THE Russian fleets are in so good a state that it may with truth be said that they never were so respectable as they are at present. There are at Revel 28 ships of the line four of which are new build under the inspection of Admiral Knowles. Most of the other new built ships are the workmanship of the most celebrated English builders, and most of the officers on board them are English, Scotch, or Irish. The naval forces of Russia in the Archipelago are still more considerable! they consist of 40 ships of the line at least, without reckoning the frigates and many other small vessels.

London, July 7. Baron de Wenzel, Oculist to their Imperial and Britannic Majesties, whose fame is so generally known, who returned to this city two months ago, performs his operations here with the usual success. Those who were born blind, as well as others, receive their cure from his hand. Of this we have lately had a new proof in the son of Mr. Bosanquet, one of the Directors of the Bank: this child now five years old, was born blind: eight months ago he received his sight from the hands of this artist, inasmuch that he has now attained the knowledge of all the letters of the alphabet, and can spell them. He sets out from hence for Paris, where he usually resides, at the beginning of September, by the way of Amsterdam and Brussels.

We see here with pleasure a posthumous work of the celebrated Helvetius, entitled "Of Man, of his intellectual faculties and his education." This author's ingenious talents are distinguishable in this work.

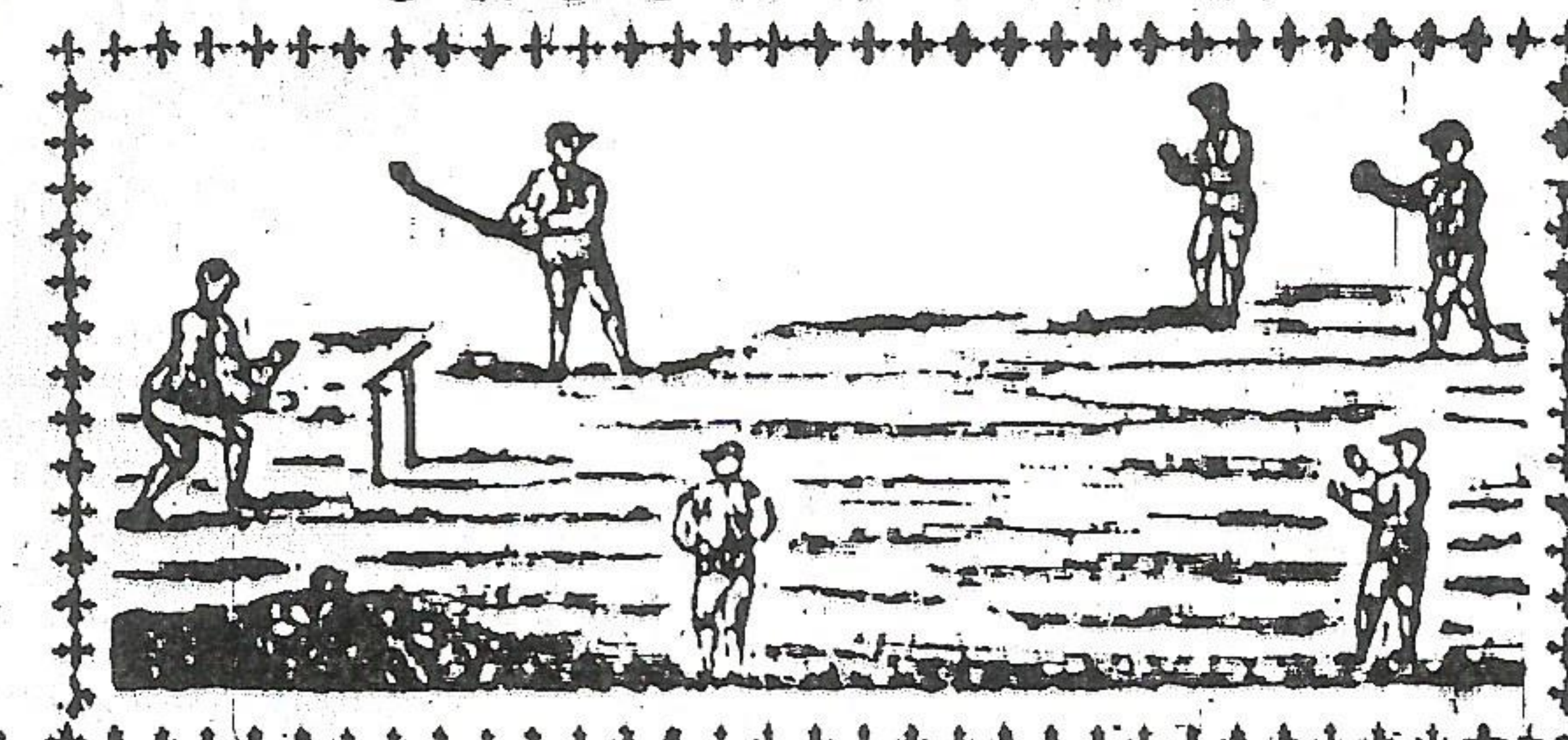

UTRECHT GAZETTE, July 23.

