Lord Hobart said, that not to agree in this resolution would be throwing a very unjust censure on the Irish Parliament, by supposing that they had not given the subject every possible consideration. There was another reason why it was incumbent on the English to agree with the Irish Parliament in this resolution; there was ground to suppose that many of the great Commoners of Ireland had been induced to consent to an Union, from the hope of being hereafter created Irish Peers when vacancies should take place; and therefore the important question of Whether the Union was to take place at all, or not? might depend on the circumstance of the English Parliament adopting or rejecting this resolution.

Lord Caernarvon again repeated his objections to the measure. Lord Darnley said he would not object to the measure, but he hoped that it was not intended to be perpetual, but that it might be gradually done away.

Lord Romney explained. The Marquis of Downshire objected to the Resolution as it stood, as inimical to the principles of the Constitution.

The House then divided upon the Amendment—Contents 12—Non Contents 42—Majority 36 against the Amendment. The Article allowing his Majesty to create new Irish Peers being read, a short conversation and division ensued.—For the Article 42—Against it 9.

The Article allowing a general exportation from this country of all articles and raw materials of manufacture being read.

Lord Caernarvon moved an exception in the case of wool. A short conversation took place between the Noble Lord and Lord Grenville, and a division ensuing, the amendment was rejected by a majority of 36, viz.—Contents 4—Non-contents 40.

Lord Caernarvon trusted that the Noble Lord (Grenville) did not mean to press the House to vote the Address that night, as he thought they ought to have time to consider the amendments. If the Noble Lord did mean to persist moving it, he should go over the whole of his objections again, and would not be deterred by any call for the question.

Lord Grenville observed, that the amendments were all of a verbal nature, and he had endeavoured to explain them as he went along, and then moved, That the Report should be taken into further consideration to-morrow, at 11 o'clock.

The Motion being agreed to, the House adjourned.

HOUSE OF COMMONS—Wednesday, May 7.

Lord Granville Leveson Gower reported from the Select Committee on the petition of Sir George Pigot and others, relative to the celebrated Pigot Diamond. It appeared from the Report, that Mr. Jeffries and another Jeweller were examined before the Committee as to the value of the Diamond, which they concur in estimating at 25,000l. They thought it even cheap at that sum. The Report being agreed to, leave was given to bring in a Bill to enable Sir George Pigot and the other parties interested, to dispose of the Diamond by way of Lottery.

Sir John Anderson obtained leave to bring in a Bill for extending the provisions of two Acts for regulating the conduct of Drivers of Carts in the streets of London. The Hon. Member also obtained leave to bring in a Bill, founded on the 3d James the First, for the more easy recovery of Small Debts, and for ameliorating the situation of prisoners for small debts, confined in the City of London.

The Temple-bar Entry Improvement Bill was read a third time, and passed.

On the motion of Mr. Peale, the Petition presented by that Gentleman yesterday from a Mr. Podden, chemist, of Coventry, was referred to a Committee.

Mr. Abbot moved for an account of the nett produce of the fees and emoluments of the Clerk and Clerk Assistant of the House of Commons for the last seven years, distinguishing the amount of each year.—Ordered.

On the motion of Mr. Rose the House went into a Committee on the Hackney Coaches Bill.

Mr. Rose moved the following, among other alterations of the rates of hire, &c. which were severally agreed to, viz.—Sixpence additional on the present 1s. 6d. rate, but not to attach to any rate lower. The 1s. fare, which is now one mile and a quarter, to be reduced one mile, and 6d. for every half mile beyond the first mile. The rate for a day's work is raised to 18s. and the ground to be travelled in such day limited to twenty miles. Mr. Rose added, that every one of the Regulations were suggested by the Commissioners for Hackney Coaches.

General Hulse succeeds to the command of the military in this district, in the room of General Sir Charles Grey. Barham Court is engaged for his residence, where he is expected in a few days. We understand arrangements were made for an encampment of 25,000 men upon Barham Downs, but the orders for that purpose, at present, are suspended.

This morning, at four o'clock, the first battalion of the 52d regiment of foot, commanded by General Cyrus Trapaud, commenced their march, from their barracks in this city, across the country by daily encampment, for Shirley Common, near Southampton, where they are to halt till further orders.

