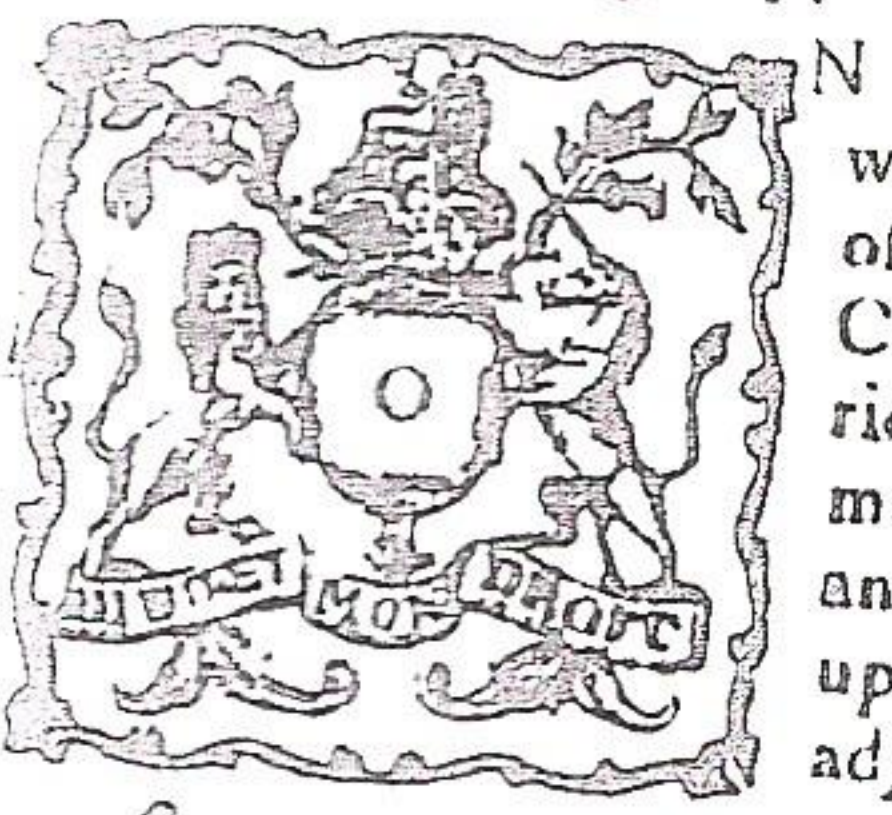

Fenchurch-street, Wednesday, May 8, 1771.

The illuminations on Wednesday night were not confined to the city; every house from Temple-bar to Charing-cross was lighted, as were many houses and whole-streets in different parts of the city of Westminster.

The mob on Wednesday night broke all the windows in Sir Fletcher Norton's house, because they were not illuminated.

Mr. James Phene, a weaver, whose letter to the Society for the Support of the Bill of Rights is inserted in the third page of this paper, was actually engaged, with many others, by a ministerial agent, who lives in Crispin-street, Spitalfields, to huzza a great personage on Wednesday last in St. James's Park. The said agent attended that morning at the King and Queen, a public house in Norton-falgate, where he engaged upwards of 60 persons, and entered in a book their names for the above-mentioned purpose. One Pickersgill was with the agent, and gave each man engaged a small piece of silk to put in his hat. Upwards of 50 assembled that morning at the King's-head in Drury-lane. Other parties met at other public-houses, from whence they marched to the Park under the command of their respective leaders.—This may be depended on.

A Gentleman who was in the Park on Wednesday, when his Majesty went to the House, says he saw Mr. Phene, whom he personally knows, and several myrmidons at his heels, with red silk in their hats, huzzaing close to his Majesty's coach; and ever and anon, when his mercenaries had exhaulted their breath upon this glorious occasion, Phene, under the King's nose, animated them aloud with "you blackguards, why don't you hallow, don't you know you are paid for it?"

