Extract of a letter from Holland.

“ I am greatly grieved for the poor Queen of Denmark. Poor lady! she has had measure from that diabolical Queen Dowager, who has got all the power into her hands, has in effect de-throned the King, and is making hasty strides to place her own son on the throne. I do not suppose the present King of Denmark, or his son, will be long lived. They may die suddenly, of a violent fever, an apoplexy, palsy, or any thing but p—f—n; and depend upon it, if the poor, innocent, imprisoned Queen is permitted to live, it will be owing, under God, more to the dread of English vengeance than to any other cause. Pray God send her speedily safe to your side of the water, for she can hardly be said to be safe while in Denmark. I hope soon to hear of a fleet sailing from Spithead to the Sound. Should this be the case, and they carry and land troops, they would be joined by the majority of the Danish troops and nation, who are highly disgusted with the late alarming change, notwithstanding all that the court now in power there, or prostitute hireling clergymen, may say and declare to the contrary.”

A correspondent has sent us the following remark—The late Earl of Catherlough's only son died without issue some years ago, and his widow married the Earl of Deloraine—so that the title is extinct, notwithstanding what is said in the London Papers.

On Thursday last Edward Pierce, farmer, at Linseed Bottom, in the parish of Upper Hardsea, walked from this City to the 26 mile stone on the London road, and back again, which is sixty miles, for a wager of ten pounds; he was allowed sixteen hours to perform it. the outside of the Church presents none of the sculptures or other Gothic ornaments which so justly admired in Lincoln, York, and other Cathedrals. The workmen are now very busy in scraping off the whitewash from these pillars, which will give the Cathedral a very pleasing as well as grand look, when they are all entirely divested of their white livery.

Extract of a letter from Marienwerder, June 12

"Our new sovereign the King of Prussia, whose general wishes and desires are only for the happiness of his subjects, has found it highly interesting, as well for his new subjects in New Prussia, as for his subjects in Silesia, to join the river Oder with the Weichsel; for the execution of which truly royal undertaking great preparations are already made; the Sieur Brenkckenhof, his Majesty's chief engineer, arrived here yesterday for that purpose; the sum of 600,000 dollars, or 100,000l. is ordered from the royal treasury to defray the expences. The King ordered also, that none but inhabitants of this province shall be employed in this work, so that all the money will be expended in New Prussia."

Extract of a letter from on board the Diana merchant ship, Capt. Watts, dated at Madeira, April 24, 1772.

"We arrived here on our way to the West-Indies the 16th inst. all well, having got a new mast and repaired the damage we received at the time it was carried away at Ferrol, at which place the Spaniards behaved with the greatest friendship. Since we arrived here we have been in danger of being lost, which was on the 20th inst. at Fouchil Bay, with the wind at South, blowing a hard storm, and the sea running mountains high, forced us almost upon the rocks, but providentially the wind abated. We are now preparing to sail for Antigua."

make no deduction for returns, unless the im-

The second caution necessary for the public is,
to examine all the money which they give to
hackney-coachmen, chairmen, and watermen;
and never to quit these fellows till they express
themselves satisfied with the goodness of the
coin which is paid them. *There is more reason
also for this caution than good men would think*;
as it is very common with the gentry denomi-
nated above to call after the company they carry
the moment their backs are turned, and to pro-
duce a piece or two of bad money, which they
insist has been then given them for good; and
which, it is well known, they usually carry
about them, tho' not for the end of a robbery, at
least for the purpose of an exchange.

The above cautions are given in consequence
of a conversation overheard last week between a
waiter at a public garden and a hackney coach-
man. The coachman bragged, that one day
with another, he usually made five shillings by
exchanging money in the manner mentioned;
while the waiter said, that he would not think
an evening worth mentioning in which twenty
shillings at least were not *junk* in eatables upon
his company.

An Excise Officer, who had been lately search-
