THE LICENCES for HATS commenced From the First Day of October, and are to be annually renewed, and those Persons required to be licensed, who shall sell HATS without first taking out a licence and renewing the same when expired, are subject to a penalty of - - - - - *Five Pounds.*
For every licence, there shall be annually charged a Duty of - - - - - *Five Shillings.*
For every Hat not exceeding the value of four shillings, there shall be charged a stamp-duty of - *Three Pence.*
For every hat exceeding the value of four shillings, and not exceeding seven shillings, there shall be charged a stamp-duty of - - - - - *Six Pence.*
For every Hat, exceeding the value of seven shillings, and not exceeding twelve shillings, there shall be charged a stamp-duty of - - - - - *One Shilling.*
For every Hat exceeding the value of twelve shillings, there shall be charged a stamp-duty of - *Two Shillings.*
A list of the persons licensed to sell HATS in East-Kent, may be had GRATIS, at the Office at Canterbury, or any of the Stamp Distributors.

Several persons have lately been convicted and paid the penalties both for selling articles subject to the stamp-duties without having the proper labels affixed thereto, and without being properly licensed; and the Honourable Commissioners of His Majesty's stamp-duties have given directions that strict attentions be paid towards convicting every person offending in future against the different duties under their management.

And if either buyer or seller of any Hat, not having the proper ticket affixed thereto, shall inform against the other party concerned in buying or selling such Hat, without the proper stamped ticket affixed thereto, the party so offending shall be admitted to give evidence against the party informed against; and shall be indemnified from the penalties by him or her incurred.

AND WHEREAS many persons have neglected to renew their respective licences, until notice of their being expired is sent them; they are hereby informed, that no such notices, by the acts of Parliament, are necessary to be delivered; and all persons not applying to take out and renew their licences regularly, are liable to the penalties incurred without further notice being given.

Downward of sixty sailors, all armed with whale-knives, came on Wednesday into town from Druggers. The reason of this armed and formidable junction was to prevent themselves falling into the hands of the press-gangs, wherein they succeeded, and have hitherto escaped.

The French Fleet is not at sea—nor has any intelligence of such an event been brought to this country, except by the Messengers in 'Change Alley, and they travelled no farther with the intelligence, than from the Stock Exchange to those papers which receive money for misleading the judgement of the public. We are authorised to assert that no such account has been received by Government, which must have been officially apprised of it, had the report been true.

A contagious disorder has broken out at Marseilles, the symptoms of which are a swelling of the throat, external inflammation, constant itching and fever.—The disease is supposed to be more dangerous on account of the heat of the weather.

Orders were sent down, it is confidently asserted, on Saturday last, to the respective officers at Haslar Hospital, to make the necessary preparations for receiving 2000 men.

In consequence of the discovery of the bag of combustibles last week, on board the Leviathan, at Chatham, orders have been sent by the Lords of the Admiralty to the Commissioners of the different ports in this kingdom, not to admit strangers on any pretence whatever, either into the dock-yards, or on board any of his Majesty's ships that are fitting out there.

The quantity of rain which has fallen since Wednesday afternoon, exceeds all belief. The marshes round town are full of water, particularly Rotherhithe and Lambeth.

On Wednesday night about eleven o'clock, a fire broke out at Mr. Legg's, coach-painter, the corner of Stonecutter-ally, Gate-street, near Lincoln's-inn-fields, which burnt with great fury for near an hour before a proper supply of water could be got.

The flames communicated to several other houses, and before the fire could be got under, five or six were entirely consumed.

A great quantity of rain fell just as the fire broke out, otherwise it must have spread very much, owing to the numerous stable-yards in the neighbourhood, and the strong wind, which carried very large sparks in great quantities to a considerable distance.

The fire was not got under till about two o'clock in the morning.

Unfortunately three men were killed by the fall of one of the houses, and two more were carried to the hospital, one of whom is since dead, and the other is so much hurt that he is not expected to recover.—One of the fire engines was crushed to pieces by the fall.

NAVIGATION.

On Monday last Sir Horace Mann gave a grand entertainment at Bourn Paddock, to the Electors of Sandwich, to which a number of his friends from this City were invited. The hospitality of this mansion is too well known to need any encomium—suffice it to say, that the company, which consisted of one hundred and twenty persons, partook of a very elegant dinner, and found the convivialities of the day most agreeably heightened by the polite and friendly attention of their respectable host. Sir Horace, after dinner, in a speech of considerable length, addressed the company upon the projected Navigation, which the City of Canterbury and Town of Sandwich have respectively in agitation. Sir Horace observed, at the time he was elected Member for Sandwich, he had pledged himself to give every assistance in his power to the Navigation which his Constituents had in view; he remarked likewise, that his vicinity to the City of Canterbury, and the many marks of friendship he had experienced from the inhabitants of that place, rendered him very desirous of promoting their Navigation, provided it did not clash with the one projected by his friends at Sandwich. He very much flattered himself from the information which his two friends, Mr. Simmons and Mr. Dilnot, were furnished with, that a plan might be adopted for the intended Navigation, which would operate to the mutual benefit of the two places. Sir Horace observed, that he had no specific plan to offer himself on this business, but recommended a committee to be formed, consisting of an equal number of persons from Canterbury and Sandwich, to meet at a third place, to take the business into their serious consideration, and any plan so agreed upon, he should be happy to lend every assistance in his power to carry into effect—but

prevent so villainous a design being executed, matter must portend; and it is most sincerely the plot may be discovered."