Wednesday night, while the mob were parading Bishopsgate-street, they came to a house which was entirely dark, while all the neighbouring houses were most splendidly illuminated. They applied first to the people of the house, and assured them, if they did not illuminate, they might expect very disagreeable consequences; but the master of the house told them he would not light even a single candle. On which a motion was made, that, to punish his obstinacy, they should immediately break forty-five panes in his windows. This motion was instantly carried, and as instantly put into execution. They broke exactly 45 panes, and then retired with an universal huzza.

Wednesday night a desperate fray happened between the mob and a party of chairmen, in St. James's-square, two of the former, it is said, were killed on the spot, and several on both sides dangerously wounded.

A few days since, as a farmer and his servants were ploughing up some fresh lands in the parish of Hickling, near the Vale of Belvoir in Rutlandshire, about ten miles from Nottingham, in which neighbourhood Camden informs us there was a Roman station, the plough-share struck upon an urn, or earthen pot, broke it in pieces, and scattered a great number of Roman coins, some copper, and many silver ones, several as ancient as the Emperors Vespasian and Adrian; many of which were purchased by the Rector of Hickling.

A letter from Antigua, dated March 8, says, "We have had excessive hot weather here all this season; the country is burnt up like a cinder, and not more than a twentieth part of the sugar made last year will be produced this; but here is plenty of rum, almost all the canes being fit for nothing else."

and the Ile de Bourbon.

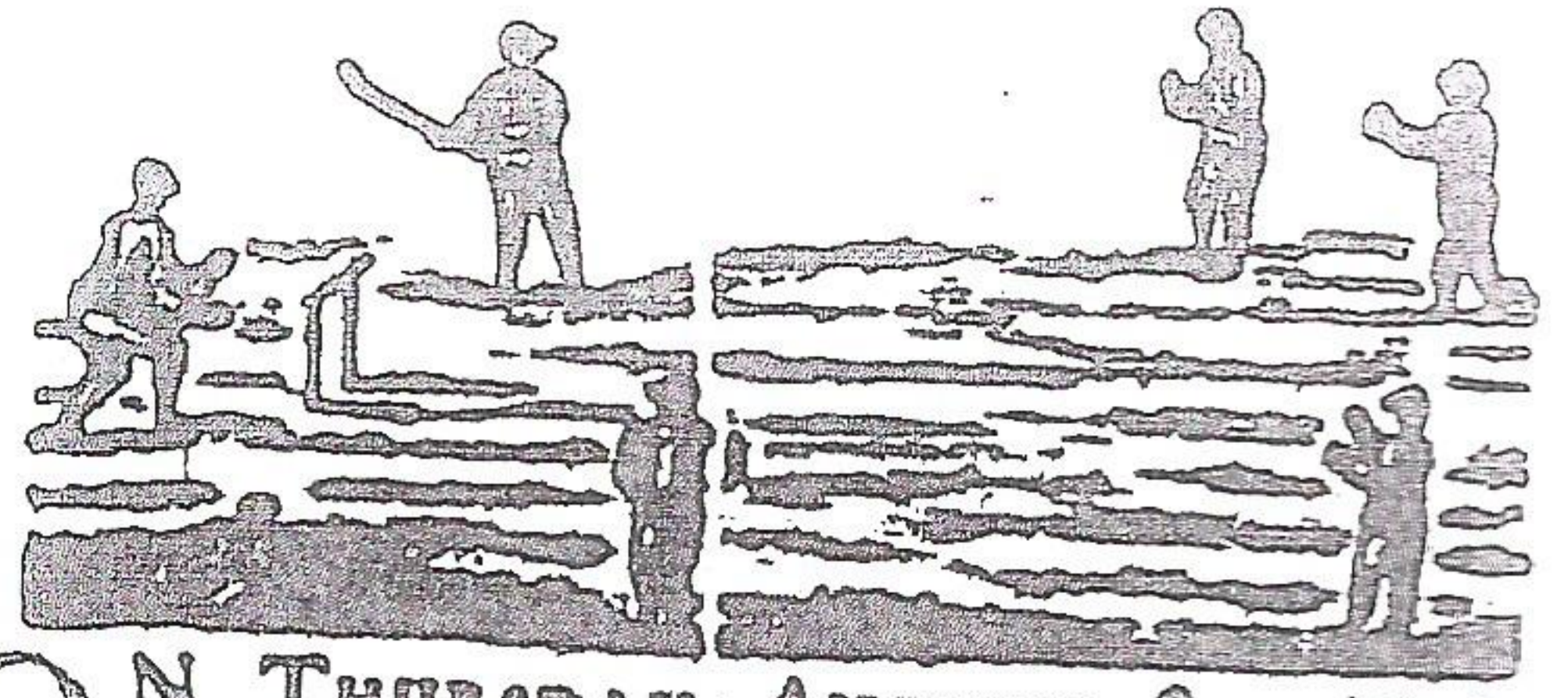
Last Sunday a serjeant of the horse grenadier

