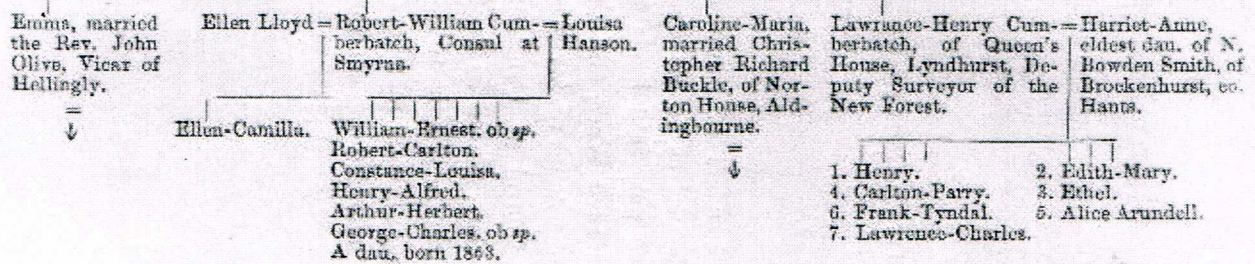
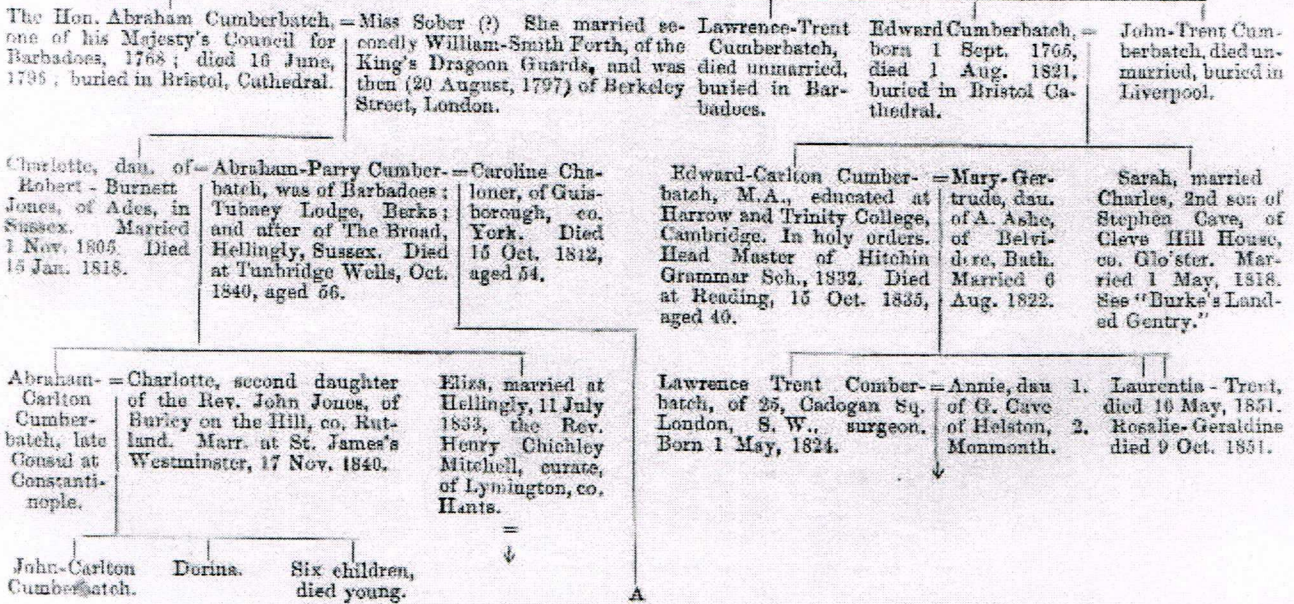
PEDIGREE OF CUMBERBATCH OF BARBADOES.

Arms.—Gules, an eagle displayed between three trefoils, two in chief and one in base, or.

Crest.—An eagle's head couped.

Motto of Abraham Cumberbatch—*No tentes aut perfee.*  
 My authority for these Arms is his book-plate.

Abraham Carlton, assumed the name of Cumberbatch,\* buried in Bristol Cathedral, 1785.



