BEKESBOURNE (or Beakesbourne) is a small parish on the Little Stour, with a station on the Southern railway, 3 miles east-south-east from Canterbury and 59 from London by road and 64½ by railway, in the Canterbury division of the county, lathe of St. Augustine, hundred and union of Bridge, petty sessional division and county court district of Canterbury, rural deanery of East Bridge and archdeaconry and diocese of Canterbury; it is also partly in the city and county of the city of Canterbury. This parish is a member of the Cinque port of Hastings and was formerly a borough. The church of St. Peter is in the Norman, Early English and later styles, and has a tower containing 6 bells, the gift of Miss Gipps: in the church are memorials to the families of Palmer, Hales, Fagge, Eden and Gardner and various memorial windows: the church was restored in 1882-8, and has 150 sittings. In the centre of the new churchyard is a memorial to the 12 parishioners who fell in the Great War, 1914-18; the cost was defrayed by public subscription. The register dates from the year 1558. The living is a vicarage, net income £317, with residence, in the gift of

the Archbishop of Canterbury, and held since 1913 by the Rev. Richard Bevan Pyper M.A. of Corpus Christi College, Cambridge. In this parish is the Sanatorium of the Bridge Rural District Council. The Old Palace, an ancient house, was formerly a country residence of the Archbishops of Canterbury. The Ecclesiastical Commissioners, the Marquess Conyngham and G. F. Dalton esq. are the principal landowners. The soil is gravel and chalk; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley oats and hops. The area is 1,091 acres; rateable value, £2,173; the population in 1921 was 332 in the civil parish, and of the ecclesiastical parish in 1911, 361.

BELVEDERE (or Lessness Heath) and Abbey Wood is an ecclesiastical parish, formed in 1861 from the civil parish of Erith; it has a station on the North Kent section of the Southern railway, and is 1 mile west from Erith, 4 north-west from Dartford and 12 from London, in the Dartford division of the county, hundred of Lessness, lathe of Sutton-at-Hone, petty sessional division, union, county court district and rural deanery of Dartford and archdeaconry and diocese of Rochester, and within the jurisdiction of the Metropolitan Police. The parish extends to the banks of the Thames, and is lighted by electricity by the Erith Urban Council, and supplied with water by the Metropolitan Water Board, Kent District. All Saints' church, Erith road, is of cut flints with stone dressings, in the Early English style, and has a western tower with spire containing a clock and one bell: there are four stained windows: the church will seat 600 persons, 280 sittings being free. The register dates from the year 1861. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £393, with residence, in the gift of trustees, and held since 1909 by the Rev. William Richard Hartwright L.Th. of Hatfield Hall, Durham, and surrogate. St. Augustine's was created a separate parish in 1917: the church, in St. Augustine's road, has 500 sittings. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £200, in the gift of the Bishop of Rochester, and held since 1917 by the Rev. Thomas Clegg Whittle. There is a Congregational chapel, in Picardy road, erected in 1897 to seat 300. There are also two Baptist chapels, one in Bexley road, built in 1863, seating 350, and another in Upper Abbey road, erected in 1899, with 220 sittings, and a Strict Baptist chapel: there is also a Primitive Methodist chapel. The Salvation Army also have a hall here. The County Technical Institute and

Secondary School, in Erith road, erected at a cost of £11,000 on land given for the purpose by the West Kent Land Development Co. was opened in March, 1907. The Erith Urban District Sanatorium for Infectious Diseases, at Little Heath, was erected in 1893 at a cost of £2,113, and extended in 1909-1910: total outlay, £5,422: there are 40 beds: two additional wards have recently been added at a cost of about £2,000. The Royal Alfred Aged Merchant Seamen's Institution, in Belvedere park, Upper Park road, founded in 1856, and opened January, 1857, is pleasantly situated in 24 acres of ground, commanding a view of the river; it serves as a home for indigent merchant seamen, of not less than 60 years of age, and is available for 150 inmates: there are now about 100 pensioners, who are fed and clothed, and also about 540 out-pensioners, each of whom receives £18 yearly, whilst there are over 200 widows and disabled seamen in receipt of allowance amounting to £4,500 per annum; Commander Walter H. Wilkes R.D., R.N.R. (retd.), house governor. In Belvedere Park is a masonic lodge

The population of the ecclesiastical parish in 1901 was 9,826, and in 1911, 9,288.