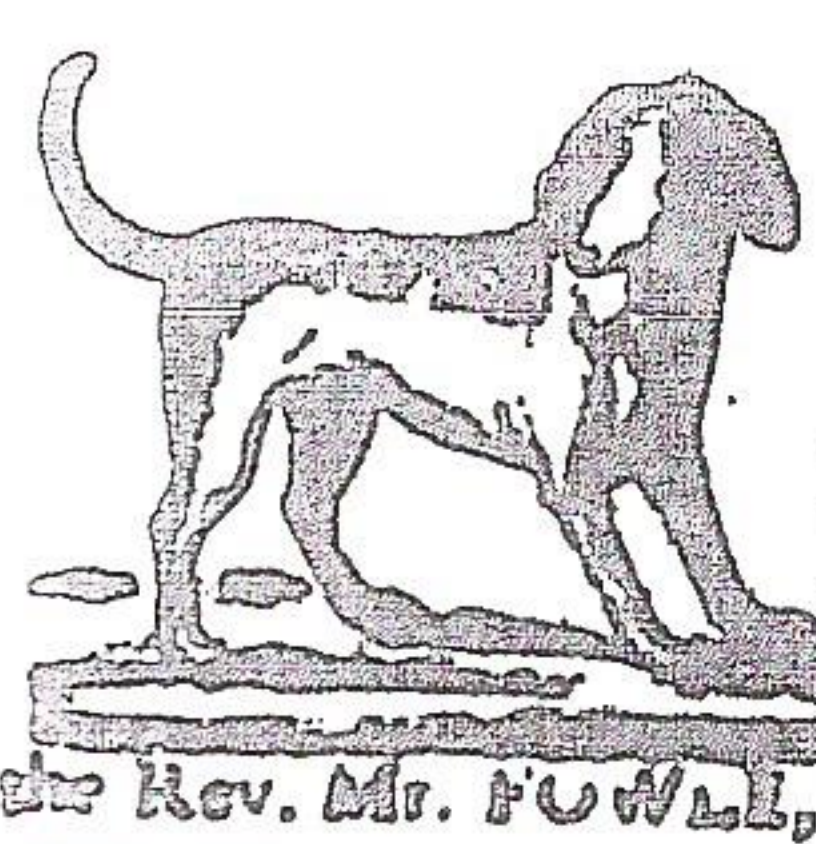

It is now positively said that Lord Camden is
to assume the seals when the Parliament meets.

The Lord Chancellor very seldom attends any
of the Councils. It is said he has not been sum-
moned for some time past.

We hear the meeting of Parliament will be
sooner than was expected.

On Monday last an advice boat arrived at
Falmouth, with dispatches from Admiral Rod-
ney at Madeira. She has brought some very ma-
terial intelligence which that gentleman has col-
lected on his voyage.

It is reported that the Princess Dowager of
Wales is about to make his Royal Highness the
Prince of Wales a present of Kew-gardens.

It is said the Duke of Gloucester will sail di-
rectly to Genoa, and will go from thence to
Turin.

The Endeavour sloop, now fitting out at Wool-
wich, is said to be intended for the Duke of
Cumberland; and that her destination is for
North America, in haste.

The States of Holland have sent five men of
war, full manned, into the Mediterranean, to
protect their trade in those parts.

A loan of 1,500,000l. is now negotiating
among the monied men, for the use of her Im-
perial Majesty.

