WHEREAS the stealing of Horses, Sheep and
other Cattle, is become a very common practice, not-
withstanding the punishment for those offences is made DEATH
by law.

This is therefore to give Notice,

That the principal landholders and occupiers within the Upper
Division of the Lath of Scray, generally called the OGRAINGE
Division, have thought it necessary to form a Society, under
the management of their agents, for the better apprehending of
persons stealing any Horse, Mare or Gelding, Ox, Bull, Cow,

improved by becoming partly the *emporium* of its

The French emigrants are expected shortly to
form themselves into regiments, bearing the names
lately used by those of France, and having similar
colours.

On Saturday the 20th of August last, a rat of
enormous size was killed in one of the stables belong-
ing to Mr. Henry Thomas, of the Red Lion Inn, in
Landaff, in the county of Glamorgan. It measured
from the snout to the end of the tail, three feet two
inches; girth of the body across the breast, eighteen
inches, and weighed seven pounds twelve ounces and
a half.

On Monday last a battle was fought at Birming-
ham, between Thomas John and William Goodhall,
which terminated fatally to the latter.

When the Impregnable was paid off a few days
ago at Plymouth, all the seamen went to the pay-
table in uniform; and after receiving their wages,
they went respectfully to return thanks to all the
Officers for their treatment of them; as did also up-
wards of sixty fine boys, sons of the seamen, who,
from the liberality of the Officers, had been taught
to read and write.

A letter from Edinburgh, dated Sept, 5, says,
"A few days ago one of Mr. Meikle's threshing
machines, which Mr. Davidson, of Cantray, had
lately erected at Cantray, was tried for the first time,
when a large stack of barley was threshed in a few
hours, to the great surprise and satisfaction of a
number of the neighbouring gentlemen and farmers
who attended on the occasion."

Of the various sufferers by the late fires at Bir-
mingham, no one has equal cause to lament their
calamitous effects with the Dean of Waterford, who
was on a visit to Lady Carhampton, when her Lady-
ship's house, Moseley Hall, was set fire to; and
from being obliged to take his only son, a very pro-
mising youth of fourteen years of age, out of bed at
midnight, and remove him to a distant house, the
lad was so affected by affright and cold, that he has
been lying in a fever ever since, and is now past
hopes of recovery, at Reading.

On Saturday James Boudiel was taken before the
Right Hon. the Lord Mayor, at Guildhall, charged
with having married two wives. The register of
his first wife, who is now living, was proved; and
Elizabeth Vanhagen, the second wife, whom he
married in May 1788, appeared against him, and
proved her marriage to him. She deposed, that he
had left her a short time ago, and was going to
marry a third wife; that he had been asked in the
church. The means of his being taken was, by her
making her case known to the Churchwardens of
St. Olave's, Tooley-street, in which parish she lived;
who likewise appeared against him. He was com-
mitted to the Poultry Compter for trial.

A subscription has been set on foot in Dublin for
the purpose of raising a monument to the memory
of the late intelligent and facetious Capt Grose. The
subscription is warmly patronized, and something
will no doubt, be erected worthy of commemorating
the worth and talents of that learned antiquary and
distinguished wit.

At the fire in Berwick-street, on Friday, water
was wanting for more than an hour after its com-
mencement. In this time, the engines had some
supply from butts of beer drawn out of public houses
in the neighbourhood.

Friday night, between ten and eleven o'clock, a
fire broke out at a pork-shop in Lamb-street, Spital-
fields, which destroyed that house and the adjoining
one, a pawnbroker's besides greatly damaging several
others.

Sunday at noon a wholesale linendraper, in Loth-
bury, threw himself out of a three-pair of stairs win-
dow into the street and was killed on the spot.

Extract of a letter from Lewes, Sept. 12.

"On Thursday last the Prince arrived at his pa-
vilion at Brighton, after a week's absence. The
same day, and day following his Royal Highness,
with a select party of friends, dined in his marquee,
on the cricketing ground, where the second match
was played between the Brighton Club and Mr.
Bean's Club, which was won hollow by the former,
who beat their adversaries an innings, and more than
thirty notches.

"The subscription lately opened for the purpose
of erecting a tower for the reception of the old clock
and bell, belonging to this town, already amounts
to near five hundred pounds, for three of which we
are indebted to the generosity of William Plumer,
Esq; of Gilston Park, in Hertfordshire, some years
since one of our Representatives, and to our present
Members, the Hon. Henry Pelham, and Thomas
Kemp, Esq; who have subscribed 100l. each.