\* " A Petition of Abraham Cumberbatch, heretofore called Abraham Carlton, was presented to the House, and read; setting forth, that Abraham Cumberbatch, late of the parish of St. Andrew, in the Island of Barbadoes, in America, Esq., deceased, by his last will and testament, bearing date the 22nd day of November, 1759, after several legacies therein given, gave all the rest of his estate, with the improvements, additions, and interest to and for the use of the Petitioner, by the name and description of his grandson Abraham Carlton, to be received by him under the trustees appointed by his said will, during the term of his natural life, with remainder to the Petitioner's first and other sons successively, in tail male, with remainders over, upon condition that the Petitioner should take upon him the surname of Cumberbatch; declaring by his said will, that it was his intention that his estate should continue through all limitations thereof, in the name of Cumberbatch; and that the Petitioner, upon the death of the said Abraham Cumberbatch, which happened on or about the 25th day of December, 1759, became possessed of the Premises given him by the said will; and hath taken upon himself, and used, the surname of Cumberbatch; and is desirous that the said surname may be established upon him, and his issue male, by authority of Parliament: And therefore praying the House leave to bring in a Bill for enabling the Petitioner, and his issue male, to take and use the surname of Cumberbatch." 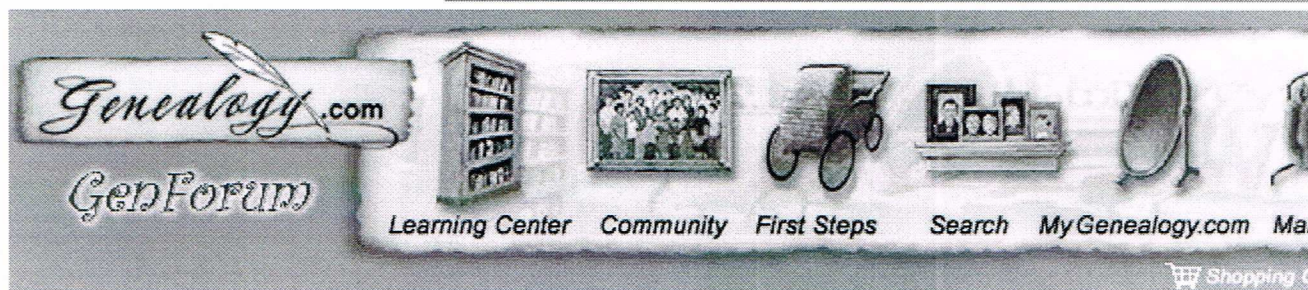
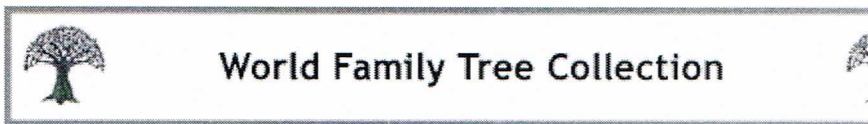

One of the Cumberbatchs in the consular service in Constantinople was well known for his efforts at seeking to abolish the slave trade, or so I've been told. If you have access to the Public Record Office in Kew, London, you should be able to see records from the mission, possible in the FO records. I have never done a proper search. Ironic perhaps that the Cumberbatchs in Barbadoes were so involved in the trade.

By the way, my own grandfather was Hugh Carlton Cumberbatch, so Carlton obviously remained a family name until very recently.

**THE CHOLERA AT SMYRNA.**

TO THE EDITOR OF THE TIMES.

Sir,—If you think proper to insert the enclosed extract of a letter which I have received from Mr. **Cumberbatch**, Her Majesty's excellent and kindhearted Consul at Smyrna, pray do so.

I was at Smyrna in May last, where I had opportunities of seeing how much he is respected and beloved in that place, and where I left a society of most intelligent and agreeable people in the enjoyment of health and happiness.

It is very sad to think how this has been changed by the calamity of a most severe visitation of cholera.

I am not aware whether any subscription has been opened for the sufferers at that place, but I know from other sources how terrible that suffering has been. The Jews, who are numerous and poor, have suffered especially, as they are in a crowded quarter, without means of moving away or receiving medical advice, and at one time died in numbers daily, and could not be buried for several days.

Extract of a letter from Her Majesty's Consul at Smyrna, Mr. **Cumberbatch**, to General Charles Fox :—

“ British Consulate, Smyrna, Aug. 18.

“ I trust you will forgive me when I ask for a donation from you in behalf of some thousands of starving people. I have a private fund for a number of widows and cripples, and there is the ‘General Commission Fund.’ When I tell you that I distribute daily to 1,200 families in my yard, you may imagine that our funds require replenishing. We have collected 1,700*l.* or 1,800*l.*, besides the Greek, Armenian, Jewish, and Ottoman funds, which make up double that amount, so for a fortnight we can swim. If you have any friends who know Smyrna, perhaps they might be induced by you to help us. My bankers are Messrs. Drummond.”

WILLS AND BEQUESTS.

The will and codicil, dated the 8th of March, 1867, and the 26th of June, 1868, of Mr. Abraham Carlton Cumberbatch, C.B., formerly Consul-General at Constantinople, late of No. 46, Lancaster-gate, who died on the 24th of October last at Bingham-house, Richmond, were proved on the 2d inst. by Walter Wyndham Burrell, the acting executor, the personal estate being sworn under £30,000. The testator bequeaths to his wife all his plate, furniture, and household effects absolutely, and the income of the rest of the property over which he has a power of disposal, for life. At her death such property is to go to his two children, Anna Dora and John Carlton. The testator charges his settled estate in the island of Barbadoes with the payment of £3,000 in favour of his said daughter.



## **Cynthia Hill – Athens**

Miss Cynthia Hill and Edward de Jongh were neighbours in the Athens neighbourhood of Psyphico. Miss Hill's mother, Thelma was from the Cumberbatch family who came from Constantinople.

