COLONEL H. G. D. SHUTE.

Colonel Henry Gwynn Deane Shute, D.S.O., died suddenly yesterday morning at the Guards' Club. He entered the club about half-past 11 o'clock and ten minutes later, while he was sitting in the billiard room, he complained of feeling ill. He died before a doctor arrived.

Colonel Shute was the eldest son of General Sir Charles Cameron Shute. He was born on December 4, 1860. He obtained his first commission as second lieutenant in the Coldstream Guards on September 3, 1880, and was promoted lieutenant on July 1 of the following year. During the operations in Egypt in 1882 he served with the second battalion of his regiment, and was present in the action of Tel-el-Mahuta and the battle of Tel-el-Kebir, for which he received the Egyptian medal with clasp and the Khedive's bronze star. He earned a second clasp to his medal by subsequent services with the first battalion during Sir G. Graham's operations against Osman Digna, at Hasheen, the repulse of an attack on a convoy near Tofrek, and at Tamai.

After his return home he devoted himself to study, and gained admission to the Staff College, from which he graduated in 1889. Promoted captain in January, 1891, he served as regimental adjutant from July of that year to December, 1893, and as brigade-major, Home District, from January, 1894, to December, 1896, being promoted major in May, 1897. On the outbreak of the war in South Africa, he went on service with the 2nd Battalion Coldstream Guards and took part in Lord Methuen's advance on Kimberley, being present at Belmont, Enslin, Modder River, and Magersfontein. He was afterwards present throughout operations in the Orange Free State, in the actions at Poplar Grove, Driefontein, Vet River, and Zand River. During May and June, 1900, he was in the Transvaal, and took part in the engagements near Johannesburg, Pretoria, and Diamond Hill. In the later operations east of Pretoria he was present in the action at Belfast.

During November he took part in operations west of Pretoria, and for the two following months was entrusted with the command of a mobile column. From January to November, 1901, he was commandant at Graaf Reinet, and from December, 1901, to the end of hostilities he administered No. 8 Martial Law Area in Cape Colony. Having been twice mentioned in despatches, he was rewarded with the D.S.O. and promotion to a brevet lieutenant-colonelcy. He also received the Queen's medal with six clasps and the King's medal with two clasps. In October, 1903, he was selected by the Secretary for War, Mr. Arnold-Forster, to act as his principal private secretary, and in this position he remained until the end of December, 1904, when he entered upon the duties of Assistant-Adjutant-General, Home District, succeeding in June, 1905, to the post of Assistant-Adjutant and Quarter-Master General, London District, which he held till the end of December, 1908. Since that date he had been on the unemployed list, with good prospects, however, of further employment and promotion.

Colonel Shute married in 1907 Ivy Geraldine, only daughter of Captain Henry Alexander Campbell, Royal East Kent Yeomanry Cavalry.