Master, July 13. His serene highness the Elector, has suppressed the convent of Nuns, named Uberwasser in this city, and has ordered the 6000 crowns revenue, which it enjoyed, to be employed in founding an university on the plan of that of Gottingen. The Nuns, after many remonstrances, have ineffectually solicited the protection of the Court of Rome, for the Holy Father concurs in opinion with the Elector.

FRENCH GAZETTE, July 23.

Rome, June 30. The Pope repairing lately to the church of St. Dominic and St. Sixtus, admitted the Marchioness de Llano to the honour of kissing his feet, and presented her with a magnificent chaplet of beads.

On Monday, the eve of St. Peter, Prince Colonna, constable of the kingdom of Naples, ambassador extraordinary from his Sicilian Majesty, repaired, with a numerous and brilliant train, to the church of St. Peter. He presented, as usual, a Spanish gennet to the Pope, who received it at the church-gate, surrounded by all his court. This ceremony was performed after the first vespers which were solemnly sung there, and at which the sovereign Pontiff, the sacred College, and the different orders of the Roman prelacy were present. This custom is observed every year on St. Peter's eve; the gennet must be white and sound. This kind of feudal duty is prescribed in the first investitures of the kingdom of Naples given by the Popes.

Next day, the Pope, attended in like manner, by the sacred College and the Roman prelacy, celebrated, with great pomp, high mass at the high altar of that church. In the evening all the houses were illuminated, as they had been the evening before; and at the castle of St. Angelo, and at the square Farfese, several fireworks were played off, one of which represented the temple of peace, another an apothecary's shop, and all the process necessary to make treacle.

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Wednesday morning a seizure of run goods, to the value of 200l. or thereabouts, was made at a house in Ken-street, Southwark. The mistress of the house, to whom the goods belonged, two hours afterwards cut her throat; and though an eminent surgeon was sent for to her assistance, she expired in great agonies.

On Tuesday last at Barnet races, a fine horse belonging to Mr. Seymour, an eminent butcher in Leadenhall market, dropped down dead on the course; after he had run about one mile and a half in the second heat. He is supposed to have been poisoned by some malicious person, or it was not doubted but that he would have won the plate with ease.

Yesterday morning early a sailing lighter was overset by the violence of the wind below bridge, by which accident Mr. James Moorsby, a lighterman at Rotherhithe, and his apprentice, were drowned.

On Monday evening four villains, with black'd faces, entered the house of Mr. Thynman, farmer, near Braintree, in Essex, and after binding the farmer, his wife, a man and two maid servants, left one of them to guard while the other three went up stairs and broke open all the locks, carried away a sack full of plate, linen, and wearing apparel, together with two horses, on the back of one of which they carried off their plunder. They were in the house near four hours.

At Hereford assizes, Joseph Owen was indicted for the wilful murder of his own mother, who had been a most tender and affectionate parent to him. On the 26th of May, in the morning, the father being gone from home, and no one left in the house but the deceased, and her daughter about 13 years of age, the prisoner came into the house, and with a spade which he found there, fractured his mother's skull in two places, of which she instantly died. It appeared in the course of the trial, that the prisoner had been long in a state of insanity; and the strongest proofs of that fact being produced, the jury readily acquitted him of the charge of murder; but proper directions were given to secure him, and to prevent other fatal effects of his phrenzy.

Saturday morning last a ball of fire went thro' the roof of Mr. Evan's house at Crawley, in Surry, which consumed that and the furniture in the room before it was extinguished, and then made through the window.

Paris, Aug. 22. A Courier extraordinary arrived at Compeigne the 19th from Rome with the long expected Bull for suppressing the order of the Jesuits. This Bull is dated July 21, and, it is said, will be registered before the rising of the Parliament. It consists of 31 sheets, and very probably will soon be translated into French. In the mean time it has transpired that the Pope there proves that he is empowered to take this step in imitation of several of his predecessors, who have dissolved or suppressed various monastic orders; he reproaches the Jesuits with having frequently given great occasion of offence to other orders, to Colleges, Universities, Bishops, &c. and even to the Court of Rome; and have drawn upon themselves the resentment of several Sovereigns, who have found themselves obliged to expell them from their dominions, though they were under the greatest obligations. His Holiness then orders, that the Novices shall be sent home; he releases those who have made but one vow, permits them to embrace any other state, and even to marry; he declares to those who have pronounced the last vow and made their profession, that they shall be permitted to enter into any other religious order, where they must perform their Noviceship for six months or a year, according to their age. He grants to the old and infirm, a suitable pension, with leave to remain in their convents, under the inspection and authority of the Bishops or Abbots who shall be set over them in quality of superiors; but they are not to be permitted to wear the habit of the order, and they shall be forbid to preach or hear confessions.

Stockholm, Aug. 13. We hear from Christianstadt that the Duke of Sudermania is attacked there by a violent fever: M. Rosensbladt; physician at Lund has received orders to go and attend his Royal Highness. It is presumed that this Prince caught cold in travelling on horseback from Carlscroon to Carlshaven in very bad weather. praying that the present laws against the importation of foreign lace be discontinued, and a penalty inflicted on the wearer.