Note: From the Donald Simpson account of Anglican history of Smyrna we have dates of office of two Cumberbatch Consuls. Robert William Cumberbatch 1864-1876 (died in office) and Henry Alfred Cumberbatch (1896-1908). From the Internet we are aware that the same H.A. Cumberbatch was in office as British Consul in Constantinople in 1913. Also from the Internet we know that Gertrude Bell called on the Cumberbatch Smyrna Consul (therefore Henry Alfred) and his wife in 1907 – [www.Gerty.ncl.ac.uk/diaries/d1459.htm](http://www.Gerty.ncl.ac.uk/diaries/d1459.htm)

Miss Hill has a cousin, Mona Lekki living in Norfolk who is the custodian of the family records. In addition Michael Barker, descendant of the Barkers in Smyrna of the 19<sup>th</sup> century and in Egypt till the revolution there, and who died in 2001 had constructed an extensive family tree that through marriage included the Cumberbatches. Miss Hill has a copy of this family tree as well as a collection of family papers. However with succeeding generations having large families, tracing of relatives becomes difficult. Miss Hill's mother had over a hundred cousins over half of which she did not know.

Miss Hill's father Reginald Hill had his own business based in Athens, named R.J & E.J. Hill & Sons, a firm specialising in insurance and import/export he ran with one of the 6 brothers all born in Greece. Reginald Hill also represented the 'The Anglo-Greek Magnesite Company', which worked the mines of the island of Euboea and the Northern Greek province of Macedonia. The Hill family had no Smyrna or Constantinople connections and Miss Hill's great grandfather first came in around 1825 when the Ionian islands of Cephalonia (and 6 others) were under British protection (1814-1864) and administered by British High Commissioners. The story of the first settlement appears to be accidental, as her great-great grandfather, an O'Toole, was left by the British navy in Cephalonia, possibly for health reasons, before fighting the battle of the Nile against the French navy (1798). O'Toole's daughter who is Miss Hill's great-grandmother married a Hill forming the Hill line. The O'Toole line still survives on the island though they have all married Greeks. The family were business-orientated and maintained vineyards for wine production for a while. The Hill school in Athens is unconnected to the family and was an institution established by missionary American Quakers, early in the 19<sup>th</sup> century.

On the Cumberbatch side of her family, Miss Hill knows that of the first Smyrna British Consul, Robert William (1821-1876) married Louisa Hanson, whose family were British and involved with the building of the railways. The second Consul of the family, Henry was born in 1858 and died in 1918 in Beirut. He was one of 12 children of Robert William, though not all the offspring survived till adulthood. He also married a local British lady, Helene Rees and the location of his death could be connected to the fact that the Rees family were important in shipping. Henry had five children and through some of the descendants the Cumberbatch name lives on. The Cumberbatch origin in the Levant is more obscure than the Hill side as it stretches back to the 18<sup>th</sup> century. However Miss Hill is aware that the first Cumberbatch to be posted by the Consular service was Abraham Carlton Cumberbatch but it seems the first posting was in Imperial Russia. It was Miss Hill's great-grandfather who was in the Consulate in Constantinople (H.A.), and her grandfather, Arthur Herbert (1860-1921) was employed by the French tobacco monopoly 'Regie de Tabacs' in Istanbul. He married a Marian Tristram and it was their daughter, Thelma who left the city in the turmoil of 1922 as British occupation of the city was ending, and went to Athens where she met Miss Hill's father.

Miss Hill retains few contacts with the descendants of the Smyrna émigré community in Athens, one of those is a grandson of the Warren family who now lives in Canada.



One of the oldest British families who still live on the island of Evia (Euboea) is the Noel-Baker family (formerly the Bakers), whose settlement goes back to the Ottoman rule of the islands. They are related to the Byron family and still retain the writing desk of Lord Byron.

Note: Lord Byron died not too far away in 1824 at Missolonghi on the island of Cephalonia, suffering fever and exposure while engaged in the Greek struggle of independence. It was only 145 years after his death in 1969, a memorial to Byron was finally placed on the floor of Westminster Abbey whose authorities had refused to allow a burial there.

Philip Noel-Baker was an MP for the city of Derby constituency during the Second World War and many years after, and the son Francis's wife has recently written a book on the family history. This book written in English has been reviewed by the Anglo-Hellenic League.

Note: From the Internet we can access the obituary of Philip J. Noel-Baker, M.P. He was elected to Parliament for the Labour Party in 1929 and remarkably re-elected until 1970, when he retired from politics. He became a minister in the Foreign Office in Clement Attlee's post-World War II government, was named Secretary for Air in 1946, Commonwealth Secretary in 1947-1950 and Minister of Fuel and Power in 1950-1951. In addition he was the 1959 Nobel Peace Prize Laureate for being a life long ardent worker for international peace and cooperation. Born Philip Baker, (1889-1982), he added Noel to his name when he married Irene Noel in 1915. She died in 1956. Also from the Internet we learn, 'Virginia [Woolf in 1906 – the eminent writer 1882-1941] and her party made a detour from the usual tourist route to visit the island of Evvoia (Euboea), where the Noel family had, since 1832, owned an estate called Achmetaga, at modern Prokopion', taken from travel notes. <http://vlachophiles.net/woolf.htm>

Yet another Internet site, notes that Francis Noel-Baker was a regular broadcaster from the Free Greek radio in Egypt to occupied Greece during WWII, who later became a Labour member of Parliament in the British House of Commons, like his father... Francis speaks fluent Greek, and his mother was related to Lord Byron. More info from the estate site, <http://www.elysianholidays.co.uk/candili/practical.htm>

From family tales recollected Miss Hill is aware of waves of British venturers who came to the then commercially rather uninviting land of Greece, but through tenacity against overwhelming odds some made it to success.