ABBEY WOOD lies to the west and has a station on the North Kent section of the Southern railway; near it is Bostall Heath, a tract 155 acres in extent, situated on the table land which bounds the Thames marshes below Plumstead and commanding a pleasant prospect: it is under the control of the London County Council as an open place. St. Mary's iron mission church, erected in 1888 at a cost of £180, will seat 200 persons. There is also a Salvation Army hall

BIRLING is a parish and village, at the foot of the chalk hills, 2 miles north-east from Malling station on the Swanley Junction and Maidstone section of the Southern railway, 2 south-west from Snodland station on the North Kent line, 8 south-west from Rochester and 7 north-west from Maidstone, in the Sevenoaks division of the county, Aylesford lathe, Larkfield hundred, petty sessional division and union of Malling, county court district of Maidstone, rural deanery of Malling, archdeaconry of Tonbridge and diocese of Rochester. Birling is watered by a small stream rising near Birling Place, and flowing into the Medway. The church of All Saints is a building of Kentish rag, principally Perpendicular in style, and has a tower containing a clock and 8 bells, and several stained windows, as well as memorials of the Nevill family: the church affords upwards of 400 sittings. The register dates from the year 1558. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £375, including residence and 11 acres of glebe, in the gift of the Marquess of Abergavenny, and held since 1916 by the Rev. Frank Trevelyan Snow M.A. of St. Catharine's College, Cambridge. Christ Church, LOWER BIRLING, was formed into a separate ecclesiastical parish in January, 1911. The church, erected in 1893, is in the Early English style, and has 200 sittings. The site and burial ground were given by Rev. Canon Coulson M.A. of Guildford. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £322, in the gift of

trustees, and held since 1911 by the Rev. Andrew Pollak Williams Th.A.K.C. Percy Llewelyn Nevill esq. J.P. who is lord of the manor, and the Marquess of Abergavenny are the principal landowners. The soil is various, sand, clay and gravel; subsoil, stone and gravel. The area is 1,917 acres of land, a large proportion of which is devoted to the cultivation of fruit and hops. The area of the civil parish is 1,797 acres of land and 3 of water; rateable value, £3,344; the population in 1911 was 855, and in 1921, 922 in the civil and of the ecclesiastical parish in 1911, 387.

HAM HILL is in the parish, 1 mile east from the parish church.

BISHOPSBOURNE is a parish on a feeder of the Stour, on the entrance of the Barham Downs, and about half a mile from the Dover road, with a station on the Elham Valley line of the Southern railway, and 2½ miles south from Bekebourne station on the Chatham and Dover section of that railway, and 4 miles south-east from Canterbury. in the Canterbury division of the county, lathe of St. Augustine, Kinghamford hundred, petty sessional division of Wingham, union of Bridge, county court district of Canterbury, rural deanery of East Bridge, and archdeaconry and diocese of Canterbury. The Nailbourne, a feeder of the Stour, which runs through the parish, rising in the hills above Folkestone, is an intermittent stream, flowing for a few months periodically about every five to seven years, but from 1910 it has been flowing regularly. The church of St. Mary is of flint, in the Early English and later styles, and has a tower containing 4 bells: there is some stained glass, and in the chancel a mural monument with bust, erected in 1632 by Sir W. Cooper kt. to Richard Hooker M.A. (commonly known

as "the learned and judicious Hooker"), author of the celebrated "Ecclesiastical Polity," and some time fellow of Corpus Christi College, Oxford; he was rector of Bishopsbourne from 1595 till his death, Nov. 2nd, 1600: in 1890 a memorial window to Hooker was erected, and a lych gate was erected to his memory in 1911: the church was repaired and re-seated in 1872, at a cost of £1,600: there are 215 sittings. The register of baptisms and marriages dates from 1558; burials from 1571. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £505, with residence, in the gift of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and held since 1923 by the Rev. Walter Henry Trelawny Ashton-Gwatkin M.A. of King's College, Cambridge; it was formerly united to Barham, but was severed from it in 1845 by Order in Council. In the rectory garden there is a remarkable yew hedge, said by some to have been planted by Hooker. Bourne Park, the seat and property of Lt.-Col. Matthew Gerald Edward Bell O.B.E., J.P. who is lord of the manor. Charlton Place, the seat and property of John Cecil de Veil Tattersall esq. is half a mile south-east, and con-

