BEKESBOURNE (or Beakesbourne) is a small parish on the Little Stour, with a station on the South Eastern and Chatham railway, 3 miles east-south-east from Canterbury and 59 from London by road and 64½ by railway, in the Eastern division of the county, lathe of St. Augustine, Bridge hundred and union, petty sessional division and county court district of Canterbury, rural deanery of East Bridge, and archdeaconry and diocese of Canterbury, and is also partly in the city and county of the city of Canterbury. This parish is a member of the Cinque port of Hastings and was formerly a borough. The church of St. Peter is in the Norman, Early English and later styles, and has a tower containing 6 bells, the gift of Miss Gibbs, late of Howletts: in the church are memorials to the families of Palmer, Hales, Fagge, Eden and Gardner and various memorial windows: the church was restored in 1882-8 at a cost of about £3,000, and has 150 sittings, about 100 being free. The register dates from the year 1558. The living is a vicarage, net income £150, with residence, in the gift of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and held since 1898 by the Rev. Albert Richard Pritchard M.A. of Lincoln College, Oxford. In this parish is the Sanatorium of the Bridge Rural District Council. The Old Palace,

an ancient house, formerly a country residence of the Archbishops of Canterbury, is now in the occupation of William Howard esq. The Ecclesiastical Commissioners and the Marquess Conyngham are the principal land-owners. The soil is gravel and chalk; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats and hops. The area is 1,091 acres; rateable value, £2,178; the population in 1911 was 348 in the civil parish and 361 in the ecclesiastical parish.

BIRLING is a parish and village, at the foot of the chalk hills, 2 miles north-east from Malling station on the Swanley Junction and Maidstone section of the South Eastern and Chatham railway, 2 south-west from Snodland station on the North Kent line, 8 south-west from Rochester and 7 north-west from Maidstone, in the Mid division of the county, Aylesford lathe, Larkfield hundred, Malling petty sessional division and union, Maidstone county court district, rural deanery of Malling, archdeaconry of Tonbridge and diocese of Rochester. Birling is watered by a small stream rising near Birling Place, and flowing into the Medway. The church of All Saints is a building of Kentish rag, principally Perpendicular in style, and has a tower containing a clock and 8 bells, and several stained windows, as well as memorials of the Nevill family: the church affords upwards of 400 sittings. The register dates from the year 1558. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £300, including residence and 11 acres of glebe, in the gift of the Marquess of Abergavenny K.G. and held since 1908 by the Rev. Leonard Staniforth M.A., LL.M. of Trinity College, Cambridge. Christ Church, LOWER BIRLING, was formed into a separate ecclesiastical parish in January, 1911. The church, erected in 1893, is in the Early English style, and has 230 sittings. The site and burial ground were given by the late Rev. Canon Coulson M.A. of Guildford. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £200, in the gift of trustees, and held since 1911 by the Rev. Andrew Pollak Williams Th.A.K.C. Birling Manor, the residence of the Hon. Ralph Pelham Nevill D.L., J.P. (lord of the manor and principal landowner), is an extensive mansion, in a modern Gothic style, with grounds of about 70 acres. The Marquess of Abergavenny K.G. is also a landowner. The soil is various, sand, clay and gravel; subsoil, stone

and gravel. The area is 1,917 acres of land, a large proportion of which is devoted to the cultivation of fruit and hops. The area of the civil parish is 1,797 acres of land and 3 of water; rateable value, £3,356; the population in 1911 was 855 in the civil and 387 in the ecclesiastical parish.

HAM HILL is in the parish, 1 mile east from the parish church.

BISHOPSBOURNE is a parish on a feeder of the Stour, on the entrance of the Barham Downs, and about half a mile from the Dover road, with a station on the Elham Valley line of the South Eastern and Chatham railway, and 2½ miles south from Bekesbourne station on the Chatham and Dover section of that railway, and 4 miles south-east from Canterbury, in the Eastern division of the county, lathe of St. Augustine, Kinghamford hundred, petty sessional division of Wingham, Bridge union, Canterbury county court district, rural deanery of East Bridge, and archdeaconry and diocese of Canterbury. The church of St. Mary is of flint, in the Early English and later styles, and has a tower containing 4 bells: there is some stained glass, and in the chancel a mural monument with bust, erected in 1632 by Sir W. Cooper kt. to Richard Hooker M.A. (commonly known as "the learned and judicious Hooker"), author of the celebrated "Ecclesiastical Polity," and some time fellow of Corpus Christi College, Oxford; he was rector of Bishopsbourne from 1595 till his death, Nov. 2nd, 1600: in 1890 a memorial window to Hooker was erected: the church was repaired and re-seated in 1872, at a cost of £1,600: there are 215 sittings. The register of baptisms and marriages dates from 1558;

