 inhabitants.

BRIDGE is a village and parish, in the hundred of Bridge and Peitham, lathe of St. Augustine; three miles from Canterbury; situate on the high road to Dover, and watered by the Little Stoure. It contains a church, and a chapel for Wesleyan methodists; the living is a perpetual curacy, annexed to the vicarage of Patribourne, in the archdeaconry and diocese of Canterbury. The population of this parish, by the last returns, amounted to 543 persons.

PATRIBOURNE is a village and parish, in the same hundred and lathe as Bridge, three miles s.e. from Canterbury. The church is dedicated to St. Mary; and the living is a vicarage (including Bridge), in the patronage of E. Taylor, Esq. Population, 280 persons.

Bull Inn, at half-past eight every morning (Sundays excepted), through *Faversham*, at ten, to the *Guildhall Tavern*, Canterbury; returns at half-past three, to *Faversham* at five, at *Sittingbourne* half-past six P.M.

To MAIDSTONE, a coach and van (from Canterbury) call alternately at the *Three Kings* every afternoon at one. John Richardson's light omnibus leaves the *Wheatsheaf Inn*, Sittingbourne, every morning (Sundays excepted), at half-past seven, and arrives at *Maidstone* in time for the London, Sevenoaks, Tunbridge Wells, Brighton, Hastings, and Ashford conveyances; returns from the *Haunch of Venison Inn*, Maidstone, at five, and arrives at *Sittingbourne* in time for the Tally-ho! coach to Canterbury.

To GRAVESEND, through ROCHESTER and CHATHAM, Benjamin Peters's "Surprise" coach-van leaves *Sittingbourne* from his house every morning (Sundays excepted), at half-past six, and arrives at *Gravesend* in time for the morning steam packet for London; returns from *Gravesend* immediately after the arrival of the last packet from London. Another van also leaves *Sittingbourne* from the same place at nine every morning (Sundays excepted), and arrives at *Gravesend* for the half-past twelve boat.

CARRIERS.

To and from LONDON and DOVER, Stephen Wrake's waggon calls at the *Three Kings* three times a week; and Stanbury and Co.'s van calls at the *Ship* every day.

WATER CONVEYANCE.

To LONDON, John Huggin's hoys from *Sittingbourne* every al-

ternate week; and Chas. Smith's hoys from *MILTON* every alternate Saturday.