tains a very fine saloon which was built for George IV. Lt.-Col. M. G. E. Bell O.B.E., J.P. the Marquess Conyngham and J. C. de V. Tattersall esq. are the principal landowners. In Gorsley Wood, on the property of the Marquess Conyngham, are three tumuli, opened in Feb. 1882, and found to contain stone chests holding human remains. The soil is loamy; subsoil, chalk. BLACKMANSTONE is a very small parish, 3 miles north from New Romney terminal station of a branch of the Southern railway, and 7 south-west from Hythe, consisting of one farmhouse and one cottage, in the Ashford division of the county, Worth hundred, lathe of Shepway, union, liberty and petty sessional division of Romney Marsh, county court district of Ashford, rural deanery of South Lympne, archdeaconry of Maidstone and diocese of Canterbury. The church has long been in ruins and scarcely any traces of it are now left. The living is a rectory, annexed with the sinecure

rectories of Eastbridge Chapel and Organswick to that of Dymchurch. Arthur Finn esq. J.P. is the lord of the manor and principal landowner. The land is principally in pasture. The area is 297 acres of land and 3 of water; rateable value, £457; the population in 1921 was 10.

BLEAN (or SS. Cosmus and Damian-in-the-Blean) is a parish and the head of a union. The centre of the parish is 3 miles north-west from Canterbury. There is a "halt" on the Canterbury and Whitstable branch of the Southern railway. The high road from Canterbury to Whitstable passes through the parish, which has no village properly so called, but contains a large and scattered population; it is in the Canterbury division of the county, lathe of St. Augustine, hundred of Whitstable, petty sessional division, county court district, rural deanery, archdeaconry and diocese of Canterbury. A brook flows past the church. The church of SS. Cosmus and Damian is of flint, in the Early English style, and contains a monument to members of the Boys family, of the time of Charles II. and James II. who then held the manor house now known as Hothe Court Farm, the remains of an ancient oak chancel screen, some fragments of old glass, and a tablet erected in 1920 to the memory of the men of this parish who fell in the Great War, 1914-18: the church was restored and re-seated in 1866, and has a bell gable containing one bell: there are 200 sittings. The register dates from the year 1553. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £521, with residence, in the gift of the Master of Eastbridge Hospital, Canterbury, and held since 1921 by the Rev. Charles Edward Potts Antram. In 1919 2½ acres of land near the church were purchased by public subscription and handed over to the Parish Council for conversion into a recreation ground, as a memorial to the men who fell in the Great War, 1914-18. There is a Wesleyan chapel here and a Baptist chapel at Tyler Hill. The charities include one of £2 10s. yearly, left in 1820 by Mrs. Leggett, of Blean, for bread, and Wootton's, of £5 9s. left in 1841 by Richard Charles Harris Wootton, of Blean, for the repair of his tomb, the surplus to be distributed annually in calico and flannel. The Master of Eastbridge Hospital is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The soil is partly light loam; subsoil, clay. The chief crops are wheat, barley &c. The area is 2,335 acres; rateable value, £3,458; population in 1921 was 601.

DENSTROUD is a hamlet in Blean Forest, 4 miles north-west from Canterbury. The woods under various names extend for four or five miles in different directions, and are watered by feeders of the Stour, which rise in them, and here and there are occasional clearings.

BRIDGE is a parish and head of a union, giving its name to a rural deanery; it derives its name from its situation in a valley on the Roman and modern road to Dover, at a bridge over a feeder of the Stour, with a station on the Canterbury and Folkestone line of the Southern railway, and is 1 1/2 miles south from Bekesbourne station on the same system, and 3 south-east from Canterbury, in the Canterbury division of the county, lathe of St. Augustine, hundred of Bridge and Petham, petty sessional division of St. Augustine's, Canterbury, county court district of Canterbury, rural deanery of East Bridge and archdeaconry and diocese of Canterbury. The village is lighted with gas by a local limited company. The church of St. Peter is of flint, in the Norman style, with some additions of the Early English period, and has a tower with spire, containing a clock and 4 bells: the windows are stained: within a recess is a recumbent effigy of a man in robes, in low relief: the church was repaired and partly rebuilt about 1860, and affords 350 sittings, 80 being free. The register dates from the year 1565. The living is a vicarage, annexed to the vicarage of Patricxbourne, joint net yearly value £330, with 38 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Marquess Conyngham, and held since 1897 by the Rev. Hubert Knight M.A. of Christ's College, Cambridge, who resides at Patricxbourne. A war memorial was erected in 1920 by public subscription in the north-east of the churchyard, to the memory of 13 men of the parish who fell in the Great War, 1914-18. The Wesleyan chapel, built in 1894, is of corrugated iron and wood, and seats 150 persons. The principal landowners are the Marquess Conyngham, who is lord of the manor, Earl Sondes and Lt.-Col. Matthew Gerald Edward Bell. The soil is chalky; subsoil chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats and hops. The area is 1,171 acres; rateable value, £3,517; the population in 1921 was 699.