burials from 1571. The living is a rectory, yearly value £331, with residence, in the gift of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and held since 1901 by the Rev. William Blissard M.A. of Emmanuel College, Cambridge; it was formerly united to Barham, but was separated from it in 1846 by Order in Council. In the rectory garden there is a remarkable yew hedge, said by some to have been planted by Hooker. Bourne Park, the property of Capt. Matthew Gerald Edward Bell, who is lord of the manor, is occupied by Walter Turner Toynbee esq. J.P. Charlton Place, the seat and property of Capt. John Cecil de Veil Tattersall, is half a mile south-east, and contains a very fine saloon which was built for George IV. Capt. M. G. E. Bell, the Marquess Conyngham and Capt. J. C. De V. Tattersall are the principal landowners. In Gorsley Wood, on the property of the Marquess Conyngham, are three tumuli, opened in Feb. 1882, and found to contain stone chests holding human remains. The soil is loamy; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, oats, barley and hops. The area is 2,018 acres of land and 5 of water; rateable value, £2,182; the population in 1911 was 289. Sexton, J. BLACKHEATH is a suburban district of London, included under the "Local Government Act, 1888," within the county of London, created by that Act and within the Lewisham Municipal borough under the

"London Government Act, 1899," and is not, therefore, comprised within the Kent Directory, but will be found in the "London County Suburbs Directory."

BLACKMANSTONE is a very small parish, 3 miles north from New Romney terminal station of a short line from Lydd and on a branch of the South Eastern and Chatham railway, and 7 south-west from Hythe, consisting of one farm and a few cottages, in the Southern division of the county. Worth hundred, lathe of Shepway, union and liberty of Romney Marsh, petty sessional division of Romney Marsh, New Romney county court district and in the rural deanery of South Lympne and archdeaconry and diocese of Canterbury. The church has long been in ruins and scarcely any traces of it are now left. The living is a rectory, annexed with the

sinecure rectories of Eastbridge Chapel and Orgarswick to that of Dymchurch, yearly value £23. Lord Brabourne is lord of the manor. The trustees of the late Archibald Stokes esq. are the principal landowners. The land is principally in pasture. The area is 297 acres of land and 3 of water; rateable value, £271; the population in 1911 was 12.

BLEAN (or Sts. Cosmus and Damian-in-the-Blean) is a parish and head of a union, in a wild country, enveloped by woods and environed by large tracts of rough land. The centre of the parish is 3 miles north-west from Canterbury. The high road from Canterbury to Whitstable skirts the western side of the parish, which has no village properly so called, but contains a large and scattered population; it is in the Eastern division of the county, lathe of St. Augustine, hundred of Whitstable, Canterbury petty sessional division and county court district, and in the rural deanery and archdeaconry of Canterbury. A brook flows past the church. The church of SS. Cosmus and Damian is of flint, in the Early English style, and contains several monuments; it was restored and re-seated in 1866, and has a bell gable containing one bell; there are 273 sittings. The register dates from the year 1553. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £328, with half an acre of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Master of Eastbridge Hospital, Canterbury, and held since 1905 by the Rev. Alfred Butler M.A. of St. John's College, Cambridge. There is a Wesleyan chapel here and a Baptist chapel at Tyler Hill. The charities include one of £2 10s. yearly, left in 1820 by Mrs. Leggett, of Blean, for bread, and Wootton's, of £6 10s. left in 1841 by Richard Charles Harris Wootton, of Blean, for the repair of his tomb, the surplus to be distributed annually in calico and flannel. The Master of Eastbridge Hospital is lord of the manor; the trustees of James Fleet esq. Lieut.-Col. Charles Hamilton Trueman and the trustees of Mrs. de Chair Baker are the largest landowners. The soil is light loam; subsoil, clay. The chief crops are wheat, barley and hops. The area is 2,335 acres; rateable value, £3,138; population in 1911, 584.

DENSTROUD is a hamlet in Blean Forest, 4 miles north-west from Canterbury. The woods under various names extend for four or five miles in different directions, and are watered by feeders of the Stour, which rise in them, and here and there are occasional clearings.