There are to be six regiments of cavalry, of 800 men each, encamped at Swinley; two troops of mounted, and a large park of artillery; amounting, in the whole, to nearly 6000 men, and as many horses. At Bagshot there will be a very large encampment of infantry, consisting of 3000 Guards and 12 regiments of the line, making together about 15,000 men. Five thousand men take the ground on Shirley Common, Southampton—These camps are to be augmented as troops can be collected. It is also in contemplation to have a formidable camp on Barham Downs. The head quarters of his Royal Highness the Commander in Chief will be at Bagshot house, from its contiguity to the cavalry and infantry camps. The troops begin to take the field next week, and will continue to do so, as fast as they arrive from their different cantonments.

A very melancholy circumstance occurred at Sheerness early on Saturday morning last; Captain Palmer, of the Selby armed ship, shot himself through the head with a pistol; he lingered till half past five in the evening, when he expired.

Thursday last came into the custody of the Keeper of the County Gaol at Maidstone, Wm Ford and Robt Cole, charged of having feloniously stolen from the dock yard, Deptford, two copper sheets, the property of his Majesty.

A few days since was seized at Dymchurch, 221 half ankers of spirits, and a chest of tea, by J. Hutchinson and W. Michaux, excise officers, Ashford, and the same were lodged at the Excise office, Ashford.

Mr. Taylor, the apothecary, who married Lord Stanhope's daughter, and Mr. Pitt's niece, is appointed Deputy Comptroller of the Customs, worth about 2000l. a year.

Our letters from Dublin contain the proceedings of the Irish Parliament down to Wednesday. On Monday the resolutions of the British Parliament were introduced to the two Houses in Ireland, by a speech from the Lord Lieutenant. No debate occurred in the Lords; but in the Commons the motion for leave to bring in a bill to regulate the election of Peers and Commoners to represent Ireland in the Imperial Parliament was opposed: Noes, 80; Ayes, 135. The Majority was greatly increased since the last meeting.

Yesterday morning arrived the Hamburgh Mail. It brings no official intelligence of consequence from Italy. Private letters from Kempen, of the 30th of April state that three couriers had passed through the Grison country, with intelligence of the capitulation of General Massena, and the city of Genoa. The Vienna Court Gazette of the 3d inst. however, says nothing on that subject, but in a supplement gives farther details of the late actions.—It appears that General Melas has given some repose to his troops, and is preparing to intrench himself in the neighbourhood of Genoa, expecting the surrender of the city before the arrival of reinforcements from France.—Accounts from the Rhine are nearly of as late a date as those in the last Paris papers, and prepare us for very important intelligence; which, if to the effect of what was lately given in the telegraphic bulletins, it is strange it has not reached us in some more palpable shape. A neutral vessel arrived at Dover from Calais on Friday, brought no papers or any news.

We are told, that a Cabinet Council was assembled at Lord Grenville's Office on Friday, upon important business, and that the debate on the Income Bill was adjourned in order to prevent interruption to their deliberations, which continued during several hours. It is asserted that the subject of their discussion was the last dispatch received from Lord Minto, his Majesty's Plenipotentiary at Vienna. His Excellency is said to have written home, that new Overtures of Peace were confidently expected in that Capital from the French; and that if the proposals of the Chief Consul were rightly anticipated, they were of a nature so advantageous to the Roman Emperor, as to render it prudent to be prepared for every alternative.

The Privy Council have very properly determined to issue a Special Commission for the immediate trial of Hadfield.

There is one circumstance which, but for the late attempt, would perhaps have been considered of little importance; but which, since that attempt, has been considered worthy of official and serious investigation.

On Monday night last the Countess Dowager of Albemarle returned to her own house from a route at a late hour. Her servant brought up to her Ladyship a letter which had been picked up in the street opposite to her house.

It was directed "To his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, upon State affairs of the utmost importance." The letter had been trampled in the dirt, and the seal was opened. It was brought up to Lady Albemarle open. The substance of the letter was, that a diabolical conspiracy was formed against the sacred life of his Majesty, which, if not seasonably prevented, would make its desperate attempt in a few days. That the writer felt it his duty to apprise his Royal Highness of the treasonable plot, being well assured that he would exert himself to save the life of the best of fathers; and that he had no doubt but that Mr. Pitt would be able to frustrate the design, and discover the traitors, as more than one person was concerned in it."