BROADSTAIRS with ST. PETER'S.

BROADSTAIRS, anciently called "Bradstow," is a pleasant little town and watering place, with a station on the South Eastern section of the Southern railway, 2½ miles north from Ramsgate, 77 from London and 3½ south-east from Margate, situated on a small bay on the eastern coast of the Isle of Thanet, in the rural deanery of Westbere and archdeaconry and diocese of Canterbury; it was from 1879 under a Local Board, but is now governed under the Local Government Act, 1894 (56 and 57 Vict. c. 73), by a District Council of twelve members. In pursuance of an Order of the County Council, made in 1894, the name of the Urban District was altered to Broadstairs and St. Peter's, and now comprises four wards—Central, Pierremont, Kingsgate and St. Peter's. The modern extension of the town of Broadstairs has a fine promenade on the summit of low cliffs, but in the older part the streets are narrow and tortuous. Both Broadstairs and St. Peter's are lighted with gas and by electricity by a company, and supplied with water from works erected in 1859 and extended in 1876, and again in 1903 and 1907 at a cost of about £60,000, the property of the Urban District Council: the water is obtained from adits in the chalk extending about 1½ miles inland. The ecclesiastical parish was formed out of St. Peter's on Sept. 27, 1850. The parish church of the Holy Trinity, erected in 1840, is of flint with stone facings in the Early English style, and has a tower containing a clock and one bell: the addition of the north and south aisles was completed in 1915: there are 650 sittings. The register of baptisms dates from the year 1850. The living was declared a rectory Dec. 6, 1867, net yearly value £270, with residence, built in 1870, in the gift of the vicar of St. Peter's, and held since 1909 by the Rev. Lewis Lanning Edwards M.A. of Trinity Col-

lege, Dublin. The Roman Catholic church, St. Peter's Park road, is dedicated to Our Lady Star of the Sea. The Baptist chapel, in High street, founded in 1790, was restored in 1909, and seats 250 persons. The Baptist chapel, in Queen's road, built in 1903 at a cost of £2,000, is an edifice of brick with stone dressings, in the Gothic style, from designs by Mr. E. E. Moody, architect: it includes a clock tower, and will seat about 450 persons: the old chapel alongside, built in 1897, is now used as a Sunday school. There is also a Congregational chapel, erected in 1876, with 350 sittings; a Wesleyan Methodist chapel and a preaching room belonging to the Brethren. Bleak House, standing in a prominent position on the cliff, is stated to be associated with the novel, "Bleak House," of Charles Dickens. There is a bathing establishment and libraries, as well as marine villas and many boarding houses, and several good hotels, including the Grand and the Royal Albion. York gate, an ancient arch of flintwork, once forming part of the defences of the place, was built by George Cullmer about 1540, and repaired in 1705 by Sir John Henniker bart.: the portcullis and gates have disappeared: near it are the remains of a chapel dedicated to Our Lady of Bradstow and once containing an image held in great veneration by mariners, who were wont to salute it in passing by lowering their sails. The area of the Urban District, which includes the parish of St. Peter Extra, is 3,030 acres: rateable value, £93,371: the population in 1921 was 15,471. The population of the Urban District wards in 1921 was—Central, 4,565; Kingsgate, 2,878; Pierremont, 4,328, and St. Peter's, 3,700. The population of Holy Trinity ecclesiastical parish in 1911 was 4,779.