Yesterday a petition of the same nature was presented in behalf of the manufacturers of silk, praying that the penalties at present recoverable from the importer or immediate vender, may be transferred to the wearer or possessor, either in cloaths or furniture. This petition was brought in by Mr. Mackworth, who, in the warmth of his zeal for the starving manufacturers, went so far as to solicit the assistance of the ladies, and to engage for them that they would even strip off their gowns for the benefit of the poor. It is imagined he would have proceeded farther if he had not been interrupted by the jocular acclamations of the House. Mr. T. Townshend strongly objected to the contents of the petition, insisting particularly that the mode of recovering the penalty, and ascertaining the offence, were equally unexceptionable in both petitions, and concluded by assuring the House, that these bills were almost always brought in to answer private purposes; that the vender would be generally the informer; that it would have been much better for the unhappy petitioners if the bill for prohibiting the importation of foreign silks had never passed; and that, for his part, though he never intended to be a purchaser of foreign finery to adorn his body, but that if the present proposed bill should take place, he was resolved never to wear a pennyworth of silk or lace as long as he lived.

Yesterday Mr. Alderman Harley brought in a petition to enable Mr. Cox to dispose of his Museum. The reasons assigned for the present request were, that he was an ingenious artist, had laid out an hundred thousand pounds in those curious pieces of mechanism of which it is composed, that times were bad, and that Mr. Cox was embarrassed in his circumstances.

Yesterday there was a very full levee at St. James's at which were present great numbers of the Nobility and Gentry, and all the foreign Ministers.

Yesterday the Duke of Beaufort, Lords Suffex, Romney, and Sir Watkins William Wynne were at Court.

A plan has been presented to the Lords of the Admiralty for building a new dock-yard at Plymouth, which has, we hear, been approved of, and is certainly to be carried into execution.

The following is the copy of the address agreed to by the Commons, which was presented to his Majesty last Friday on the birth of another Prince, by such members as are of his Majesty's Privy Council.

"That an humble address be presented to his Majesty, to offer the most humble and affectionate congratulations of this House to his Majesty, on the happy delivery of the Queen, and the birth of another Prince, and to assure his Majesty that every addition to his domestic felicity, and to the stability of his illustrious house, from which these kingdoms have received the most essential benefits, must always afford the highest satisfaction to his faithful Commons." His Majesty was pleased to receive the said address very graciously, and returned thanks to the house of Commons, for this instance of their affectionate attachment to him and his family.

This will certainly be of great advantage to people who go abroad, and to private traders, who may make their own assays, when this method is communicated to the public.

Genoa, August 12. The archbishop of this city is going to embark in one of the gallees of the republic for Taggia on the western riviere, but we know not the object of his voyage. The new fortifications ordered by England at Gibralt- ar, on the land side, are now finished, and by this means that place is now secure from any surprize.

Paris, Sept. 5. Last Friday the Great cham- ber of Parliament and the Tournelle sat from six in the morning till seven in the evening, and at length passed an arret, which acquits the Count de Marangier of every accusation laid to his charge, annuls the notes of 370,000 livres for- ged by Dufonquay, sentences him to be banished from Paris for three years, and his mother to be admonished, and both of them jointly to be fined 1000 livres [about 41. sterl.] costs and interest, to be disposed of as the Count pleases, by way of re- paration; orders a more ample information in six months, with regard to their witness Gilbert, confined in the Conciergerie; discharges all the other defecdants: only enjoins the Sieur de Brugniere, officer of Police, to be more mode- rate in the exercise of his office; suppresses the memorials of the counsellors Falconnat and La Croix as tending to dishonour the nobility.

A croud of people was waiting at the palace for the decision of this affair now become so cu- rious. The Count de Morangies has left prison in triumph, and Counsellor Linguet, his defend- er, has gained much honour. The public how- ever talk differently of this arret; some approve

Paris, Sept. 10. On the 6th inst. the Count and Countess of Provence made their public en- try into this capital, where they were saluted by the cannon of the Bastille, &c. were accom- panied at the gate of the Conference by the Corporation and the provost of the merchants, at the gate of the Cathedral (where they knelt and heard mass) by the Archbishop, at the gate of the Canons, at St. Genevieve (where they prayed) by the Abbot. After traversing the principal streets, they dined at the Tuilleries, walked in the gardens, and returned in the evening to Versailles. The French and Swiss guards were under arms whenever they alighted, and the people eager to see them, were afraid that the rain, which had fallen all night and part of the day, would have prevented their attending their Highnesses in the progress; but by a happy circumstance, as was remarked on a Roman festival, the weather cleared up as soon as they arrived at Paris and began their march, so that the citizens could freely line all the streets, ap- proach their coaches, and follow their train with acclamations.

Nocte pluit tota, redeunt spectacula mane,
Divisum imperium cum Jove Caesar habet.
It rains all night, the shows return by day,
Caesar with Jove divides imperial sway.