"The ground, whereon the clock-house and new
market-place are to be erected, has been granted to
the town in a liberal manner by Lord Hampden."
About two years since, a case covered with matting,
was received at the Yard of Messrs. Pain and Co. in
this city, by one of the coaches from down the road;
no direction was found on the case, but a label with
a direction had apparently been on it, which was
torn off, and no enquiry being made concerning it,
it was laid by in the porter's warehouse, where it re-
mained till yesterday morning, when on removing
the case, with some other articles that lay near it,
the matting gave way, and a piece of paper, on
which the following note was written, fell out:—

"Barnett Jacop,
"Please to get this child interr'd as soon as pos-
sible, the parents being of your tribe, and you
will soon receive a gratuity for so doing, from
"your well wisher,
"S. T."

Upon discovery of this note, the case was imme-
diately opened, when a small coffin was found within
side, and on opening the coffin, the body of an infant
inclosed, so disfigured and dried up as almost to ren-
der it impossible to recognize any human features in
it.—We are at a loss what conjectures to form on this
mysterious business, but hope this paragraph will be
the means of leading to some further information con-
cerning it.

On Wednesday last as Mr. Thomas Kingsnorth, of
Bethersden, was driving an empty waggon, the
horse took fright, and before he could disengage
himself the waggon went over his body, of which ac-
cident he languished a few hours and expired.

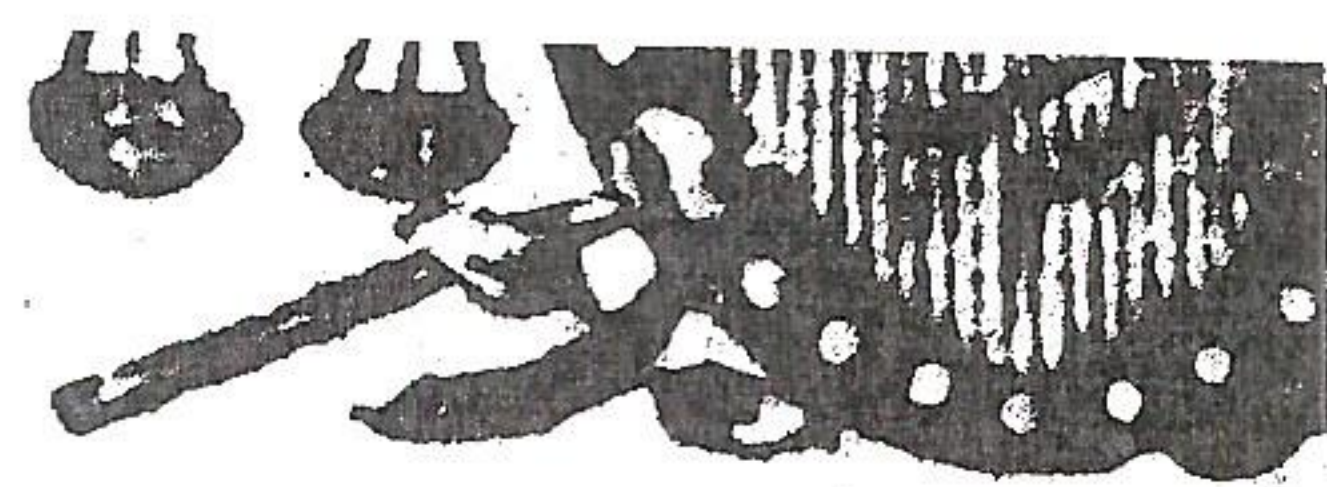
On Thursday Mr. Isaac White, of Boughton
Malherb, fell from his horse and fractured his skull,
of which he died soon after.

Friday afternoon between three and four o'clock,
as the Gravesend passage boat belonging to Messrs.
Minshaw and Co. that sails from the Dundee Arms,
Wapping, was coming down Limehouse-reach, the
wind blowing fresh, she carried away her mast close
to the board, by which accident a gentlewoman had
her arm broke in two places, and otherwise so much
shattered, that it is thought an amputation must take
place; several other passengers got hurt, but not of
much consequence: the people were all put on shore
at Rotherhithe, the boat being rendered incapable of
performing her voyage.

Yesterday John Petman, servant to Edward
Kingsford, miller, of Littlebourn, was convicted
before Gilbert Knowler, Esq; in the penalty of ten
shillings for riding upon a waggon in the highway
in the parish of Bridge, in this county, not having
any person on foot or horseback to guide the same,
nor any person to hold the reins of the horses.

L O N D O N.