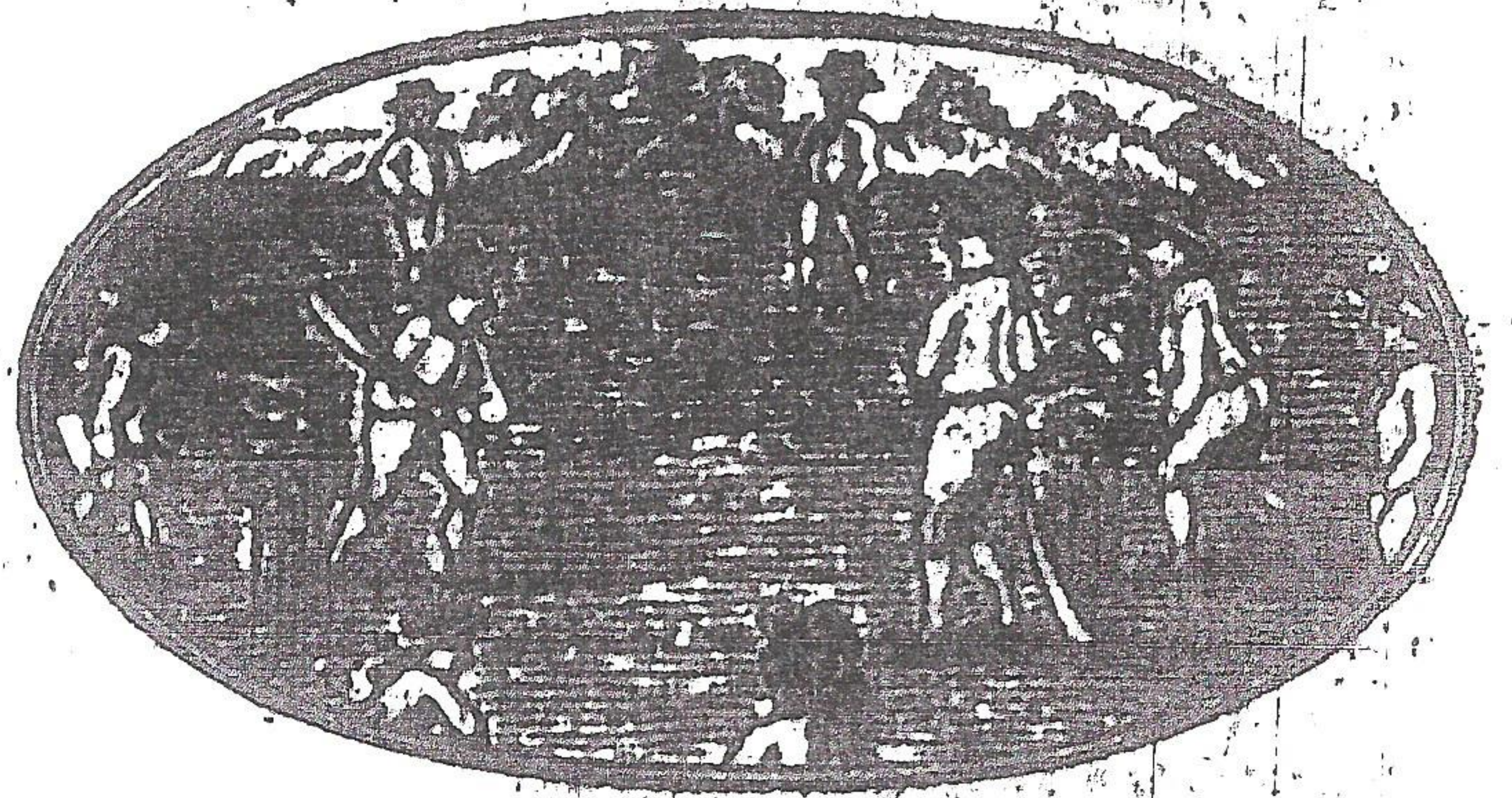

To prevent POACHING and Destroying the GAME.

Extract from the Act of the 13th George the Third, relating thereto.

