**BRIDGE**, so named from its situation in a valley on the Dover road at a bridge over a feeder of the Stour, is a parish in the rural district of Bridge-Blean, and is 1½ miles south from Bekebourne railway station and 3 south-east from Canterbury, in the Canterbury division of the county, lathe of St. Augustine, hundred of Bridge and Petham, petty sessional division of St. Augustine's, Canterbury, county court district of Canterbury, rural deanery of East Bridge and archdeaconry and diocese of Canterbury. Gas and electricity are available. The church of St. Peter is of flint, in the Norman style, with some additions of the Early English period, and has a tower with spire, containing a clock and 4 bells; the windows are stained; within a recess is a recumbent effigy of a man in robes, in low relief: the church was repaired and partly rebuilt about 1860, and affords 350 sittings. The register dates from the year 1565. The living is a vicarage, annexed to the vicarage of Patribourne, with residence, in the gift of the Marquess Conyngham, and held since 1940 by the Rev. William Henry Samuel Gregory. In 1920 a cross was erected in the north-east of the

churchyard in memory of 13 men of the parish who fell in the Great War, 1914-18; the names of two men who fell in the Second World War have been added. The Methodist church, built in 1894, is of corrugated iron and wood, and seats 150 persons. The principal landowner is the Marquess Conyngham, who is lord of the manor. The soil is chalky; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats and hops; the area is 1,171 acres; the population in 1931 was 713.

**CHARTHAM, with HORTON.**

CHARTHAM is a parish and vil-  
lage, near the road from Canter-  
bury to Ashford, on the river  
Stour, with a railway station  $3\frac{1}{2}$   
miles south-west from Canterbury,  
11 north-east from Ashford, 65  
miles from London by rail and 56  
by road, in the Canterbury divi-  
sion of the county, lathes of St.  
Augustine and Scray, hundreds of  
Felborough and Westgate, rural  
district of Bridge-Blean and arch-  
deaconry and diocese of Canter-  
bury. Gas and electricity are  
available. The church of St. Mary  
is of flint, stone and brick, chiefly  
in the Early Decorated style, and  
has a tower of perpendicular date,  
containing a clock and 6 bells: the  
chancel windows retain much of  
the original stained glass, and  
there are numerous brasses, in-  
cluding one to Sir Robert de  
Septvans, 1306: in 1921 a brass  
mural tablet was put up bearing  
the names of the men of the parish  
who fell in the Great War, 1914-18;  
there are 300 sittings. The regis-  
ter dates from the year 1558. The  
living is a rectory, with the  
chapelry of Horton annexed, with  
residence and 30 acres of glebe, in  
the gift of the Archbishop of Can-  
terbury, and held since 1943 by  
the Rev. Andrew Rollo Gore  
Browne. The Old Tithe Barn was  
converted into a parish hall by the  
Rev. F. J. Hazledine (rector 1912-  
1920). On the village green is a  
cross, erected in 1920 as a memorial  
to the men connected with the  
parish who fell in the Great War,  
1914-18. There are three Metho-  
dist churches and a Salvation  
Army hall. A cemetery of 2 acres  
was laid out in 1899 and a Burial  
Board of 11 members formed.

There is a paper factory. On  
Chartham Downs were formerly a  
considerable number of barrows,  
now ploughed up, in which at  
various times have been found  
human remains, pottery and trin-  
kets, mostly of the Anglo-Saxon  
period, and on the Swarling Downs  
are three lines of entrenchments.  
The St. Augustine's Hospital was  
erected in 1875 on Chartham  
Downs and covers with its grounds  
an area of 300 acres; the buildings  
will hold 638 men and 624 women.  
The Ecclesiastical Commissioners  
are lords of the manor. The  
soil is light loam; subsoil, chalk.  
The chief crops are wheat, barley,  
oats and hops. The area is 4,570  
acres of land and water; the popu-  
lation in 1931 was 3,333.

Shalmsford Street is a consid-  
erable hamlet, adjoining Chartham;  
Chartham Hatch (or Hatch  
Green), 1 mile north, is also a  
hamlet.