### **Mrs Patricia Caridis, Corfu, Greece**

Mrs Caridis is related to Miss Hill in that they are 2<sup>nd</sup> cousins, their grandfathers were brothers. One of these grandfathers was Henry Alfred Cumberbatch who was with the 'Levant Consular Service', the British diplomatic arm that was local and geared to the special relationship with the Ottoman Empire. As was the custom in those days he was regularly moved about the empire as Consul, serving in the various outposts scattered across the Ottoman realm, locations usually indicative of the vital shipping interests of Britain. Apart from Smyrna Mrs Caridis is aware of postings in Ankara, Armenia/Black Sea coast (Batumi?), Sulina (sp?) on the coast of Rumania, and finally Beirut, though he was evacuated from there with the outbreak of WWI, like all British consular staff, and he died in England.

Abraham Carlton Cumberbatch was the original member of the family, Mrs Caridis's great-great granduncle, to arrive in Constantinople early 19<sup>th</sup> century, though not on a consular capacity. He would have been in business, but the nature of the business is now unknown. He still retained his property on the Caribbean island of Barbados where his family had moved to around 1660, and whose income probably allowed him to pursue his hobby of watercolour painting. He clearly was a widely travelled man as Mrs Caridis retains 5 of these paintings, depicting Barbados (2), Smyrna, England and Austria. The Barbados plantation was sold off by later generations after WWI. It was Abraham's younger brother, Robert William, who probably joined him later in the Levant, who entered the consular service.



Business, if at all, was of secondary importance from then onwards as there was work available to various brothers and sons in the Levant.

The island of Corfu on which Mrs Caridis lives was one of the 7 islands of the British administered 'Ionic islands', and the British influence has continued even after the islands joined mainland Greece. One of the more prominent residents of the island in the 1930s were the Durrell s, and Lawrence was the author of 'Prospero's Cell' in 1937. His brother though less well known was also an author, such as his childhood recollections on the island, 'My family and other animals'. He was a zoologist and collected animals for zoos.

I regret I am unable to trace a Lord Chief Justice of Ireland bearing the surname Eyre. F.E. Ball's *The Judges in Ireland, 1221-1921* (1926), which I would normally regard as authoritative, does not mention such a man. It is possible that your source has confused the surname Eyre with the legal phrase "Justices in eyre", who were itinerant judges roughly corresponding to the more modern assize court judges.

Dear Mr. Lloyd,

My son Phillip Graham Eyre has given me your very interesting letter dated 31.8.77 and the genealogical table: I think I could help you with your enquiries as the subject is of great interest to me.

First I have a sumptuously bound book labelled Pedigree of Mrs. James Hugo Greenwell 1797-1821 my great grandmother and we share a common ancestor in her mother and father Edmund Lloyd and Bridget Eyre Salmon. Walpole Eyre had 10 sons and 3 daughters including my father Edward Eyre and his second son

Walpole Lloyd Greenwell had 13 children also, 5 sons, 6 females so you have a lot of Greenwell cousins! Walpole became a Baronet followed by his son Bernard Eyre (died 1939) followed by the present Bart a very good chap called Peter, lives at Butley Abbey Farm, Suffolk and farms: the Greenwell firm of Solicitors descended through James Hugo to Walpole Eyre and then to my father and remained in Marylebone till about 1937/8 and then amalgamated with Neston Rose & Co and I went stock-broking from which I retired 2 or 3 years ago. I don't suppose you want to know anything more of the Greenwells but if you do I can enlarge. But anyway you can find all the Greenwell descendants in Burke, the finest work of fiction in the English language as Oscar Wilde called it. Now Lloyd.

First am I right in supposing you are Christopher Roscoe Seymour and married to someone with the lovely name of Godula? If so you come from Edmund Eyre third son of Edmund 1795. My pedigree stops at Francis Seymour his 2nd son but my father is mentioned as trustee of your uncle Henry Dyson, Clerk in Holy Orders and Cecil Mary his wife with Francis Seymour Lloyd M.D. second. Your ancestor Rosa Lloyd (Skiers) and mine is a well known name to me, I have 3 large scrap-books of great interest belonging to her and some furniture. Her husband was a very distinguished doctor in Paris and she left everything to Walpole Eyre Greenwell who I believe was her godson. There is a very nice pastel of her husband or father-in-law which I gave to my daughter in Bruxelles. She promptly opened the packing at the back and found an account of old Skiers. I can get a copy of this and if you ever go to Brussels I will give you an introduction. Her few bits of furniture were pinched by another daughter and are very nice.

Did you know that your Cumberbatch great grand uncle whose daughter you show as born 1845 had a son-in-law George Henry Clifton, my father was trustee of this marriage in 1872 at Constantinople and they had a daughter Dorina Lockhart who married Sir Thomas Neave Bart of Dagenham and Anglesey. She was a great beauty and known as the Queen of the Bosphorus as a girl, your cousin and mine. I forget when she died but her son is the present Bart and her daughter married a Bulkeley, Squire of Beaumon in Anglesey; in my Lloyd pedigree.