This letter, which had neither signature or date, was transmitted by her ladyship on Tuesday morning to the Duke of Portland. His Grace, after thanking her Ladyship for having communicated it to him, ob-

A Common Hall having been summoned to meet on Friday for general business a number of Aldermen attended: and as soon as the Court was formed,

The Lord Mayor, with much feeling, addressed the members, saying, he hoped no individual would suspect, that any consideration of a personal nature, nor a slight consideration of a public one, could induce him to procrastinate or to interrupt the business of that Court; but as no one could be ignorant of what had passed on Thursday night in a public Theatre, nor fail in participating in the agitation which had been created by it; and, as he knew that his respectable friend, Mr. Thorp, was prepared to move an address from that Court to his Majesty—to congratulate him on his providential escape, he hoped the Court would excuse him, if, after the address was agreed to, he forbore to bring forward any other business.

Mr. Thorp, in a few words, in which he expressed his attachment to the sacred person of his Majesty: a Sovereign—who reigned over his people with the mildest benevolence, moved—"That a dutiful and loyal address be presented to the King, congratulating his Majesty on his providential escape from the late atrocious attempt on his most sacred life."

Mr. Sam. Dixon seconded the motion, and said, it must be seen, that an all-superintending Providence guarded the person of the best of Kings. The address was then agreed to, and it will be presented next Wednesday by the whole Court. The Lord Mayor afterwards went to the Levee, and was very graciously received by the King.

BIRTH-DAY DRESSES.

The following were the most distinguished:

Her Majesty—A blue crape petticoat, ornamented with drapery of the same colour, and drawn up in festoons with diamond bands, composed of collars and large brilliant stars. — These bands were terminated with bows and tassels of diamonds and pearls. The pocket-holes were fastened with a superb diamond and pearl bows. The diamond and pearl bands and chains appeared to great advantage by being placed on wreaths of purple and jessamine leaves. The body and train were of purple and silver gauze, trimmed with leaves of jessamine. Her Majesty wore a superb diamond stomacher, and necklace, and a diamond bouquet. The head-dress was composed of a magnificent diamond bandeau, with brilliant drops.

The Princess of Wales.—A petticoat of silver net, over a white satin, ornamented with wreaths of silver flowers and white jessamine leaves. Over the left corner flowed part of her Highness's train of white crape, ornamented with silver fringe and plumes, and full dress tassels. The bottom of the petticoat was trimmed with a silver fringe, and the pocket-holes ornamented with platted spangled lace and laurel. The body and sleeves were of white crape, covered with silver net, looped up with bands and roses of diamonds. The head-dress consisted of a grand display of jewellery, with a diamond necklace.

Princess Augusta—A purple crape petticoat, embroidered with silver and spangles. Over the right side flowed a drapery differently spangled, and bordered with embroidery of silver foil and spangles, drawn up in festoons, with fancy foil flowers. — The left corner was also ornamented with a small embroidered drapery, and a silver fringe round the bottom of the petticoat, and cords and tassels to the pocket-holes. The body and train of purple silver gauze.

Princess Mary.—A blue crape petticoat, embroidered with silver spangles, over the right corner of which flowed a double drapery, drawn up in festoons, with bunches of blue and silver foil flowers. A small embroidered drapery flowed over the left corner of the petticoat. The body and train was of blue and silver gauze.

Princess Amelia.—A petticoat composed of two silver embroidered white crape draperies, over a lilac satin. One of the draperies was ornamented with lilac and green leaves, the other drawn up in festoons with silver laurels, fastened with bunches of lilac flowers. The body and train of lilac tulle.

The Dukes of York.—A yellow crape petticoat, spangled with silver, terminated at bottom with an elegant embroidered border, intermixed with painted leaves in shades of purple and lilac, the drapery ornamented with a longer border on the right side, and decorated on the left with diamonds, and silver cords and tassels. The body and train of yellow crape, embroidered with silver, and ornamented round the neck and sleeves with diamonds.