HORTON, half a mile north-  
east, contains 399 acres, and is a  
chapelry, or hamlet, with 14  
houses; Denstead is 2 miles north,  
in Blean Forest, where also is  
Petty France; Howfield adjoins  
Milton; Nickle is 1 mile north-  
west; Mystole, a mile and a half  
south-west; Underdown, 1 mile  
south; Thruxted, 1 mile south.

**BEKESBOURNE** (or Beakesbourne) is a small parish on the Little Stour, with a station on the Southern railway, 3 miles east-south-east from Canterbury, 59 from London by road and 64½ by railway: it is in the Canterbury division of the county, lathe of St. Augustine, hundred of Bridge, rural district of Bridge-Blean, petty sessional division and county court district of Canterbury, rural deanery of East Bridge and archdeaconry and diocese of Canterbury; it is also partly in the city and county of the city of Canterbury. This parish is a member of the Cinque port of Hastings and was formerly a borough. The church of St. Peter is in the Norman, Early English and later styles, and has a tower containing 6 bells, the gift of Miss Gipps: in the church are memorials to the families of Palmer, Hales, Fagge, Eden and Gardner and various memorial windows: the church was restored in 1882-8, and has 150 sittings. In the centre of the new churchyard is a memorial to the 12 parishioners who fell in the Great War, 1914-18. The register dates from the year 1558. The living is a vicarage, net income £317, with residence, in the gift of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and held since 1928 by the Rev. A. A. Fletcher

Lamplugh M.A. of St. John's College, Cambridge. The Old Palace, an ancient house, was formerly a country residence of the Archbishops of Canterbury. The Ecclesiastical Commissioners and the Marquess Conyngham are the principal landowners. The soil is gravel and chalk; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats and hops. The area is 1,091 acres; the population of the civil parish in 1921 was 332 and in 1931, 319, and of the ecclesiastical parish in 1931, 326.

WELL is a detached hamlet and chapelry district next to Littlebourne, on the west side of the river, formerly belonging to that parish, then annexed to the parish of Ickham, and transferred to Bekesbourne in 1935. The ruins of the chapel may still be seen. The Manor House, usually called Well Court, stood close to the bank of the river and was formerly the property of the Cliffords.

**BISHOPSBOURNE** is a parish on a feeder of the Stour, on the entrance of the Barham Downs, and about half a mile from the Dover road, with a station on the Elham Valley line of the Southern railway, and 2½ miles south from Bekesbourne station on the Chatham and Dover section of that railway, and 4 miles south-east from Canterbury; it is in the Canterbury division of the county, lathe of St. Augustine, hundred of Kinghamford, petty sessional division of Wingham, rural district of Bridge-Blean, county court district of Canterbury, rural deanery of East Bridge, and archdeaconry and diocese of Canterbury. Electricity is available. Water is supplied by the Margate Corporation. The Nailbourne, which runs through the parish, is an intermittent stream, rising in the hills above Folkestone and flowing into the Stour. The church of St. Mary is of flint, in the Early English and later styles, and has a tower containing 4 bells: there is some stained glass, and in the chancel a mural monument with bust, erected in 1632 by Sir W. Cooper kt. to Richard Hooker M.A. (commonly known as "the learned and judicious Hooker"), author of the celebrated "Ecclesiastical Polity"; he was rector of Bishopsbourne from 1595 till his death in 1600; a window was inserted in 1890 in his memory, and in 1911 a lych gate erected: the church was repaired and re-seated in 1872, and contains 215 sittings. The register of baptisms and marriages dates from 1558, burials from 1571. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £493, with residence, in the gift of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and held since 1932 by the Rev. Walter Fletcher Burnside M.A. of Pembroke College, Cambridge, hon. canon of Canterbury; it was formerly united to Barham, but was separated from it in 1846 by Order in Council. Bourne Park is the seat of Maj. Sir John Theodore Prestige. Charlton Park, the seat and property of Lt.-Col. Sir Francis Henry Humphrys G.C.M.G., G.C.V.O., K.B.E., C.I.E. is half a mile south-east, and contains a very fine salon which was built for George IV. Maj. Sir John Theodore Prestige, the Marquess Conyngham and Lt.-Col. Sir Francis Henry Humphrys G.C.M.G., G.C.V.O., K.B.E., C.I.E. are the principal landowners. In Gorsley Wood, on the property of the Marquess Conyngham, are three tumuli, opened in 1882, and found to contain stone chests holding human remains. The soil is loamy; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, oats, barley and hops. The area is 2,018 acres of land and 5 of water; the population in 1921 was 304, and in 1931, 321.

