1. Undoubtedly a  
Roman bridge, perhaps  
of wood - (cf. Brugge,  
Bruges - same name, site,  
a bridge for a Roman  
road to cross a river)
2. No village in Domesday,  
but we looked it up to  
find that it was a  
"Hundred of Brige" -  
i.e. the meeting point  
for the villages on the  
"Burne". Bishop's house

and left him for dead near the site of our post office. Afterwards he disappeared in disgrace but returned after many years as as revered & famous Captain in the army. His name, Christopher Applegate, so christened because his father & old Marlborough were great friends & gave their sons, born in the same year, the same name.
