


Your voice in Parliament



Eighteen Years' Work

During the eighteen years of Conservative Government, the income of an average family in this country has **risen** by a **hundred pounds per week over and above inflation** because of the economic growth which stems from a healthy economy.

Britain has pulled out of the recent recession with our **economy growing** and **unemployment falling**, in contrast to most of continental Europe where joblessness continues to mount. The inflation which ravaged Britain in the 1960s, '70s and early '80s has been defeated.

This Government has **doubled the number of student places**, so that one third of the rising generation has the chance to go to university, compared to only one in eight in 1979.

The number of people treated by the **NHS** each day has risen by an **extra 3,000** compared to three years ago. The number of hip operations performed each day has doubled since 1979.

Since Michael Howard became Home Secretary, the Government has taken the kind of tough action on crime for which Julian Brazier has been calling, for many years. This includes **automatic life sentences** for repeat rapists, heavier penalties for other crimes, the confiscation of burglars' assets and a crackdown on squatting - at last crime is falling.

Don't let Labour ruin it.

Last time we had a Labour Government they were elected on promises to improve public services. In fact public spending ran out of control, <u>prices</u> <u>doubled in just five years</u>, and <u>Britain went bankrupt</u>. Labour had to beg for a loan from the IMF whose conditions included stopping hospital building, cutting nurses' pay in real terms two years running and halving the capital spending programme on sewers. The result was the <u>Winter of Discontent</u>.

Could it happen again? Just look at Lab/Lib Kent County Council; in just four years they have doubled the County's borrowing, spent all the reserves, slashed services, increased overheads and are now saying they need a ten percent increase in funding from Government, compared to last year, just to maintain services. Our council tax bills are suffering as a result.

YOUR VOICE IN PARLIAMENT

If re-dected as your MP, I pledye mysely to depend British sovereignty. I will vote against the abolition of the Pound and resolutely oppose enlarged powers for Brussels. The European Union should be a common morbet not a common government.

I shall continue to support sensible Conservative Cronomic policies which underprin rising living standards, essential public services such as Health and Education — and small businesses.

We need justher tough nearnes against criminals. They, not their victims, should be again. If the Conservatives are re-elected we shall re-introduce our Bill (blocked by Labour and the Liberal's only last month) which would force judges to impose long sentences on repeat burylors.

Christian values in the Law, the tax system and our schools to encourage responsible citizenship among our young people. They are our juture.

- Labour are committed to abolishing key immigration controls, including removing checks on employers who recruit illegal immigrants. Conservatives believe in firm but fair immigration controls and equality for all British citizens before the Law that is the way to achieve racial harmony.

- Not all KCC councillors seem to have noticed the shortage of funds. One Labour councillor did <u>fourteen overseas trips</u> last year, from Philadelphia to Hungary.







In his spare time he has carried on the family tradition as an officer in the Territorial Army for thirteen years, six of them with Airborne Forces.