**BRIDGE**, so named from its situation in a valley on the Dover road at a bridge over a feeder of the Stour, is a parish in the rural district of Bridge-Blean, with a station on the Canterbury and Folkestone line of the Southern railway, and is  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles south from Bekebourne station on the same system, and 3 south-east from Canterbury, in the Canterbury division of the county, lathe of St. Augustine, hundred of Bridge and Petham, petty sessional division of St. Augustine's. Canterbury, county court district of Canterbury, rural deanery of East Bridge and archdeaconry and diocese of Canterbury. Gas and electricity are available. Water is supplied by the Margate Corporation. The church of St. Peter is of flint, in the Norman style, with some additions of the Early English period, and has a tower with spire, containing a clock and 4 bells: the windows are stained: within a recess is a recumbent effigy of a man in robes, in low relief: the church was repaired and partly rebuilt about 1860, and affords 350 sittings. The register dates from the year 1565. The living is a vicarage, annexed to the vicarage of Patribourne, joint net yearly value £356, with 33 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Marquess Conyngham, and held since 1897 by the Rev. Hubert Knight M.A. of Christ's College, Cambridge, who resides at Patribourne. In 1920 a cross was erected in the north-east of the churchyard in memory of 13 men of the parish who fell in the Great War, 1914-18. The Methodist church, built in 1894, is of corrugated iron and wood, and seats 150 persons. The principal land-owners are the Marquess Conyngham, who is lord of the manor, and Earl Sondes. The soil is chalky; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats and hops; the area is 1,171 acres; the population in 1921 was 699, and in 1931, 713.

**PATRIXBOURNE** (or Patricksbourne) is a parish and village, pleasantly situated in a healthy country, on the Lesser Stour, three-quarters of a mile from the road from Canterbury to Dover, half a mile south from the Bekesbourne station on the Faversham and Dover section of the Southern railway, and 3 miles south-east from Canterbury; it is in the Canterbury division of the county, lathe of St. Augustine, hundred of Bridge and Petham, rural district of Bridge-Blean, petty sessional division of Home, county court district of Canterbury, rural deanery of East Bridge, archdeaconry and diocese of Canterbury. Gas and electricity are available. Water is supplied by the Margate Corporation. The church of St. Mary, a fine structure of the Norman period, is of flint with stone dressings, and has a tower with spire containing a clock and 3 bells: there are some stained windows and monuments to the Conyngham family: the church has 180 sittings. At the east end of the churchyard is a memorial, erected to six men connected with this parish who fell in the Great War, 1914-18. The register of baptisms and burials dates from the year 1556; marriages from 1560. The living is a vicarage, with that of Bridge annexed, joint net yearly value £356, with 33 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Marquess Conyngham, and held since 1897 by the Rev. Hubert Knight M.A. of Christ's College, Cambridge. Bifrons, the property of the Marquess Conyngham, who is lord of the manor, lay impropiator and chief landowner, now (1940) vacant, stands in a park of 230 acres. Higham, now known as Highland Court, is the seat of Walter Kennedy Whigham esq. The soil is loam; subsoil, chalk and gravel. The chief

crops are hops and wheat. The area is 1,559 acres; the population of the civil parish in 1921 was 232 and in 1931, 217, and of the ecclesiastical parish in 1931, 945.

Cuthbert Graham Clairmonte M.A. of King's College, Nova Scotia, Canada. There is a Methodist church. In the parish are remains of entrenchments. Kenfield Hall, 1 mile north is the residence of