Now there is or was a Colonel Eyre Lloyd my father and uncle Walpole knew - a bit eccentric, he wrote a letter in Nov 1943 which I shall send to you.

Bridget Eyre Lloyd's mother Ann, married under the name of Powell but was really Ann Eyre and ran away with John Salmon. Being a Wiltshire Eyre both the Lloyds and the Greenwells appear to have been fascinated with this connection and perpetuated it to the present day. My notes on the Edmund Eyre Lloyds show 12 children. Martin John married a Miss Timperon (odd name) who died in Depden and then married a cousin in law Mrs. Collett daughter of Sam Webb and then they all died at

Edmund's friend had the appointment at Constantinople. (This may be a reference to Ellen's future husband or perhaps Abraham Carleton Cumberbatch)

On the 3rd October 1843 Ellen Lloyd to Robert William Cumberbatch, both resident at Fern Grove, Winkfield. Father's names Abraham Parry Cumberbatch and Edmund Lloyd. Witnesses: Langford Lovell Hodge, Edmund Lloyd, Martin John Lloyd M.A., Thos Fred Hart and Georgina Fanny Ross.

25.2.1845. A daughter, Ellen Camilla Mary Ann Cumberbatch, who was baptised on the 4th April at St. Mark's Church, Chiddingley, Sussex.

15.3.1845. Ellen Cumberbatch died at Chiddingley of puerperal fever and was buried at St. Mark's Church, East Hoathely, Sussex.

Her tomb is in the south east corner of the graveyard, 2-3 feet from a path. The tomb is about 6' long, 2.5' wide and 2.5' high. It reads, "Sacred to the memory of Ellen the beloved wife of Robert William Cumberbatch of Chiddingley in this County Esq., who departed this life ---- " and the remainder is indecipherable being covered by moss.

Robert William Cumberbatch went to Constantinople on 1.6.1845 as secretary to his half brother Abraham Carleton Cumberbatch, the Consul General until 22.5.1855. He became Acting Second Consul 25.5.1855-30.6.1856, third Vice Consul to September 1857 and was appointed Consul at Berdiansk, Sea of Azoff 12.1.1858. He went to Smyrna 25.4.1864. Appointed Post Office Agent, Smyrna 26.9.1872.

14.4.1853. Married Louisa Grace Hanson who was the eldest daughter of Charles Simpson Hanson, merchant banker of Constantinople. Their children were:-

## CUMBERBATCH DESCENDANTS

Ellen Camilla Mary Anne, daughter of Robert W. and Ellen Cumberbatch, born 25.2.1845, went to Constantinople, date unknown, with her father.

31.7.1848. (From R.W.C. at Constantinople) We are suffering greatly from the heat, the thermometer is generally 86 degrees in the shade. The cholera still continues in some localities. The deaths at Jassy during 40 days amounted to 12,000, the

number is now under 40 per day. My brother has taken a very nice house with a garden in the adjoining Turkish Quarter which will serve for a summer residence..... this privilege has lately been granted by the Sultan on account of the demand and scarcity of houses since the late fire.

26.10.1850. (Fanny Hart writes) Poor little Ellen!! I am as sorry for the poor girl as you are but certainly will not be the first to make advances to Robert's family especially as I have too many other claims upon me.

14.11.1872. Ellen Camilla M. A. Cumberbatch married George Henry Clifton at the British Consulate General, Constantinople by Sir Phillip Francis H.B.M's Consul General and Judge. The union was witnessed by Mr. Cookson and Mr. C.S. Hanson.

14.12.1872. The marriage was solemnised at the Consulate Chapel at Smyrna according to the Church of England. Witnessed by Robert W. Cumberbatch father of the bride.

George Henry Clifton was born in Kennington 12th February, 1826, the eldest child of George James Clifton and Mary Revans. He qualified as a Solicitor and went to Constantinople shortly after the end of the Crimean War where he set up in practice in connection with the British Consular Court. Before he met Ellen he married in 1862 Helena Jane Hanson, younger sister of Robert William Cumberbatch's wife Louisa. After giving birth to 2 children Helena died in childbirth in 1866. It is not known for what reason he was in Liverpool in 1897 but he died there, at the Tue Brook Villa, 29th October and was buried in the West Derby Cemetery. His Will proved in August, 1897 shows his being 'of Candilli on the Bosphorus and Galata in Constantinople'. The value of his estate was £2268.11.6d. His widow, Ellen C.M.A. Clifton continued to reside in the house known as the 'Yali' (i.e. the Big House) with her 3 daughters until they all married when, following the death in 1909 of her stepson, Charles Plummer Clifton, the house was sold. It was burned down during W.W.1. following the sinking of a small oil tanker in the Bosphorus but in April 1971 the stone built house, upon which the main house had been erected, was still clearly visible with a more recent building upon it.

1913-14 Mrs. Clifton was living in rented accommodation at 10 Woodford Villas, Mannamead, Plymouth with the motherless children of her second daughter Mildred Marshall, when she died on 1st December, 1914. She was buried in the graveyard of Noak Hill Church, Essex, the church built and used by the Neave family of Dagnam Park 1½ miles to the south east.