PATRIXBOURNE (or Patricksbourne) is a parish and village, pleasantly situated in a healthy country, the Lesser Stour running through the village, which is three-quarters of a mile from the road from Canterbury to Ashford, half a mile south from the Bekesbourne station on the Faversham and Dover section of the Southern railway, and 3 miles south-east from Canterbury; it is in the Canterbury division of the county, lathe of St. Augustine, hundred of Bridge and Petham, union of Bridge, petty sessional division of Horne, county court district of Canterbury, rural deanery of East Bridge, archdeaconry and diocese of Canterbury. The church of St. Mary, a fine structure of the Norman period, is of flint with stone dressings, and has a tower with spire containing a clock and 3 bells: there are some stained windows and monuments to the Conyngham family: the church has 180 sittings. At the east end of the churchyard is a memorial, erected by public subscription, to six men connected with this parish who fell in the Great War, 1914-18. The register of baptisms and burials dates from the year 1556; marriages from 1560. The living is

that of Bridge annexed, joint net yearly value £330, with 33 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Marquess Conyngham, and held since 1897 by the Rev. Hubert Knight M.A. of Christ's College, Cambridge. Bifrons, the property of the Marquess Conyngham, who is lord of the manor, lay impropiator and chief landowner, is now occupied by Col. Hon. Milo George Talbot C.B.: it is a handsome mansion of stone, standing in a finely-timbered park of 230 acres. Higham, the seat of Count Louis Zborowski, is a modern mansion of Portland stone, having porticos and columns with carved capitals. The soil is loam; subsoil, chalk and gravel. The chief crops are hops and wheat. The area is 1,559 acres; rateable value, £2,357; the population of the civil parish in 1921 was 232, and of the ecclesiastical parish in 1911, 228.

EAST PECKHAM is a large straggling village and parish, 2½ miles north from Paddock Wood station on the main line of the Southern railway, 2 north-west from Yalding station on the Strood and Paddock Wood section of the same railway, 6 north-east from Tonbridge, 8 west-south-west from Maidstone and 33 from London: it is in the Sevenoaks division of the county, lathe of Aylesford, Twyford and Littlefield hundreds, county court district of Maidstone, petty sessional division, union and rural deanery of Malling, archdeaconry of Tonbridge and diocese of Rochester. The navigable Medway passes through the parish and has a wharf at Branbridges. The church of St. Michael is of stone, chiefly in the Perpendicular style, and has a tower containing 6 bells: the chancel was restored in 1855, and the remainder of the church in 1863: there are three memorials to the Cook family and three to the Twysden family, and some remains of ancient stained glass: in 1917 a new altar and reredos was erected in memory of Lt.-Col. Cook, and the aisle was converted into a chapel: the exterior of the church was thoroughly repaired in 1913, and the churchyard was enlarged by the addition of a quarter of an acre: in 1921 a lych gate was erected in memory of the men connected with this parish who fell in the Great War, 1914-18: the church has 400 sittings. The register dates from the year 1558. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £615; with residence and 8 acres of glebe, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Canterbury, who are the rectors, and held since 1911 by the Rev. Geoffrey Charles Edward Ryley M.A., Mus.Bac. of Trinity College, Oxford. Holy Trinity is an ecclesiastical parish, formed July 28th, 1843; the church,

erected in 1842, is of stone in the Perpendicular style, and has a turret containing a clock and 2 bells: the church was restored in 1892 at a cost of about £300, and in 1900 a choir vestry was added. In 1919 a memorial was erected in the churchyard to 43 men of this parish who fell in the Great War, 1914-18. The register dates from the year 1843. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £228, with residence, in the gift of the vicar of East Peckham, and held since 1921 by the Rev. Robert A. White, of St. Aidans. There are Wesleyan and Baptist chapels. Roydon Hall is the residence of R. M. Cook esq. J.P. Henry Thomas Pearson esq. is lord of the manor. Lord Oranmore and Browne K.P., P.C. Leonard Wheeler esq. H. B. Gardener esq. Messrs. Simmons Brothers and Messrs. Allen Brothers are the principal landowners. The soil is clay and loamy; subsoil, various. The chief crops are hops, wheat, beans and fruit. Great quantities of hops are grown here. The area is 3,373 acres of land and 38 of water; rateable value, £10,775; the population in 1921 was 2,067.

The population of the ecclesiastical parishes in 1911 was, St. Michael (parish church), 324; Holy Trinity, 1,841.
 The Mill stream flows into the river Medway near Little Mill.
