

BARGROVE relationships, established from Visitation of Kent, 1619, D.N.B., J.M. Cooper's Memorial Inscriptions of Cant. Cath. & J.M. Cooper's Lives of the Deans of C'by

John B. = Alice Kennard

Robert, of Bridge = Joanna, dau of John Gilbert of Sandwich

Anne = Robt. Naylor
 Alice = Robt. Turney
 Ingle (= Angel) John Boys, later Dean of C.

Thomas clergyman
 Richard
 Robert = widow Wood
 Dorcas = George dau of John Mark

Jane dau of Egidius Crouche, of London = John, built Bifrons

Elizabeth, 1618 = Isaac (1586-1643) Dean of C'by
 dau of John Dering, & cousin of Sir Edward Dering.

Robert aged 19 (in 1619) (?)
 John (c. 1610-1680) Canon of Canterbury = (1665) Francis Osborne, widow, dau of Sir John Wild.

Joanna
 Jana
 Sarah
 Anna ("ob. virgo") presumably "died unmarried".

Bargrave's known to have been at KSC :-

1. Richard KS 1598-1601 (could just be the Richard who was Dean Isaac's brother)
2. John KS 1623-26 (The Canon, Collector, etc.)
3. John, called Senior, KS 1631-34
4. Thomas, called Junior, KS 1631-32
5. Thomas (almost certainly Dean Isaac's son) KS 1634-40
6. Robert KS 1642
7. Robert KS 1674-79

J.M. Cooper, Lives of Deans of Canterbury, thinks Isaac B. was probably at K.S.C.

numerous children, mostly died young (perhaps in Cath)
 See Cooper: John RIP 1625
 Isaac " 1626
 Henry " 1636
 & Jane " 1630

But survived:

a niece of Sir Henry Wolton. Thomas was exor. of Sir H.W.'s will. = Thomas Elizabeth = Robert (1628-1661, died in Surinam) 3rd son. dau of Robt. Turner, of Canterbury

 Isaac RIP 1663 infant
 Elizabeth = Tuckwell, Fr. Turner, of London

There is an interesting (17th) report by John Bargrave printed
in Arch. Cant. vol. XXXVIII. pp 29-44, where
he calls Thomas his Cousin + pupil. Dean
Isaac asked in 1639 for permission for Thomas (his son)
to study in Amsterdam, which connects quite well with
1634-40 dates of the KSC Thomas, with the fact that John
Bargrave did teach on the Continent.

I haven't seen the Memorial of John Bargrave
prefixed to the Camden Society's edn. of J.B.'s Pope
Alexander VII, by Canon Robertson (1867). There
could be information there not transcribed in the DNB.

In general, only lists of Kings' scholars exist for these
years, so any Bargrave communes would not be
recorded (except by accident). Dean Isaac's likely years as a
schoolboy are not completely covered by the records, so
he could have been a Kings' scholar for 2 or 3 years, or
a commune (in large): I don't know why Cooper
thinks it likely that he was at K.S.C., except on general
likelihood. The name, by the way, is often spelt Barger,
Bargroe, etc. as well as Bargrave, in the various records.