TYLER HILL, mostly in St. Stephen's parish, Hackington, is 2 miles east. See Canterbury for names.

EAST PECKHAM is a large straggling village and parish, 2½ miles north from Paddock Wood station on the main line of the South Eastern and Chatham railway, 2 miles north-west from Yalding station on the Strood and Paddock Wood section of the same railway, 6 north-east from Tonbridge, 8 west-south-west from Maidstone and 33 from London, in the South Western division of the county, 14th of Aylesford, Twyford and Littlefield hundreds, Malling petty sessional division and union, Maidstone county court district, rural deanery of Malling, archdeaconry of Tonbridge and diocese of Rochester. The navigable Medway passes through the parish, and has a wharf at Branbridges. The church of St. Michael is of stone, chiefly in the Perpendicular style, and has a tower containing 6 bells: the chancel was restored in 1855, and the remainder in 1863; there are three memorials to the Cook family, and some remains of ancient stained glass: the church has 400 sittings. The register dates from the year 1538. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £430, with residence and 9 acres of glebe, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Canterbury, who are the rectors, and held since 1011 by the Rev. Geoffrey Charles Edward Ryley M.A., Mus. Bac. of Trinity College, Oxford. Holy Trinity is an ecclesiastical parish, formed July 28th, 1843; the church, erected in 1842, is of stone in the Perpendicular style, and has a turret containing a clock and 2-bells. The church was restored in 1892 at a cost of about £800, and in 1900 a choir vestry was added. The register dates from the year 1843. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £290, with residence, in the gift of the vicar of East Peckham, and held since 1904 by the Rev. Robert Alfred Wood M.A. of Trinity College, Dublin. There are Wesleyan and Baptist chapels. The extensive mills of Messrs. William Arnold and Sons, and a large tannery, belonging to Messrs. John Dixon, Sons and Taylor, are situated here. The trustees of the late Benjamin Scott Foster MacGeagh esq. of Hadlow Castle (d. 1907), are lords of the manor. Maj.-Gen. Viscount Falmouth C.B., K.C.V.O., D.L., J.P. Jasper Francis Wheeler esq. Messrs. Simmons Brothers, of Stillstead, and Messrs. Allen Brothers are the principal landowners. The soil is clay and loamy; subsoil, various. The chief crops are hops, wheat, beans and fruit. Great quantities of hops are grown here. The area is 5,373 acres of land and 38 of water; rateable value, £10,382; the population in 1911 was 2,165.

The population of the ecclesiastical parishes in 1911 was, St. Michael (parish church), 324; Holy Trinity, 1,841.

The Mill stream flows into the Medway near Little Mill.

BISHOPSBOURNE.

Post Town, Canterbury. Bishops-
bourne is a parish four miles south-east
from Canterbury, and about half-a-mile
off the Dover road, with a station on the
Elham Valley section of the South-East-
ern Railway. The parish is also crossed
by the main road from Canterbury to
Dover. The church of St. Mary was
restored and reseated in 1872 at a cost
of £1600. In 1877 a beautiful stone
reredos was added at a cost of £300.
An object of great interest is a memorial
to Richard Hooker (M.A.), author of the
celebrated "Ecclesiastical Polity," and
who was rector of Bishopsbourne from
1595 to 1600, the date of his death.
The living is a Rectory in the gift of the
Archbishop of Canterbury, and at
present held by the Rev. Wm. Blissard
(M.A.). Bourne Park is the seat of
Capt. M. G. E. Bell, lord of the
manor. Charlton Park is the seat of

CHARTHAM.

Post Town, Canterbury. Chatham is a large parish, with a somewhat scattered population of 3000. The principal portion lies about three miles west from Canterbury, and has a station on the South-Eastern Railway. The river Stour runs through the village, and on it, near the Church, are the extensive paper mills of Messrs. Howard and Son, giving employment to a large number of hands.

The East Kent Lunatic Asylum was erected in 1875 on Chatham Downs, at a cost of £250,000, from designs by Messrs. Giles and Gough. It consists of central entrance, with offices and committee-rooms, two blocks on either side, six in the rear, and a chapel in the centre. There is accommodation for 500 males and 600 females. Three blocks were added to the Asylum in 1898, at a cost of £40,000. The average number now is 1045. The Asylum forms a conspicuous feature in the landscape from the railway, and for some miles around.