Countess Dowager of Ely.—An elegant crape coat, on the right side a drapery, with a rich border of purple and silver foil flowers, intermixed with bunches of silver grapes and green foil leaves, the same at the bottom of the coat, the whole covered with raised silver spots, trimmed with silver fringe, cord

The ball-room was excessively crowded, and never, perhaps, were so many beautiful and splendidly dressed women assembled together in so small a space. The crowd was so great, that before the dancing began, most of the benches were removed to make room. Four ladies fainted with the heat and pressure; and the Princess Elizabeth, with her usual attention, sent them her smelling bottle. Two of them had water brought into the room. The display of diamonds was unusually grand. The Queen was quite in a blaze, and every other lady more or less decorated with them. Her Majesty was in conversation with Lord Chesterfield the whole evening, and, as usual, was partial in her notice of the ladies dancing who saluted her. — To Lady Charlotte Jenkinson she was particularly attentive. The King, who had nothing brilliant but his sword knot and buckles, was in close conversation with Mr. Pitt most of the night. Both their Majesties seemed to be in high spirits. The King at first laughed and talked with the Princess Augusta, and the Queen with the Royal Dukes. The Princess Elizabeth looked very beautifully, and danced with great grace. Her dress was elegant and becoming. The Duke of Cumberland danced extremely well. Princess Mary went through the country dances with uncommon spirit. Almost all the dresses in the Ball-room were singularly splendid; but neither green nor flowers appeared much, and only one nosegay. The Princess Augusta's petticoats were remarkably long. Lady Charlotte Jenkinson was one of the most elegant dancers in the room. There were only two country dances, and only eight couple danced. The Gentlemen almost all wore uniforms.

FASHIONS.

The prevailing colours were lilac, yellow, green, and some slate colours: Chamberly mullins were much worn; also coloured crape and flowers. The hair was dressed in the Grecian style, without powder, to show the back of the neck, in bows, fastened with combs of diamonds, gold, &c. The front of the neck rather more covered than has lately been the fashion; ear-rings chiefly drop diamonds.

Scarcely a lady appeared without a wreath of diamonds or pearls; some caps richly spangled and trimmed with silver Vandykes were worn; they looked very beautiful. Several Paradise plumes also appeared. Bandeaux were much worn, and a profusion of feathers, diamonds, topazes, and antiques were general. The Gentlemen wore buff coloured silk stockings.

ILLUMINATIONS.

We have seldom seen the city so lively on such an occasion. The crowd traversing the streets in columns, rendered it a most impossible to pass in any other direction than theirs; and great multitudes were stationary at the principal illuminations. The Mansion-house attracted by far the greater number. Of the six pillars which adorn its front four were highly decorated. Nine rows of lamps were placed obliquely round each, which, terminating in cloisters at the top, had a very pleasing appearance. Between the two middle pillars were the letters G. R. with a star under them, and a crown over them; and between these and the next were hung His Majesty's arms, decorated with lamps. A few festoons, fancifully placed, completed the design, and gave the whole a simple, light, and elegant appearance.

The India House was the next in brilliancy; the columns in front were connected by two straight rows of lamps, at about four feet distance from one another; the intermediate spaces were filled up with a crown, G. R. and two stars, all of the same coloured lamps. The windows of the house were also illuminated. This design was very formal and stiff.

The entrance to Coade and Sealey's new erected Gallery, near Westminster bridge, had a very appropriate design. A bust of His Majesty appeared, encircled with a brilliant arch of variegated lamps, as a Glory. Over his head appeared a cherub flying with a shield, and on a scroll were the words "*Divine Protection*," beautifully adapted to the present occasion.

Runsell, on Ludgate-hill, ornamented his house with a very fanciful exhibition; the initials of his Majesty's name, surmounted by a superb crown; and various coloured diamonds, were skirted by orange festoons, suspended from bunches of green; the whole very neatly disposed.

