

We are informed that the pernicious practice of British subjects infusing the wips and merchandizes of their enemies, will, in any future war, be prohibited under very severe penalties.

We hear that all the marching regiments on the English establishment are ordered to be reviewed separately by their respective officers, and to make a due return thereof to the war-office on or before the first of August next.

We also hear that a general survey of the navy is ordered to be made forthwith, and a due return made thereof to the Lords of the Admiralty with all convenient speed; to which end on Tuesday next the proper superior officers will be appointed by the Lords of the Admiralty.

We are credibly informed, that advice has been received of four French men of war, having lately sailed from Brest, for the coast of Africa.

Of late a number of counterfeit guineas have been put off, by means of new shillings of George the 3d. with the scepters raised; they are only gilt shillings; and, where suspicion prevails, the cheat is soon discovered.

They write from Newport in the Isle of Wight, that their corn markets have lately been cheaper than for a twelve-month last past, and that provisions in general are very reasonable, both as to butchers meat and poultry.

We hear that, in consequence of the excessive high price of lottery tickets, a set of monied gentlemen intend to open an office for the insurance of tickets in the ensuing lottery, at the full value such tickets shall be entitled to, from the wheel; the price of insurance 12 l. a ticket; by which means the adventurer will have his ticket at 12 l. which already, at the present exorbitant rate, will cost 14 l. 6 s. and the insurer, for every thousand tickets, will, at an average, gain two thousand pounds.

It is said that at the next meeting of Parliament, a patriotic member intends to move for an alteration in the mode of raising the revenue.

It is said that the export trade of Jersey and Guernsey will be regulated in the same manner as that of the Isle of Man, which will occasion a considerable increase in the revenue.

We hear that a number of acres of waste land will speedily be lotted out, to be sown with hemp, in order to try the effects of its culture in England.

We are informed that a rupture has happened between two Noblemen, which will open a scene wherein the public is deeply interested.

A fraudulent scheme of bankruptcy has just been discovered at Amsterdam, in which four capital Jews are highly interested.

A number of journeymen weavers have actually formed themselves into a partnership, to make silks on their own account, in order to supply the shops.

The following is handed about as the **SPEECH** made by a Great Lawyer at the Time of the Reversal of an **OUTLAWRY**.

I have now gone through the several errors assigned by the Defendant, and which have been ingeniously argued, and confidently relied on, by his Counsel at the Bar: I have given my sentiments upon them, and if upon the whole, after the closest attention to what has been said, and with the strongest inclination in favor of the Defendant, no arguments which have been urged, no cases which have been cited, no reasons that occur to me, are sufficient to satisfy me in my own mind and judgment, that this Outlawry should be reversed, I am bound to affirm it.—And here let me make a pause.

Many arguments have been suggested, both in and out of Court, upon the consequences of establishing this outlawry, either as they may affect the Defendant, as an individual, or the public in general: As to the first, whatever they may be, the Defendant has brought them upon himself; they are inevitable consequences of law arising from his own act; if the penalty, to which he is thereby subjected, is more than a punishment adequate to the crime he has committed, he should not have brought himself into this unfortunate predicament, by flying from the justice of his country; he thought proper to do so, and he must taste the fruits of his own conduct, however bitter and unpalatable they may be; and although we may be heartily sorry for any person who has brought himself into this situation, it is not in our power, God forbid it ever should be in our power, to deliver him from it; we can't prevent the judgment of the law by creating irre-

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pend of the commission; at the same time it must add a heavy charge to government, in fitting out another frigate for the particular purpose of serving a party.