The children of the marriage were:-

1. George Montague born 30 September, 1873, died of typhoid, fever 17th December, 1896 and was buried in the British Cemetery, Haidar Pacha which adjoins the British Cemetery at Scutari for casualties of the Crimean War. Unmarried.

3. Ellen Claude Zoe, born at Candilli 30th March, 1875 married 20th January, 1909 at Borstal, Kent, Evelyn Richard Townsend, 7th son of Dr. Edward R. Townsend of Cork, born 7th November, 1877. He was at that time a Surgeon R.N.; during W.W.1. he carried out pioneer work in the production of arsenic and its effects on the health of submarine crews, as when submerged the sulphuric acid batteries contained traces of arsenic. He died a Surgeon Captain 4th August, 1925 at Gosport and was buried in St. Mark's Churchyard at Alverstoke. His wife died at Emsworth 2nd September, 1955.

Dear Mr. Lloyd,

I was delighted to receive your phone call on Wednesday and to learn that you have unearthed so much information about our common ancestors, the Lloyds of Harley Street. I shall be only too glad to co-operate with you and to share what I have found about the family, their ancestors and descendents.

I became interested in geneology in 1963 and found that research into the past was a wonderful antidote to the pressures of modern life. Whenever things became too oppressive in London a few days sojourn amongst Parish Registers or in a County Record Office worked a cure.

However after my early retirement in 1970 I switched my researches into the History of British Campaign Medals, not who received them but their origin, institution, design and production and so far I have typed over a million words and have hardly reached the halfway mark. It makes a change to revert to geneology and my records are easily accessible.

Before branching out into great detail I think it would be best to confine myself to an indication of what I have for in this way we may be able to avoid copying out for each other details that we commonly possess. What a pity you did not contact the Somerset R.O. earlier, re the Salmon family for then we might have got together sooner and saved you from duplicating what I had already done.

First I will endeavour to deal with the specific points raised in your letter of 19 July.

**Edmund Lloyd 1.** I have no knowledge of the Sundridge origin. I found at the Soc. Gen. an entry - 1731 Edmund, son of William Lloyd bapt 10 Oct, St. George's, Queen's Square, Holborn.

**Richard Waring Lloyd.** I too have drawn a blank. Partnership with James Greenwell commenced 1811/12.

**Arms.** Your sketch does not resemble any of the Lloyd Arms quoted in Burke's General Armoury. Apparently Timperon did not bear Arms.

**H.E.I.C. Service.** You will find details of Graham's Army Service attached. When next in the India Office I will have a look for Arthur in the Bombay Navy.

**Robert Carleton Lloyd.** I feel certain that R.C.L. (born 1854) derived his christian names from Robert William Cumberbatch - ? Godfather. Abraham Cumberbatch who went from Bristol to Barbados in 1705 died 1753 leaving a large estate and no heir, bequeathed his fortune to his grandson, Abraham Carleton on condition he took the name of Cumberbatch.

**Cumberbatch Family.** I have full details of the Bristol family from 1608 onwards but only R.W.C., his wife Ellen and daughter.

- a. Bristol/Barbadian family, now very few males.
- b. Descendants of Barbados slaves who are black and adopted the name in 1838 - many.
- c. Descendants of union between sundry planters and slaves.
- d. An almost unrelated group in Staffs/Cheshire/Lancs/Yorks.

Press & Huntingdon, Bedford & Peterborough  
Gazette of Saturday, April 10th, 1853.

### New Sampford, Essex.

On Thursday the 7th instant the small and romantic village of New Sampford became the scene of unwonted festivity on the occasion of the marriage of Miss Emily King, second daughter of the late Robert King Esq., with Oliver Wimburn Lloyd Esq. About half past eleven the bridegroom accompanied by his best friends Harvey Tower and Talbot King Esq., entered the Parish Church and shortly afterwards the bride conducted by her uncle Lord Dorchester and attended by her bridesmaids Miss Eustace and the Misses King, sisters of the bride. This fair and youthful lady was most elegantly attired in a dress of white moire antique a deux jupons trimmed with Brussels point lace, a magnificent veil of the same and a wreath of orange blossoms and white Blanksia roses. The bridesmaids were similarly attired in white. The ceremony was impressively performed by the Rev. Robert Eustace, cousin of the bride. As the cortege left the sacred edifice a most gay and animated scene presented itself. The approach to the Church was decorated with flowers and evergreens and crowded with joyous faces all anxious to obtain a glimpse of the fair young bride; and at this moment the sun shone forth brilliantly, the bells pealed a merry tune and all beamed with happiness on the opening prospects of the youthful couple.

At two o'clock the bridal party about 30 in number sat down to an elegant breakfast given by Lady Eustace in honour of the event; and in the course of the afternoon the happy pair left Sampford Hall in a travelling chariot and four for Depden in Suffolk, the seat of the Rev. Martin John Lloyd, uncle of the bridegroom, there to spend the honeymoon.

