Early on Friday morning last, the 17th regiment, consisting of two battalions, the 20th regiment and the 40th regiment, forming the brigade of infantry, under the command of Major-General Don, struck their tents on Barham Downs, and marched for Deal, where they were all safely embarked in the course of the day. The other brigades are expected to be all off the ground by the end of the week.—We have also the authority to state, that Government have advice that the expedition, under Admiral Mitchell, had been joined by Admiral Lord Duncan's Fleet, and were both off the Texel island on Friday last, all well.

Camp at Barham Downs, Saturday Aug. 24. "Every thing here is in a state of the greatest uncertainty in respect to our march to the coast. The officers are not made acquainted with any operation until the moment the orders are to be carried into execution.

"In the course of yesterday afternoon, orders came down from the War Office for the 4th and 5th brigades, consisting of about 6000 men, to march from hence, which they did at 2 o'clock this morning, under a very heavy rain, which continued until past 10. Their destination is no otherwise known, than as being for some part of the coast.

In consequence of the above orders, the Adjutant General sent a letter to the Mayor of Canterbury, requesting that he would press 18 waggons, to carry the baggage of the troops.

"The above orders for the 4th and 5th Brigades to march from hence were no sooner known, than an opinion prevailed that the whole camp was about to break up; but this is by no means certain. Representations were made to the commander in chief a few days ago, of the difficulty of providing for so large a body of men in one spot, and of the exorbitant price of all kind of provisions.

Gen. Hulse having left us on Tuesday, the command of the camp has devolved on Lieut. Gen. Sir C. Grey, who reviewed the whole line yesterday morning at 11. Nothing could exceed the healthy appearance of the troops, who are as fine a body of men as were ever

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Weymouth, Aug. 23.—This morning his Majesty and the Princesses Elizabeth and Amelia bathed.—At 11 o'clock their Majesties and the Princesses, with their attendants, accompanied by the Countess of Poulton, the Hon. Mr. Grant, and the Hon. Mr. and Mrs. Damer, went on board the St. Fiorenzo frigate; they were saluted from the ships in the Road, and from Portland Castle. As soon as the Royal Standard was hoisted at the main-top, the vessel stood across the Bay till 6 in the evening, when the Royal Party, having dined on board, came on shore.

On their return, the King inspected the picquet guard, and gave the Officers the counter-sign to be observed by the men on duty.—The evening was spent at the Lodge, to which a select party of Nobility were invited.—As their Majesties walked to the Pier Head to go on board the frigate, a Child was run over by a servant on horseback and much bruised. The King blamed the man for his carelessness and ordered the infant to be taken care of.

Aug. 24. The Princess Augusta and Sophia bathed this morning.

After breakfast, the King and Princess Sophia, Lady C. Bellafyse, Lord Cathcart, and General Garth, rode on horseback on the road to Dorchester. The First or Royal Dragoons, commanded by General Goldsworthy, had a field day previous to their being reviewed.

The Queen and Princesses, the Countess of Poulett, Lady Neale and Lady C. Somerset, met his Majesty at the Hon. Mr. Damer's Seat, at Carne, where after walking in the pleasure grounds, they were entertained by Mrs. Damer, with an elegant cold collation.

I R E L A N D.

Dublin, Aug. 20. Late on Saturday night last an Express arrived at Dublin Castle, which was immediately forwarded to his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, at Castle-town, the seat of Mr. Conolly.

The Express, which was from Admiral Kingsmill, at Cove, stated the arrival there of the Diamond, of 38 guns, with dispatches from Lord Keith, dated the 14th inst. off Brest harbour, into which the combined fleet had escaped the day before, and where they were then blockaded by the Squadron under his Lordship.

The Diamond further reports, that from the vast quantity of floating masts, yards, rigging, &c. seen in the track of the combined fleet, it was presumed they had suffered severely from heavy gales of wind.

The sailing of the 6th, 41st, and Wexford regiments, which were embarked at the Cove of Cork, the two former for Canada, and the latter for Jersey, is countermanded.

The return of the military force at present in the country, notwithstanding the number that have recently embarked for the new expedition, amounts, we hear, to above 70,000 effective men, 14,000 of which, and no more, are Irish militia. These, with the brave Yeomanry, and, if necessary, a body of Loyalists never yet called into action, of 300,000, bid defiance to all the enemies of their King and Country.