They write from Paris, of the 28th past, that
the Duke d'Aiguillon has granted to Messrs. de
la Chalotais, the payment of the arrears of their
salary claimed by them as Attorneys-general of
the Parliament of Britany, assuring them the
same should be paid for the future by way of pen-
sion. They add, that the Duke de Chevreuse,
Governor of Paris, lies at the point of death.

FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.
 Genoa, July 10.
 H. B. Counts Alexis and Theodore Or-
 low, Commandants of the Russian
 Empress's naval armaments, having
 been elected Members of the Etruscan
 Academy in this city, addressed a letter of thanks
 for the honour conferred on them. They ac-
 companied the letter with a curious saddle, the
 hounding of which was black velvet, enriched with
 curious plates of gold and silver; and also the
 staff of command, which were taken from a
 Turkish Pacha in a late engagement. The Aca-
 demy have placed these presents in their Mu-
 seum.

Civita Vecchia, July 15. Six French ships
 are arrived here, to take on board the corn,
 which his Most Christian Majesty has ordered to
 be purchased at this place. They will be laden
 by about the middle of next month, when they
 will immediately sail for Havre de-Grace, where
 they are to land it for the use of the inhabitants
 in that part of the country. Six other vessels
 are gone to Ancona, for the same purpose.

LONDON.
 If Lord Chatham's plan of a new Ministry
 should be adopted, which at present seems very
 likely, the Duke of Grafton will be one of his
 Majesty's principal Secretaries of State, and not
 First Lord of the Treasury.

A few hours before the Duke of Gloucester
 set out, he was in private conference with his
 Majesty for near three hours.
 A treaty of marriage is now talked of be-
 tween his Grace the Duke Devonshire and a
 daughter of Lord Camden's.

We hear that fresh proposals have been made
 to the Chief Justice of the Common Pleas, to
 induce him to accept of the Seals at a certain
 period.

A treaty is certainly on foot for the Sale of the
 Island of Corfica; and it is said, that the purchase
 money will be employed in new conquests.—An
 illustrious traffic! but ways and means are too
 much praedicated at this period to be censured
 without fear of reproach.

It is said that the D. of C. positively refused
 the Embassy the D. of G. is gone upon.
 The Prudence and affability of his R—H—the
 D—of G—, it is not doubted, will re-
 trieve the reputation of the illustrious progeny
 from reproach; such opposite consequences being
 produced by the opposite conduct of good sense and
 Aburdity, politeness and gaiety.

A correspondent observes, that the month of
 August has always been extremely propitious to
 the present Royal Family; for on the 11th of Aug.
 1714, King George I. acceded to the Imperial
 Crown of these realms; on the 11th of Aug.
 1737, the Hereditary Princess of Brunswick was
 born; on Aug. 1, 1759, the English troops, in
 the glorious and happy reign of George II. con-
 quered the French at the battle of Minden; on
 the 12th of August, 1762, the Prince of Wales
 was born; on the 16th, 1763, the Bishop of
 Osnaburgh was born; and on the 21st of the
 same month, 1765, Prince William Henry, third
 son to his Majesty, was born.

A correspondent informs us, that there is so
 little demand for lottery tickets, that twelve
 thousand have not yet been delivered out.
 By letters from all parts of the kingdom, we
 are informed, that the ears of wheat are the
 largest ever remembered, that it is not yet how-
 ever ripe for cutting, but that the Rye harvest is
 begun almost every where.

Several hundred men are now employed in
 cutting the hay in the fens of the Isle of Ely,
 in Cambridgeshire, and in the large fens of Lin-
 colnshire, where they have the greatest plenty
 that has been known for many years, occasioned
 by the backwardness of the late spring.

Extra of a letter from Portsmouth, Aug 5.
 Monday last being the anniversary of the
 Birth-day of his Royal Highness the Prince of
 Wales, the same was observed here with every
 demonstration of joy.