Friday afternoon dispatches were received at the Secretary of State's office, Whitehall, from the Earl of Sandwich, Esq; his Majesty's Envoy at Berlin. The dispatches were carried to Lord Grenville, at his house in St. James's-square.

On Saturday the 4th ult. his Excellency Earl of Sandwich gave a most elegant entertainment in honour of the King, to all the British beauty and distinction which could be collected in Paris and its environs; many present, were the Earl and Countess of Sandwich, Lord Robert Fitzgerald, Lord Mountbatten, Lord Daer (son of the Earl of Selkirk) the Countess of Temple and Lady, Mr. Harley and Mrs. and Miss Brudnell, &c.

The following are mentioned as some of the alterations to be made in the new arrangement of the India Company.

It is to be believed, that though the Company is not to be dissolved, the end of the Charter is to be the end of its present form of Government. The Charter is to be brought still more immediately than it is at present, into the direction of the Crown. There will be a Council appointed by his Majesty, to sit at their places, like other officers of the Crown, for the directing pleasure.—The management of the revenues and expenditure of the provinces, and the judicial jurisdiction of the Company, will be referred to them; but the superintendance of the Company will be in a Court of Directors chosen by the King.

There will be six Members of the Council; and Lord Lushington is mentioned as likely to be Governor.

The outlines of a plan which will very much increase the patronage of the Crown, but which will also remedy some of the inconveniences arising from the united character of the Society and the Tradesman in the present Company. The Right Hon. Thomas Steele is appointed Secretary of the Navy, in the room of Mr. Dundas; and Lord Belgrave is to succeed Mr. Steele.

Charles Small Poyas, Esq. M. P. for the County of Middlesex, was presented to the King at the Levee at St. James's, when he had the honour to kiss his Majesty's hand, on being appointed one of the Lords of the Admiralty, in the room of Lord Sandwich.

Canterbury, June 9, 1791.

On Friday last the Royal Assent was given to an Act for continuing and amending certain Acts for repairing and widening the road from Flimwell Vent, in the county of Sussex, through Highgate, in this county, and the parishes of Sandhurst, Newenden, and Northiam, to Rye, in Sussex.

Last week in digging to lay the foundation of the new County Hospital, within the inclosure belonging to St. Augustin's Monastery, adjoining to Longport, the workmen, from the depth of one to about six feet, were much incommoded by an immense quantity of human bones and skulls; many of the jaws had all the teeth entire, and in very high preservation.—This spot Mr. Somner supposes to have been the cemetery or place of sepulture belonging to the Monastery; but from the promiscuous manner in which the bones lay, and not the least remains of a coffin appearing near them, it is conjectured that the ground has been much disturbed since their first interment; though some hollows in the earth resemble the human shape, and appear to have once contained entire bodies, but now wholly mouldered into dust. Great numbers of people are daily flocking to see these melancholy relicks of humanity, which certainly impress very strongly upon our minds the words of the Poet—

“ When self esteem, or others adulation,
 “ Would cunningly persuade us we were something
 “ Above the common level of our kind;
 “ The Grave gainsays the smooth complexion'd flattery,
 “ And with blunt truth acquaints us what we are.”

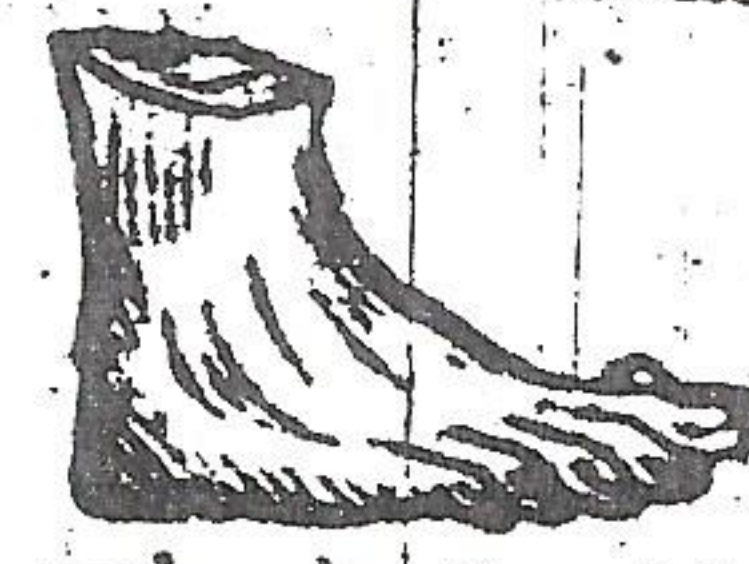