**Robert Carleton Lloyd**  
10.7.1854 - 24.2.1908

Born at Fortsbray, Kent. Charles Townsend (a descendant of Ellen Cumberbatch born Lloyd) thinks that Robert obtained the name Carleton from Robert Carleton who changed his name to Cumberbatch. Apparently Abraham Cumberbatch, who went from Bristol to Barbados in 1705, died in in 1753 leaving a large estate and no son to inherit. He bequeathed his fortune to his grandson Robert Carleton on condition that he changed his name to Cumberbatch. He thinks Robert William Cumberbatch was R.C. Lloyd's godfather.

1866. Robert was admitted to Bury St. Edmunds Grammar School but only stayed one or two terms.

24.2.1908. Died in Hackney Infirmary from cancer of the throat and was buried at Plaistow, near Bow.

Francis S. Lloyd wrote:- We know little about Robert except that he led an aimless and wasted life.

Dear Christopher,

Following my phone call to you on the 20th I have put together all that I have in type at the present and I shall now make an effort to complete the other two pages re the CLIFTON descendants and perhaps add a bit about myself.

On looking through my file I see that apparently I have never acknowledged your letter of 26th July - please accept my apologies for this oversight. At last I am doing that for which you asked and enclose the nine letters from Ellen to Rosa - I should like these now to be incorporated with those that you possess and for the whole of them to be offered to some Archive for preservation.

In 'FAMILY' I find the piece about the Cumberbatch Descendants on pp 79-80 to be very misleading - I cannot imagine that I provided the original data. The principal errors are

(a) that Ernest Hamilton Clifton married twice - had 1 son by 1st marriage and 1 dau by the second.

(2) Dorina Lockhart Neave had 2 sons and 2 daus (Mrs Parsons and Lady Williams-Bulkeley, all of whom are alive with issue. I suggest that you copy the details from 'Burke' (under Neave). My mother (her elder sister) always said, after the publication of her first book 'Twenty-six years on the Bosphorus' (1933) that she talked a lot of rubbish about her having been called 'Queen of the Bosphorus'.

Thank you for your recent letter and for the extra sheets, which I have duly inserted with three exceptions - both 'Lloyd Family Sheet 1' and 'Parish Church of St Marylebone' are on paper on which the Ts have been badly cut, leaving the heads thereof about one half of their normal depth; this leads to problems with their retention by the rings; I shall be glad to have your guidance as to how I can overcome this. In 'Letters' you recommend that 'Somerset House' and 'Covent Garden' should both be at p.3 - I think that the latter should be elsewhere.

15.3.1835 The cause of the death of Ellen was puerperal fever, not peripheral fever.

You have misspelling re R.W.C. - his post was at BERDIANSK not Derdianek.

I would favour deleting the names of the children - for after all they were not of LLOYD descent. Instead I would add after 'Banker of Constantinople' the words 'the first father-in-law of G.H.Clifton' and follow this with the brief statement that they produced '6 sons and 4 daughters'.

CUMBERBATCH DESCENDANTS

p.79 I would favour deleting so much of p.79 as follows the words 'Cumberbatch father of the bride' as well as the whole of the text on p.80 and substituting:

George Henry CLIFTON was born in Kennington 12th February 1826, the eldest child of George James Clifton and Mary Revans. He qualified as a Solicitor and went to Constantinople shortly after the end of the Crimean War where he set up in practice in connection with the British Consular Court. It is not known for what reason he was in Liverpool in 1897 but he died there, at Tue Brook Villa, 29th October and was buried in West Derby Cemetery. His Will, proved in August 1897, shows his being 'of Candili on the Bosphorus and Galata in Constantinople'. The value of his estate was £2268.11s.6d. His widow, Ellen C.M.A.Clifton, continued to reside in the house, known as the Yali (ie the Big House) with her three daughters until they had all married when, following the death in 1909 of her stepson, Charles Plumer Clifton, the house was sold. It was burned down during World War I following the sinking of a small oil tanker in the Bosphorus but in April 1971 the stone-built boat house, upon which the main house had been erected, was still clearly visible with a more recent building upon it.

In 1913-14 Mrs Clifton was living in rented accommodation at 10 Woodford Villas, Mannamead, Plymouth, with the motherless children of her second daughter, Mildred Marshall, when she died on 1st December 1914. She was buried in the graveyard of Noak Hill Church, Essex, the Church built and used by the Neave family of Dagnam Park 1½ miles to the south east.

The 2 sons and 3 daughters of this marriage were:-

George Montague CLIFTON, born 30 Sep 1873, died of typhoid fever 17th Dec 1896 and was buried in the British Cemetery, Haidar Pacha, which adjoins the British Cemetery at Scutari for casualties of the Crimean War. When seen in April

Ellen Clauda Zoe CLIFTON. Born at Candilli 30th March 1875. Married 20th January 1909 at Borstal, Kent, Evelyn Richard TOWNSEND, 7th son of Dr Edward R. Townsend of Cork, born 7th November 1877. He was at that time a Surgeon R.N.; during World War 1 he carried out pioneer work into the production of arsene in submarines when submerged due to the use in their batteries of sulphuric acid containing traces of arsenic and its effects on the health of their crews. He died, a Surgeon Captain, 4th August 1925 at Gosport and was buried in St Mark's Churchyard at Alverstoke. They had issue:

Charles Edward Clifton TOWNSEND TD, B.Sc(Eng), C.Eng., F.I.C.E. born at Sheerness 12th December 1909, educated at Epsom College 1923-26 and Loughborough College 1926-30. ### Our Roots

Many people believe that rum was being produced on the Mount Gay Estate in Barbados from as early as 1663. However, the first surviving written evidence of production is a legal deed dated 20th February, 1703. This document, which lists the property as well as certain equipment essential to the manufacture of rum, confirms that rum production was well underway at Mount Gay by 1703, making it the oldest producer of rum in Barbados, and almost certainly in the world.