On Tuesday, at half an hour after one
 o'clock, his Royal Highness the Duke of Glou-
 cester arrived here, and stopped at the Fountain
 inn about twenty minutes, and then proceeded
 to the Sally-port, accompanied by the Admirals
 Pye and Dennis, General Hervey, General Hay-
 wood, and all the Captains of the men of war
 that are here in commission. His Royal High-
 ness went off in the Venus barge with the two
 Admirals. As soon as his Royal Highness was
 in the barge, the royal standard was hoisted in
 her bow, and the Admirals flags in the bows of
 their different barges followed the Prince's barge,
 and all the Captains in their barges in seniority;
 this made a most noble shew. When his Royal
 Highness was off the shore some little way he
 was saluted by the blockade battery, and when
 half way to Spithead he was saluted by all the
 ships at Spithead, and as soon as his Highness
 got on board his Majesty's frigate Venus, the
 royal standard was hoisted at the maint-p-mast-
 head, all the yards were manned in the whole
 fleet at Spithead, and then again every ship
 saluted the royal standard. The Prince dined on
 board the Venus. In the afternoon she fell
 down to Stoke's bay from Spithead, and at night
 to Cowes road, and on Wednesday morning got
 the length of Yarmouth in company with the
 Alarm frigate. His Royal Highness was saluted
 as he came thro' Post-bridge Port, three miles
 from this garrison, and again at coming in here
 at the Landport gates; the invalid regiment re-
 ceived his Royal Highness at coming in.

We expect Admiral Dennis to sail daily for
 the Mediterranean.

At Spithead nine ships of war.

Friday arrived in the river the Speedwell,
 Gibson, from Leith with goods, and 150 pas-
 sengers on board.