AFTER the twenty-fourth day of June, 1773, if any person or persons shall knowingly and willingly kill, take or destroy any hare, pheasant, partridge, moor game or heath game, or use any gun, dog, snare, net or other engine, with intent to kill, take or destroy any hare, pheasant, partridge, moor game or heath game, in the night, that is to say, between the hours of seven o'clock at night and six in the morning, from the 12th day of October to the 12th day of February; and between the hours of nine of the clock at night and four of the clock in the morning, from the 12th day of February to the 12th day of October; every such person, being convicted thereof, shall forfeit and pay, for the first offence, any sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds, nor less than Ten Pounds; for the second offence, any sum not exceeding Thirty Pounds, nor less than Twenty Pounds; and for the third and every other offence, Fifty Pounds; or be imprisoned for any term not less than six, or more than twelve months; and be publickly whipped."

Whoever shall be found offending against the above Act of Parliament, for the preservation of the Game, in the several parishes of Linted, Teynham, Doddington, Newnham, Eastling, Otterden, Stalisfield, Throwleigh, Badlesmere, Leveland, Sheldwich, Selling, Boughton under the Blean, Seasalter, Hernhill, Craveney, Goodnestone next Feverham, Feverham, Ospringe, Preston next Feverham, Oare, Davington, Luddenham, Stone next Feverham, Buckland, Norton, Tonge, Raperhill, Kingsdown, Murkon, Tunstall, Rodmersham, Miffed, Sittingborne, Hobbing, Borden, Milton next Sittingborne, and Iwade, in the County of Kent, shall be prosecuted according to the above Act. And for the better discovering any person or persons so offending in the above-mentioned parishes,

That whoever will give information, shall, on conviction of any offender or offenders, (against the said Act) or higglers, or others carrying game unlawfully, receive TEN GUINEAS reward, over and besides the reward allowed by Act of Parliament, which in no instance will be less than Five Pounds, and in some may be Fifty Pounds. The said reward to be paid by applying to John Hinde, Attorney at Law, at Milton next Sittingborne; or James Tappenden, or John Smith, Attorneys at Law, at Feverham.

All carriers, stage coachmen, higglers, and others, found carrying, or having game in their custody unlawfully, will be prosecuted.

Whereas many persons, not qualified by law to kill or destroy the game, do take out certificates for that purpose, and kill and destroy the game in the above-mentioned parishes, thinking that by such certificates they are exempted from any penalty; and whereas qualified persons for killing or destroying the game; therefore this is to give notice, that if any person or persons coming under the above description, shall in future hunt, shoot, course, or otherwise kill or destroy the game, within any of the parishes above-mentioned, they will be prosecuted for the same in the law courts.

Extract of a letter from Lewes, August 6.

The robbers entered by means of a pick-lock, which they
which they opened the back-door. They also picked
other locks, with a view of a better booty; but they were
disappointed, as the King's money is always kept in a
place of greater security. The locks were all picked with
great dexterity, and without injuring a single ward belong-
ing to any of them.

horse-stealing; and Philip Davy, for robbing James
Smith on the highway of his watch and money.”

62, to Miss E. Castle, of Hardres, aged 32.

Early on Monday morning died, after a short
illness, James Flint, Esq; of Judd-House, in the parish
of Ospringe.

The Britannia spoke with the Sir Edward Hughes, outward-bound, in lat. 4. 30. N. lon. 19. 30. W.; and with the Warren Hastings, in lat. 2 N. and long. 24. 30. W. all well.

On Monday last began playing a grand match of Cricket, on Lord's ground, Mary-la-bonne, nine Gentlemen of the Club, with Clifford and Beldam, against the county of Middlesex; for 1000 guineas; the former won.

To such an exquisite degree is the doctrine now extended of *Truth being a Libel*, that a man convicted of a felony at the *Old Bailey* threatened a prosecution, if his name should appear in the Callendar.

A few days since was killed at Louth, in Lincolnshire, a fat ox, in the bowels of which was found one guinea in gold, and five shillings in silver, the whole wrapped together in a piece of paper, and tied with a small string. The gold was very little tarnished, but the silver was turned black.

An ingenious mechanic in the West of England is preparing a borer, (with a steam-engine) of a large diameter, and will offer to clear away the chalk-hill at London-bridge, if he can agree with the Corporation.

Carlini, the Statuary, who died on Tuesday, was an artist who possessed great celerity for the skill and grace of his drapery. He might have been stiled a Genius, had not the superior minds of our English sculptors left him in this respect—far—far behind. Mr. Carlini came early to England—he was a native of Genoa, and was one of the earliest Members of the Royal Academy.

D I V O R C E.

A prosecution is instituted in the Ecclesiastical Court, by a Lady upwards of 50 years of age, to obtain a divorce *A VINCULO MATRIMONII* upon the ground of pre-contract.

Long depositions, containing several curious circumstances are filed on both sides.

The Gentleman is only 30 years of age.

The ground upon which divorces *A VINCULO MATRIMONII* are obtained, must be either impotency, affinity, pre-contract, or consanguinity, which is a total nullity of the marriage, and the parties are free to marry again without an Act of Parliament. But in case of adultery, cruelty, or any cause that happens subsequent to marriage, the divorce is only *A MENSA ET THORO*, (from bed and board) and the parties cannot re-marry during each others lives, without an Act of Parliament.