### The Early Years

The Mount Gay Estate lies on a ridge in the northernmost parish of St. Lucy in Barbados. In the 1600's this spot was known as Mount Gilboa, and contained several small sugar plantations named after their respective owners.

In the early 18th century, William Sandiford bought and consolidated a 280 acre parcel of land and renamed it Mount Gilboa. The land passed through his son, who sold it to John Sober in 1747. Sober and his son, Cumberbatch, operated the land from England as absentee landlords, eventually hiring his good friend, Sir John Gay Alleyne, to manage the flourishing estate in 1787.

In 1801, after Sir John's death, Cumberbatch renamed the plantation Mount Gay in honour of Sir John Gay Alleyne, and the Sober family continued to run the property until 1860.

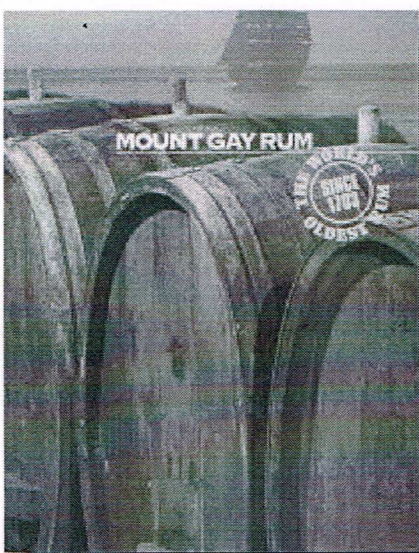

# OUR HISTORY

*"Two stone windmills... one boiling house with seven coppers, one curing house and one still house."*

This confirms that rum production was well underway by 1703, making Mount Gay Rum the oldest rum in Barbados, and more importantly, the world.

## The Early Years

The Mount Gay Rum Estate lies on a ridge in the northernmost parish of Barbados (St. Lucy). In the 1600's this spot was known as Mount Gilboa and was divided into several small, separately owned sugar plantations. They were named after their respective owners: Tyrell, Jemmott, Jones, Pickering and Grey.

Then, in the early 18th century, William Sandiford bought most of the land, consolidating it into a 280 acre plantation he renamed Mount Gilboa. It was passed on to his son, who sold it in 1747 to John Sober.

Sober and his son Cumberbatch were both absentee landlords, spending most of their time in England. By 1787, Cumberbatch needed someone to manage the affairs of the flourishing Mount Gilboa estate. He chose his good friend, Sir John Gay Alleyne.

In 1801, after Sir John's death, Cumberbatch honored his friend by renaming the plantation Mount Gay Rum (a Mount Alleyne already existed at the time). The Sober family continued to run the property until 1860.

## The Dawn of the Modern Era

The next major influence on the Mount Gay Rum Plantation was Aubrey Ward, a prominent businessman who bought the estate outright in the early 1900's. He introduced new methods to meet the increasing demand for Mount Gay Rum, while strictly maintaining its traditional character.

Along with his business partner and marketing specialist John Hutson, he introduced Mount Gay Rum to the international market. These efforts were continued by his son Mr. Darnley DaCosta Ward until his death in 1989.

## Toward the Future

The Ward family continues to be involved with Mount Gay Rum distilleries, majority interest of which was acquired by the Remy Cointreau Group in 1989. This has led the company in a new direction and allowed it to benefit from the French multinational's extensive distribution and international marketing acumen. Mount Gay Rum now stands poised for an exciting future, well on the way to being discovered by connoisseurs of fine spirits around the world.

I found at the Society of Genealogists some more information:

Firstly, the Holy Trinity is indeed the one in Brompton Rd. Or as Chris points out, not on Brompton Road, but tucked out of sight ! I found a transcript of the monumental inscriptions in the churchyard. I found none for the cemetery, which is incomplete, nor any inside the church. The new info is that Gertrude Cumberbatch d. 15 Oct 1866 aged 10 mos. Also all Cumberbatch spellings are the same. This transcript was conducted in 1933 by Rev. T.C. Dale and Mr R.G. Payne and was filed under London, Middlesex. QED.

Secondly, I found a bunch of Cumberbatchs that I think we are all interested in. They are recorded in the Family History of "The Lloyds of Harley Street" which is compiled in 3 volumes. I think that the volumes represent the progression of knowledge on the Lloyd family.

I have attached scanned images of what I copied and I have tried to keep them small and yet useful. Still due to Hotmail limitations I must send you more than one email.

The attachments are attached in no particular order but I have tried to include the SoG references for your information and to help you assemble the complete picture.

Usual health warnings - these are not transcripts of primary sources but rather the collection of memories and perhaps speculations and even inventions of the people included.