Friday sailed from the Tower, the Neptune,

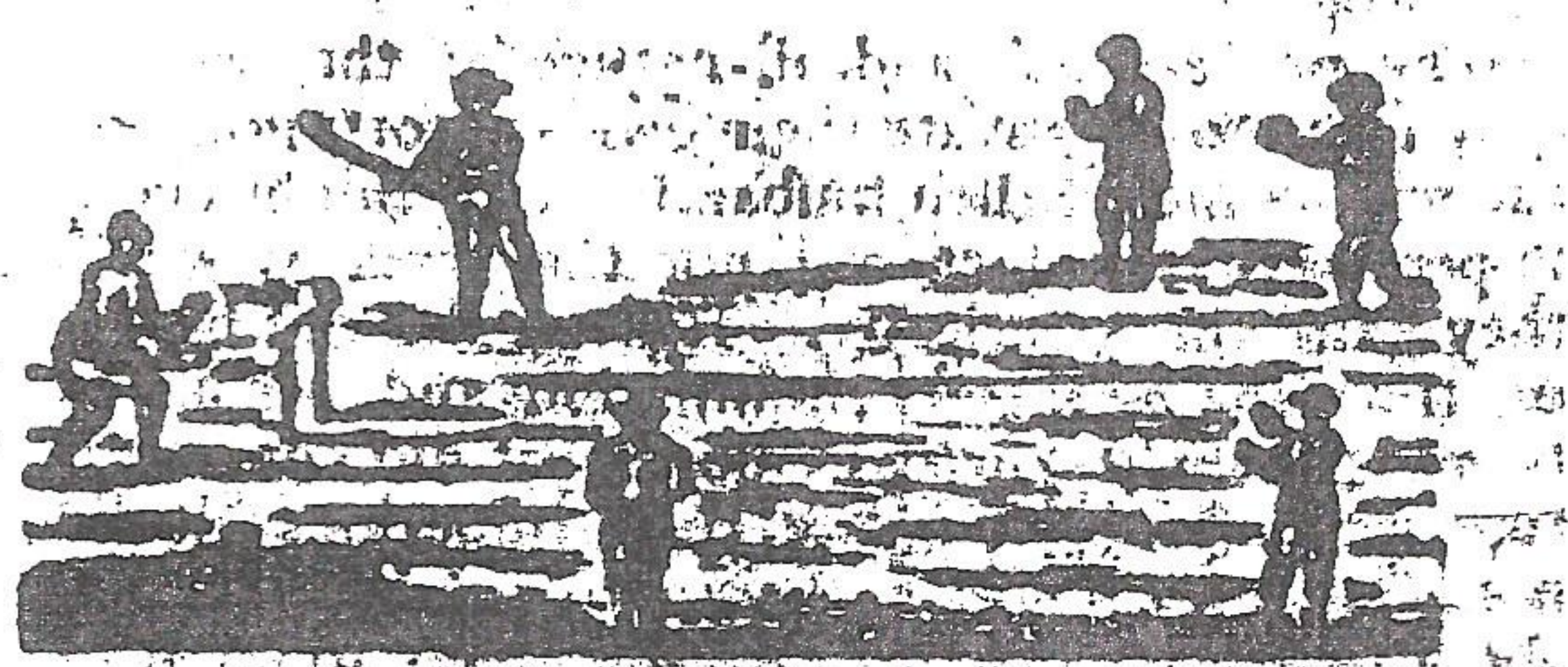

1. The statutes relating to the relief of poor
prisoners are, 14 Eliz. c. 5. Justices of the peace
in their general quarter sessions, may tax every
parish in the county towards relief of poor pri-
soners in the common goal for debt, so as it does
not exceed 6d. or 8d. a week for every parish, to
be levied by churchwardens every Sunday, and
paid once a quarter to the High Constable; or
Head Officers of every town, &c. who are to pay
it to the collectors appointed by the justices in
their sessions, under the penalty of 5l.

2. By the 43 Eliz. c. 2. Justices of peace
have power, at Easter sessions yearly, to rate
every parish at a certain sum to be paid weekly;
no parish to pay more than sixpence, or less than
a halfpenny, towards relief of poor prisoners in
the King's Bench and Marshalsea, each respect-
ively to receive out of every county 20s. yearly.
Treasurers for the county are to be chosen at the
said Easter sessions; who refusing to execute the
office, distribute relief, or to account, shall for-
feit 3l. to be levied by distress.

3. By 19 Charles II. c. 4. Justices in their
sessions may also provide a sufficient stock to set
poor prisoners to work, committed for felony
and other misdemeanors, by such ways and
means as other county charges are raised, pro-
vided no parish be rated above 6d. a week, and
they may appoint overseers to examine their ac-
counts, and punish abuses.

4. Collectors for prisons are weekly to distri-
bute and pay all such money as they shall receive
for the relief of the said prisoners, upon pain of
forfeiting 5l. as well the collectors appointed
as the churchwardens and constables, &c.

Corfican army, under the command of that distinguished General M. Marbeuf, makes us with too much pain recollect the days of your Marlborough, who always made the armies of France retreat before they could engage. For these fifty years, our troops have not received such a shock as the late unhappy affair in Corfica; yet their retreat was brilliant. It gives me too much pain to recollect, and I am confident you would suffer greatly in knowing, how our troops were cruelly slaughtered by the barbarous mountaineers in that unhappy day; therefore, shall only convince you of our miserable policy, by the treasure lavished in Corfica in support of the King's army in that Island, of which you receive the following detail:—Regiments of Dauphine, Berry, Roussillon, and Bourgygne, 3 battalions each; Italian, 1 batt. Beauce, Provence, Bolognois, 3 batt. each; Fôrez, 1 batt. Alsace, 3 batt. Germans; Castella, 1, Swiss; Bulkeley, 1, Irish:—consisting of twenty two battalions, exclusive of four hundred cavalry. The Corps of Artillery, commanded by 1 Colonel 2 Lt. Colonels, 1 Captain, and the company of Mineurs, commanded by 1 Major, 2 Captains, and 2 Lieutenants; forming an expence that is enormous, equal to the charge of the garrisons upon our German frontiers, and exceeding the sum necessary to prevent the approaching famine that threatens France, and save the lives of half a million of subjects. Yet this sacrifice is made to gratify the ambition of the Minister of Versailles. May the severest of *benedictions*, given to Heretics, fall upon that Englishman who advised your not engaging in war with France to prevent our acquisition of Corfica, where our late scene of slaughter and misery will prove as advantageous to you, as the action of Hockstedt or Blenheim.”

