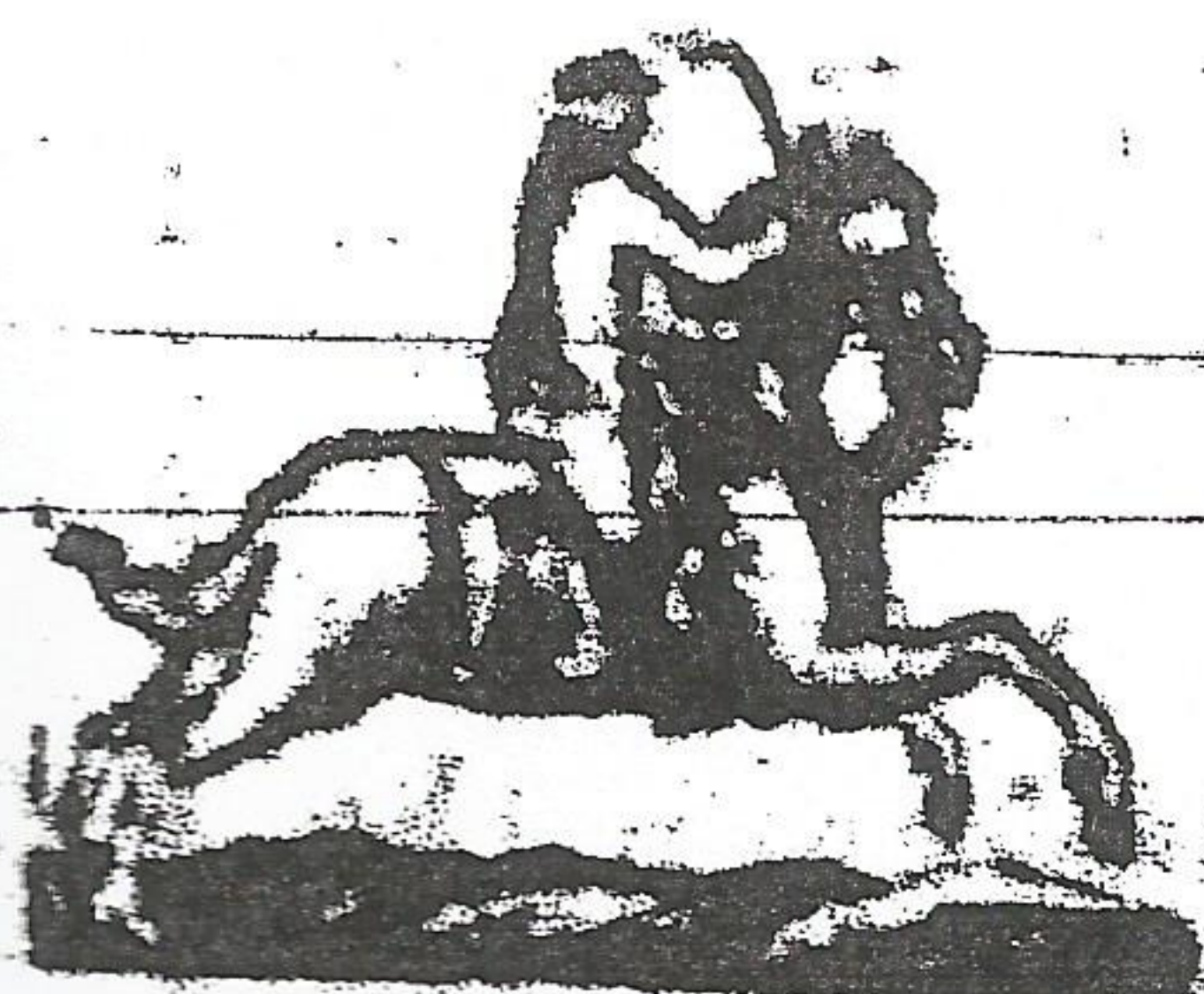

"That certain emissaries of power (among whom some lawyers, had industriously propagated about the city, in order to intimidate and prevent the independent citizens from signing the petition; that a few of the most considerable would be called before the House of Commons and thrown into prison.—And that thus threatening the people of England, for signing a dutiful petition to their Sovereign, was the most glaring and violent attack on the privileges of Englishmen, and the utmost demonstration of the existence of every grievance contained in the petition.

We hear that the spirit of enquiry, which is raised on account of an article in the petition of the Livery of London, regarding the Paymaster will occasion many other examinations of a similar nature.

Among the other enquiries into the long detaining public money in the hands of private persons, the very long and unaccountable delay of the payment of the Havannah prize money, will be one.