"The officers have a severe duty, as the troops are in constant exercise at bay-break every morning, which is indeed highly necessary, in order to organize the battalions. The men in many companies are yet unacquainted to their officers as well as their own comrades, and a general selection that has been made from every regiment. The variety of cloathing has caused a little embarrassment; but to prevent this as much as possible, new facings have been put to the old uniforms. Under the present discipline, another regulation would go very far to place things on their proper footing. Prince William of Gloucester has not missed a parade since he came among us, and from having removed from his cottage, and taken a new house, belonging to Mr. Payler, at Heden, we suppose our stay here will be some days longer.

"The Duke of York is hourly expected. The Prince of Wales has signified his intention to go to Gipps, one of the Members for Canterbury, who shall sleep at his seat at Harbledown on Monday.—It is supposed that this is a farewell visit to his relative, and to some of the officers of the army.

"The heavy baggage of the different regiments has been sent to Dover, under the charge of a Captain and two Subalterns from each regiment. It is to be deposited in Dover Castle, until the return of the army from the Continent. The greatest attention will be paid to take as little baggage as possible. The officers are restricted to a very small space indeed, and many have been obliged to make entire new purchases, to accommodate themselves to the general arrangements.

"Very large quantities of arms arrived this morning from town, which were distributed among the different corps."

Deal, Saturday, Aug. 24. "This morning, after seven o'clock, 6000 troops marched into the place from the Camp at Barham Downs. They were dripping wet, as it rained the whole way. Two thousand of them embarked this day; and the remainder will embark to-morrow. There are about 70 transports now lying in the Downs."

Ramsgate, Saturday, Aug. 24. Twelve large transports are come into the basin of this harbour to receive the cavalry on board. They are expected to be embarked to-morrow.—More transports are expected.

Chatham, Aug. 24. The Namur, of 90 guns, ordered to this port to be fitted, (as is supposed) for guardship to be at the Nore. The Eagle Dutch gun-ship, at this port is ordered to be converted into an hospital ship, in lieu of the Victory, of 100 guns, which is ordered to be docked and fitted for service.

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peared has been evacuated by all the inhabitants, and shut up. Every precaution has been taken to prevent the spreading of the disorder, which is said to have been imported from the Havannan; but we fear it has taken root in Philadelphia itself.

The Anniversary of American Independence had been celebrated with joy and harmony. A restricted intercourse has been opened with St. Domingo. An intercourse with that island has been opened from Cuba and Jamaica; but the latter appears to be very clandestine and confined.

We find that the first reports of Gen. Maitland's having concluded a successful negotiation with Touffaint, the Mulatto Chief at St. Domingo, were not correct. No officer of greater experience could have been employed on this service, but it appears that Touffaint is so closely allied with the French interest, as to extinguish all hope of our being able to conclude any advantageous treaty with the colonies of that island.

The grand army of Suwarrow remains in the environs of Novi, Javi, and Acqui, and Moreau's head-quarters are still at Savona, which place an Imperial officer reports is bombarded by some English ships of war.

Genoa is stated in private letters to have secretly capitulated to an English fleet off that harbour.

The Petersburg Gazette of July 1, contains a long letter, written in the name of Sir S. Smith to his brother the Ambassador at Constantinople, by Mr. Keith, Secretary to the Commodore, dated from the Tigre, in the road of Acre, May 16. This letter mentions what a bloody reception the French Hero met with in his 11th attack upon Acre. Sir Sidney himself rushed upon the enemy's bayonets before they had time to fire off, after mounting the breach they had made in the wall, which was so large that a whole battalion might have marched through it drawn up in front. But no sooner had the enemy mounted the breach, than they met with instant and terrible destruction. The English sailors called that breach, the Commodore's Mouse trap. Sir Sidney is called the *Miraculous Man of the Temple*. It was on May 12, in the afternoon, when Buonaparte was wounded in the thigh. All his popularity was gone; no more dances, no more joyous acclamations before his camp; he has lost the good opinion of the inhabitants of the Levant. And there were then two Sheiks from the mountain on board the Tigre to compliment Sidney Bey, and promised him an auxiliary corps of 12,000 men from their tribe.

The King of Candy was highly pleased with the attention paid him by the Hon. Mr. North, in his late visit on February 4. His Excellency set out from the Government-house, escorted by a party of troops. Candy contains about a quarter of the island of Ceylon; and as it is encompassed with high mountains, and covered with thick forests, his Excellency found his journey rather unpleasant, until he arrived in the open country. The King met him upon the road, and received him very graciously. After he had received the presents which had been prepared for him, he in return made a suitable acknowledgement in articles of great value, particularly the oil of nutmegs and cinnamon, which is very scarce, and held in high estimation by the natives, but it is only to be found about his Majesty. Mr. North returned to the fort the next day, after having received the most flattering assurances from the King of Candy of his good wishes for the success of his administration.