Extract of a letter from Rochester, July 19.

“We lay on Wednesday at Woolwich, wind and tide bound for five hours: From thence his Lordship and the Aldermen, in the Chatham, and his retinue in the Trinity yacht, proceeded for Gravesend, where all arrived between ten and eleven. His Lordship and his brethren met with the most respectful reception here, by the Mayor, several Aldermen, the ringing the bells, and illuminations. I must pass over the other occurrences to come to this morning's business, which was very grand.

“Just after ten, the procession began from the Bull Inn, on foot, to embark in the yachts, in the following order: The Lord Mayor's suite. His Lordship, an Alderman of Rochester, and Chaplain. On the left hand the Aldermen of London, and then a number of gentlemen. Upon getting on board guns were fired near the city

to this Dock-yard, accompanied by several gentlemen and a vast concourse of people. They were very politely received by Anthony Wellden, Esq; Store keeper, and several other gentlemen belonging to the yard (Commissioner Hanway not being at home.) They walked all over the yard, and took a view of the different storehouses, and stores therein contained, and went on board his Majesty's ship *Victory*, of 100 guns (now in dock;) afterwards they went on the anchor wharf and took a view of the different anchors; they likewise went up into the mould loft, which is reckoned the finest in England: in a word, every thing that was worth observation they had a sight of. They expressed a great satisfaction at the neatness of the yard and the regularity of the different stores, and returned Mr. Wellden many thanks for his polite behaviour. Mr. Wellden gave Messrs. Wilkes and Bull an invitation to his house, which they would gladly have accepted, had time permitted; but they were obliged to walk back to Rochester, where a chaise was waiting for them to set off for London immediately.

“This morning, about half past four o'clock, the Chatham Yacht, Mr. Wilson Master, with the Lord Mayor, &c. sailed back for London, accompanied with the Trinity Yacht.

“The following is a matter of fact:—A woman of Chatham being pregnant, had a longing desire to see Mr. Wilkes; she was introduced to him at Rochester by her husband, when she gratified herself with a full view of him; and Mr. Wilkes being told of the affair, very politely saluted her, which so pleased the poor woman, that it is thought it will prove a means of preventing a miscarriage.

On Friday morning, John Turner, who was convicted for the murder of his wife at the last assizes at Maidstone, was executed at that place; he behaved all the time extremely penitent. Armstrong, the other felon who was capitally convicted, was reprieved before the Judge left the town. It is remarkable that two horse-stealers were tried on six or seven indictments at that assizes and acquitted of them all for want of a person to corroborate with the King's evidence, who was an accomplice.

Friday morning the county sessions ended at Maidstone, when two were sentenced to be transported for seven years.

On Sunday evening the corpse of Mr. Burton, late Manager of a Company of Comedians, was interred in the Burying-ground of St John's Church-yard, Margate. The procession was conducted with decency and order, distinguished by the additional attendance of his Brother Masons resident in that place, and the greatest concourse of spectators remembered on any former solemn occasion.