It is also hoped by many particulars, unnecessary expences made by the Board of Works, will be likewise made an object of enquiry, in order that the civil list may not be again brought in arrear.

which Mrs. Lott, standing on a stool, was fastened by the neck, when the stool was taken away, she hung about a quarter of an hour till she was quite dead: a chain was then turned round her body, and properly fastened by staples to the post, when a large quantity of faggots being placed round her, and set on fire, the body was consumed to ashes. She was very sensible of her crime, and died entirely penitent. The man did not betray any remarkable concern for his approaching end. It is computed there were 5000 persons attending the execution.

We are informed that Buss presented a petition to the judge, begging that part of his sentence might be reversed, which condemned his body to be dissected and anatomiz'd; this, on consideration of his not being the actual murderer, was (as is usual in such cases) granted, and his body was permitted the rites of burial. We are likewise inform'd on good authority, that on being entreated to make a confession, he answered, *His crimes he had confessed to God, but never would to man;* tho' it was afterwards reported, that on being again requested, just before he suffer'd execution, he answered in an angry tone, *Guilty enough.* Our correspondent further adds, that amidst all the scenes of distress he had ever been witness to, nothing had been equal to the agonizing of the unhappy woman, when bath'd in tears and uttering the most piercing lamentations, she kneeled down by the bedside and prayed in the most ardent manner for the divine protection and preservation of the helpless infant that with smiles of innocence looked on her, which she was going to be separated from, leaving it (as she observed) to become an orphan, friendless and exposed to all the sad variety of ills which her misconduct had entailed upon it. Such was the tragical exit of this unhappy woman, the former part of whose life was spent in a becoming manner, till excited by her wicked confederate, she suffered her reason to fall a sacrifice to passion at the forfeiture of her life.