A quantity of valuable articles of art arrived last week in Paris from Italy, in which were the medallions of the Popes, arranged in rows methodically, in cases of very fine wood, made with much taste, and decorated with the arms of the Popes, and other ornaments in gold. Three or four cases are full of manuscripts, among which are *Dante, with commentaries*;

Canterbury, August 13.

The lovers of the Drama residing at or visiting Margate, and its contiguity, will have a rich treat in the course of a few days, we hear so early as *Friday* next, by Mr. Kemble's performance of *The Stranger* in the play of that name; and, it is said, he means to perform several of the characters, for which he is eminently distinguished—*Hamlet, Penruddock, Othavian*, and, we are happy to add, *Rolla*, in the most admirable play of *Pizarro*, which is esteemed his *chef d'œuvre*.—True it is, we witnessed his performance of that character in London, and must bear testimony, with tens of thousands, that it is not possible for human excellence to go beyond it.

The second encampment on Barham Down, which commenced on Friday last, is expected to be complete by Thursday next. It will consist of between 18 and 20,000 men, forming the main body for the expedition. The infantry named are, the 4th, 5th, 9th, 17th, 20th, 21st, 35th, 40th, 56th, and 63d regiments of foot, which have been augmented by volunteers from the militia. The 5th, 9th, 17th, 20th, 35th, 56th and 63d, some of which regiments contain from two to four battalions each, are already upon the ground; the 4th and 40th came in yesterday, and will take their station in the camp this day. To this force are to be added, 40 squadrons of cavalry, and 1000 of the royal artillery. The whole of this armament is composed of men in the prime of life. The 20th regiment travelled above 250 miles in the space of ten days; and notwithstanding the extreme fatigue of the men, from long watching, almost incessant rain, and badness of many of the roads, the cheerfulness and spirit every where displayed, have no precedent. If a perfect unanimity among the soldiery, and an eager desire to engage in the service, be an augury of future success, England may enjoy the most promising expectation from the present expeditions; for in truth it may be asserted, that so general a willingness and military ardour were never manifest upon any former occasion.

The immense train of farmers and artillery waggons, employed in conveying the troops and baggage, ammunition, military and other stores, and provisions, towards the camp, adding the numerous carriages filled with officers and other passengers; these together have produced a scene of populousness and traffic in this ancient city, which has not been beheld by its inhabitants since the days of St. Thomas Becket, the fame of whose Shrine brought hither such multitudes of strangers from all parts.

The camp at Birchington broke up on Saturday night, and the whole embarked at Margate on Sunday morning.—Several of the wives and children of the men embarked, who could not return home by water on account of the general embargo, have come into this city, from the isle of Thanet, and been provided with food, money, and lodging, by the bounty of Mr. William Baldock, brewer, till they can be conveyed to their respective parishes.—Ten women to 100 men were permitted to be taken on board.

On Saturday last the men and horses of the 18th light dragoons arrived at Ramsgate; also with them the horses belonging to the Staff for the first expedition. They were immediately embarked on board the transports in the pier. Sunday the signals being made from the Downs, for the transports in the harbour to join the fleet, the whole, with cavalry and infantry, sailed for that purpose on Sunday night, and it was intended that the whole force for the first expedition