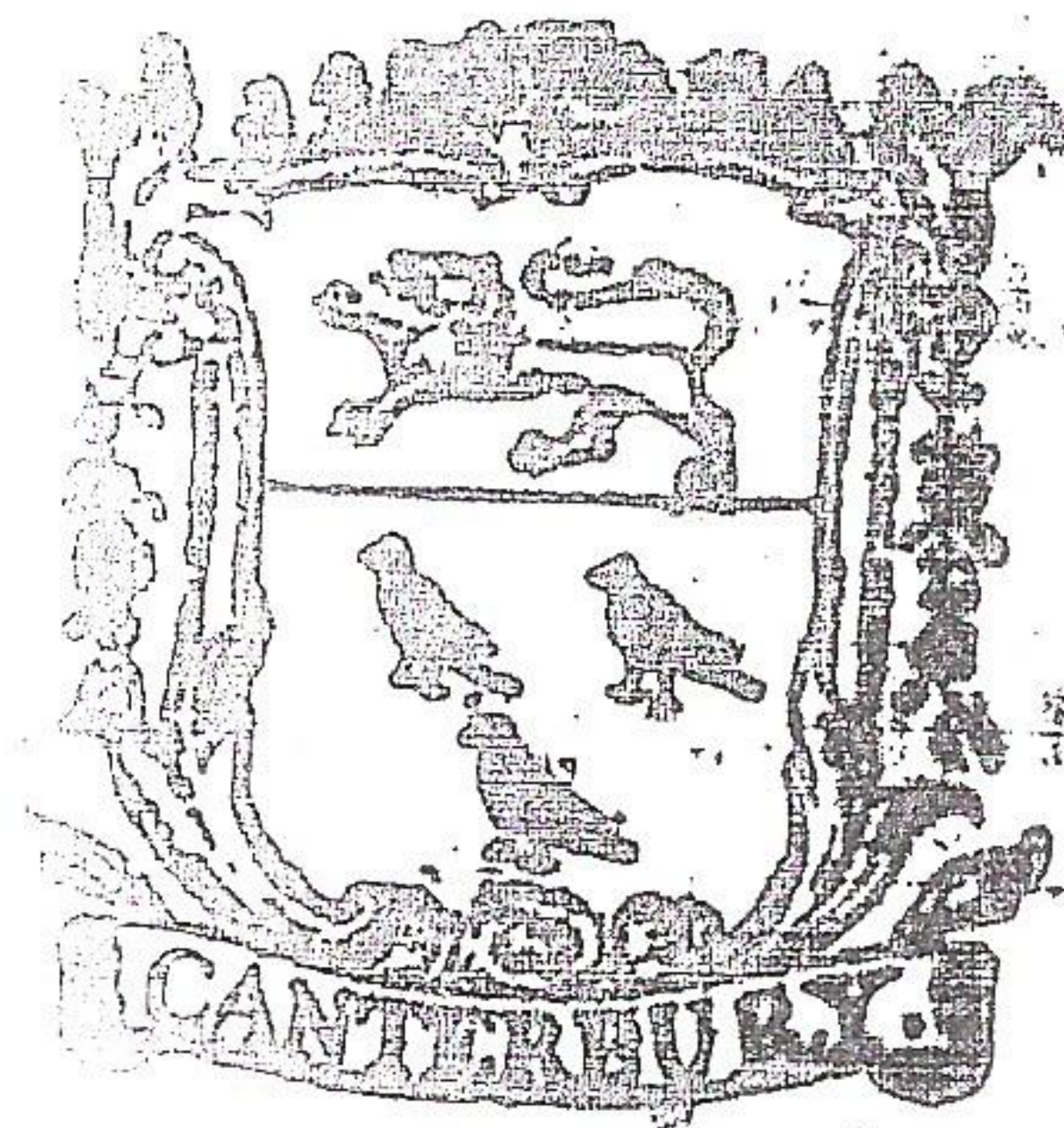

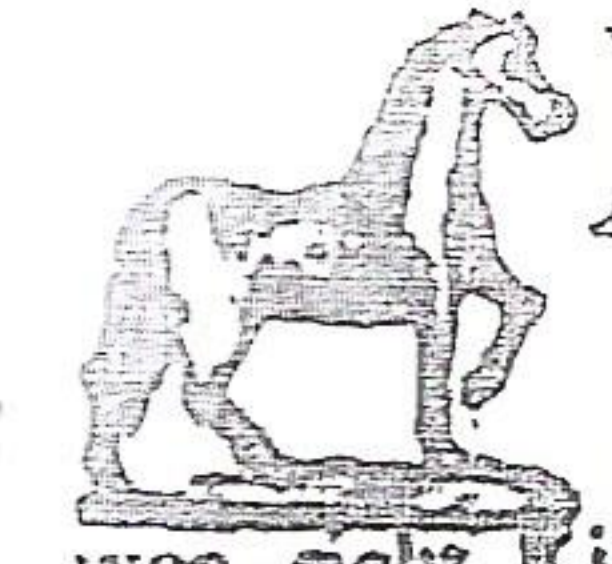