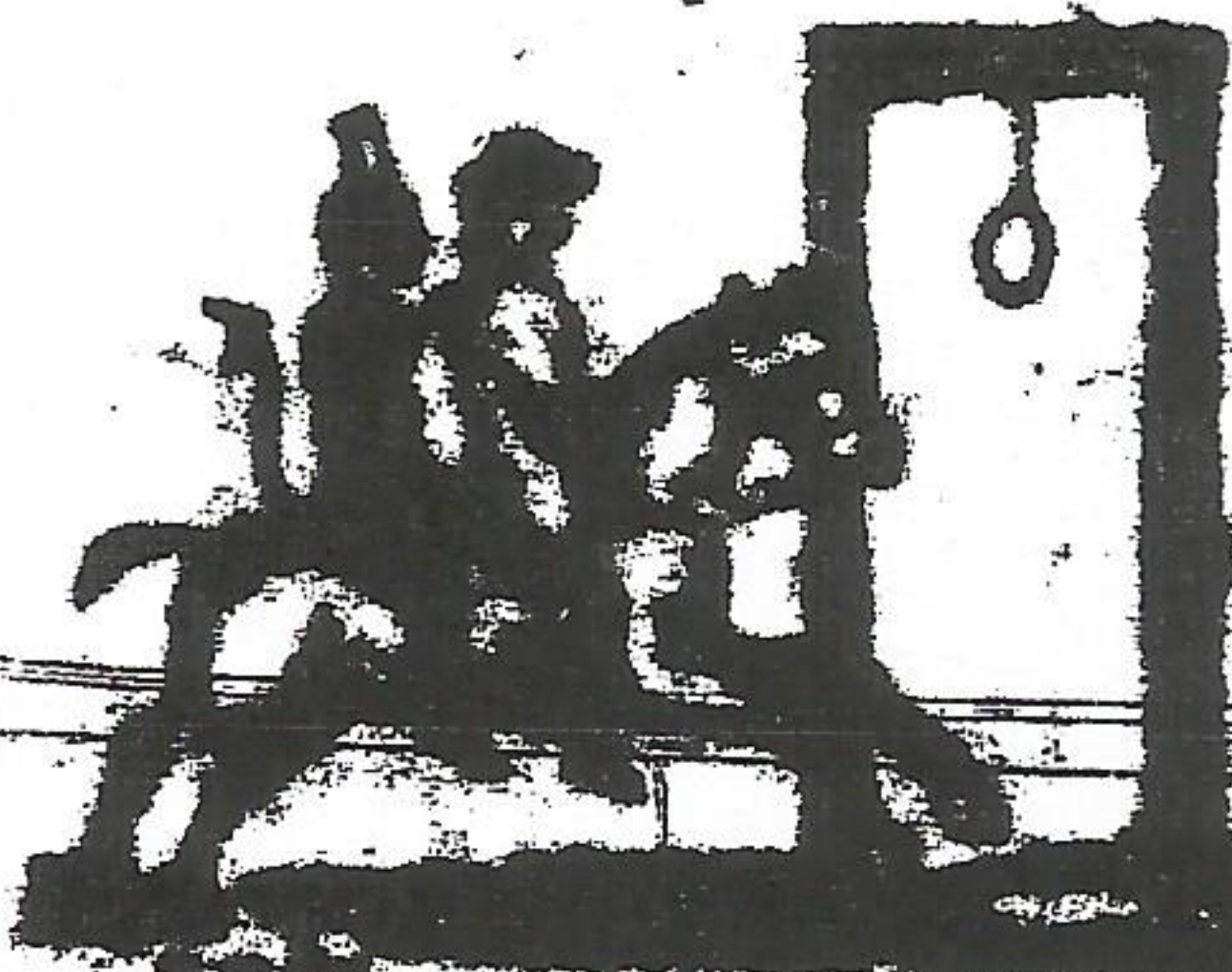

Benjamin Buss, convicted also of the murder

omized.—The behaviour of Mrs. Lott, dur-  
ing her confinement, has been serious, de-  
cent, and resign'd. She was convicted prin-  
cipally on her own declaration, and the con-  
fession she sign'd, soon after her husband was  
poisoned: She was much affected during the  
whole of her trial, particularly at the time of  
her child being brought into court, to be  
suckled, which was twice repeated in the  
course of her trial, in order, it is supposed,  
to excite the compassion of the jury; and at  
the time of her receiving sentence, so great  
was the agonies she seemed to suffer, as drew  
tears from almost every body present; since  
when, with becoming fortitude and composure,  
she has borne her fate, and prepared herself  
for execution.

Benjamin Buss, behaved with an insolent  
indifference, till the verdict was found against  
him, when he instantly changed colour, and  
in the utmost agony falling down on his knees,  
beg'd the mercy of the court.

Last Saturday a servant to Mr. Lane at Cux-

We hear from Dover, that Mr. Underwood has erected, at his sole expence a marble monument, in the church of St. Mary's there, to the memory of the late celebrated Mr. Churchill.

On Thursday last Mr. Hall of Margate was stung by a knat on the back of his hand, which instantly swelled to a most alarming degree from his elbow to his fingers ends; several embrocations were tried without effect, at last he was advised to apply a plaister composed of whiting and water which in a short time stop't the inflammation, and in a few hours the swelling was entirely abated.

On Friday last, a few minutes before twelve o'clock at noon, Susannah Lott and Benjamin Bus were taken from the goal, in order to be executed pursuant to their sentence (as mentioned in our last.) Bus, dressed in black, was carried in a waggon drawn by four horses, and attended by two or three Sheriff's Officers. Mrs. Lott, dressed in a suit of mourning she had for her husband, immediately followed on a hurdle drawn by four horses. In this manner they proceeded till they came to the place of execution; when Bus, after joining in prayer with the Clergyman, was hanged on a gallows about one hundred yards from the place where Mrs. Lott was to be executed. " Sir T— H— came here Thursday  
night, and on Saturday proceeded with his

fully propagated to prejudice Mr. Trevanion,

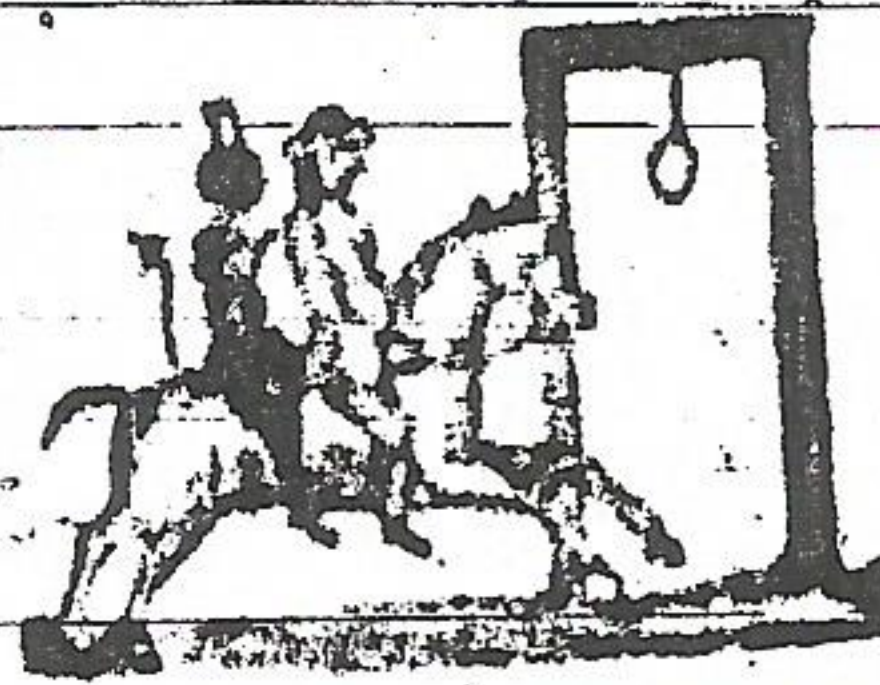