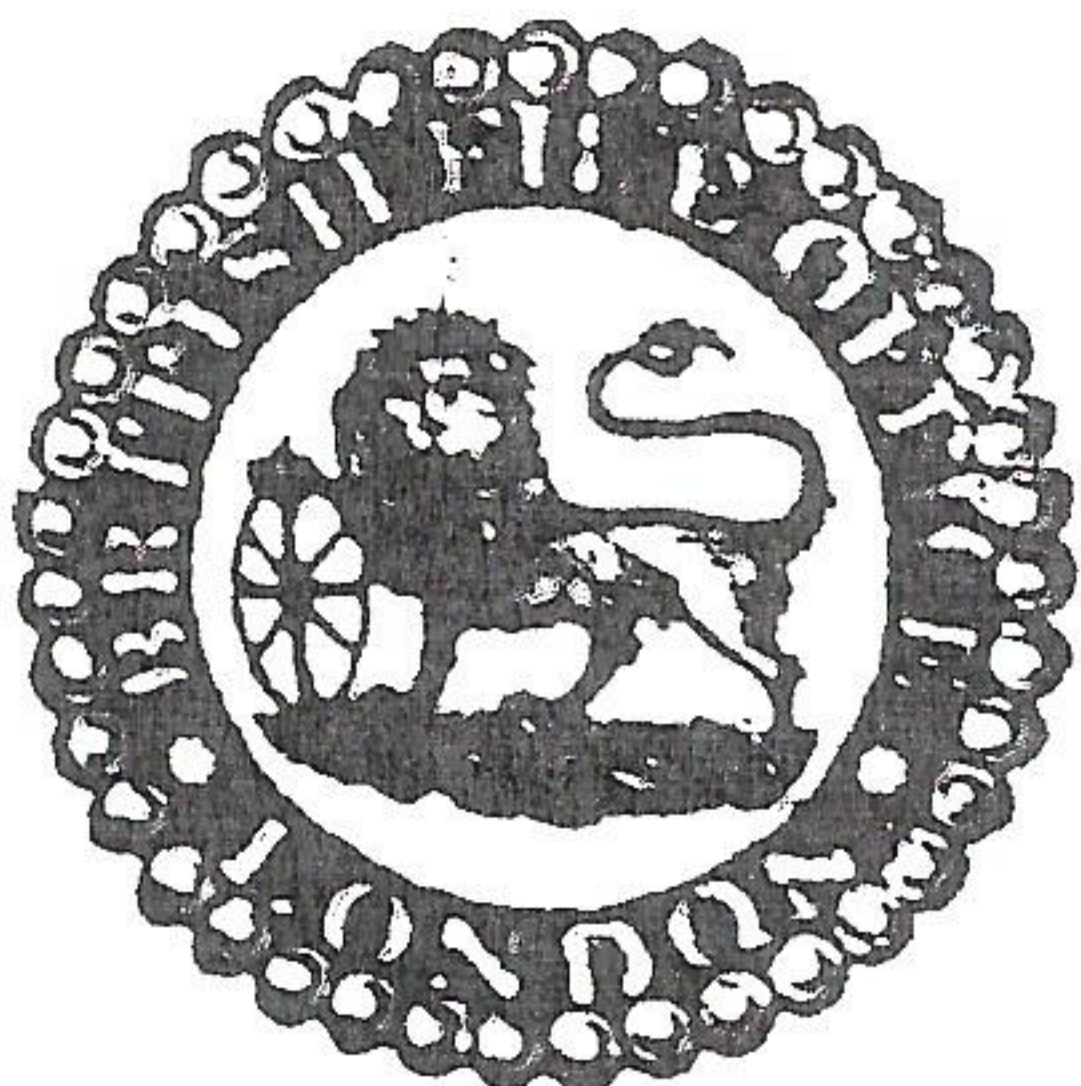

A letter from Copenhagen, dated Aug. 19, says as follows:—"On Tuesday last the following ships, chiefly armed *en flûte*, arrived in the road of Elsinor: the Alkmaar, of 56 guns; Tromp, of 54; Romulus, of 36; and Blonde, of 32; with the transports, the Walter Boyd and Minerva. These vessels sailed yesterday eastward, for the purpose of taking Russian troops on board."

Twenty five guineas were given Tuesday to receive one hundred, if the war should continue a year from this date. So confident are some of the speculators that they thus bet three to one that there will be a peace in 12 months. The funds, and particularly omnium, sympathized in this conjecture. The new five per cents. were within a fraction of 99, and omnium nearly at 20 per cent. premium.

A letter from Liverpool dated Aug. 19, says, "We have experienced the heaviest rain in the memory of man, since Wednesday noon it has been incessant; the London mail that should have been here by two o'clock in the morning, did not arrive till after seven o'clock in the evening, being forwarded over the flooded places in boats, the coach being obliged to be left behind."

A correspondent from Northwich informs us that there has been there the largest flood ever remembered; it has been two feet five inches higher than ever known. The damage sustained cannot be ascertained; there are no works about Northwich but what have suffered very much; Mess. Baneroffs will lose upwards of 300 tons of salt. The Old Rock Pit has a good deal of water in it, and was with difficulty prevented from filling. Mr. John Marshall and young Mr. Wakefield exerted themselves greatly, and saved several lives; the latter getting people out of the windows for several hours in boats.

The waters are so much out in Bedfordshire, that the farmers at Campton, Henslow, Selfoe, Chicksand, Gravenhurst, Shellington, &c. are obliged to pursue a very circuitous route over the high lands in taking their cattle, grain, and other commodities for sale to Bedford and Biggleswade market.

At Lansdown Fair, on Monday se'nnight, which was numerously attended; there was a considerable show of grazing cattle, the sale of which was heavy, owing to the apprehension of the shortness of feed; horses of superior kinds fetched high prices, but inferior sorts, of which there was a great number, scarcely saleable. Half cow cheese from 38s.—to 40s. per cwt: best coward from 44s to 48s.—Not any old cheese at the fair. A gentleman of Bath had his pocket picked of 150l.