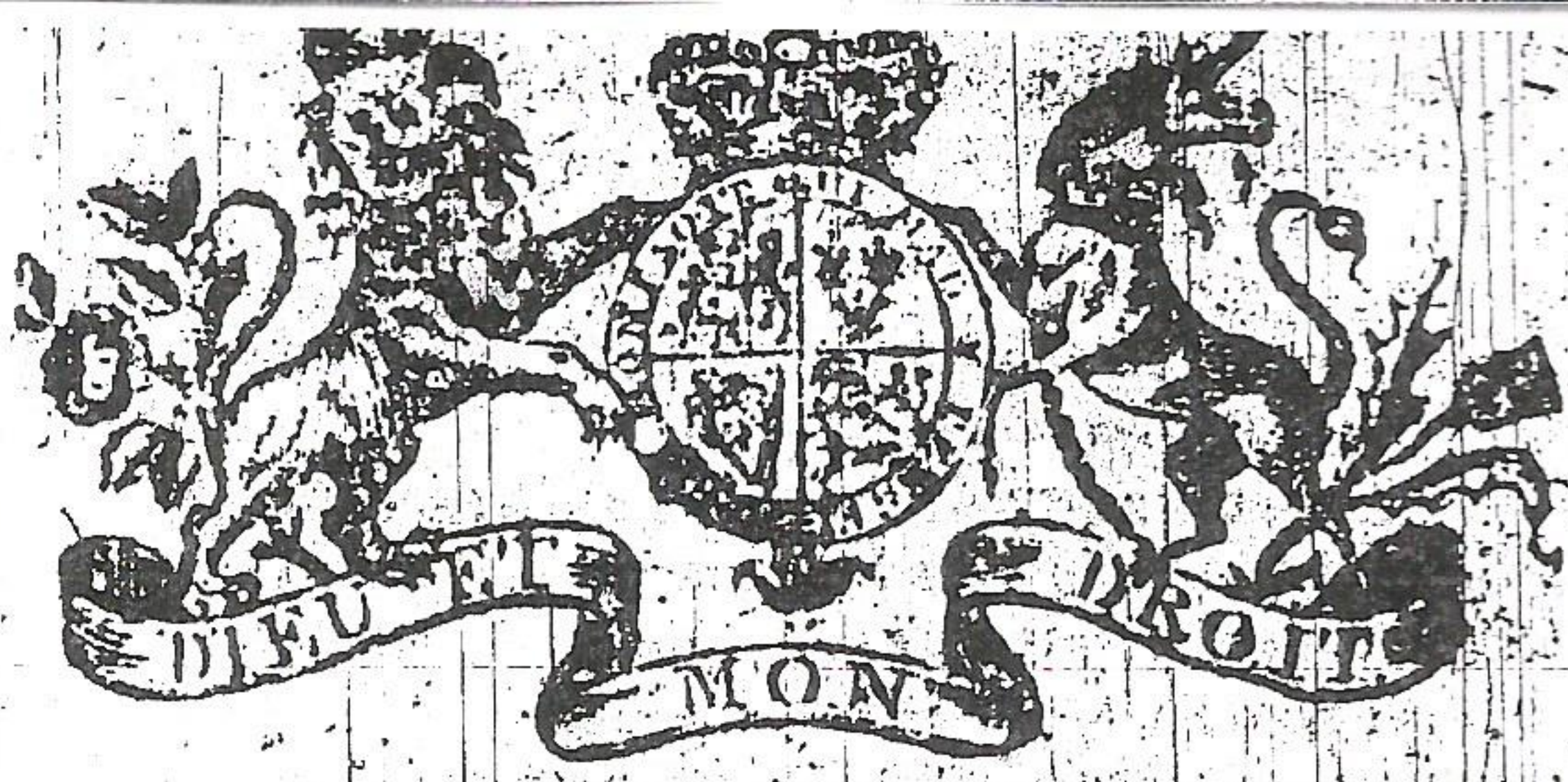

Chief Consul pre-emptorily refused every kind of mediation, or to allow Great Britain to become a party to the treaty.

An entire change has taken place in the Government of Switzerland. The Legislative Councils are abolished, and a Council of 43 members, (Bonaparte's own creatures) established in their place. The Executive Committee in their message to the Councils on this occasion, represent the existing Constitution as "neither calculated for their wants, nor resources, without security for its own existence, and full of contradictions and imperfections. The innumerable crowd of public functionaries, the immature produce of the choice of the people, not sufficiently prepared for the exercise of their sovereignty." Yet this was the Constitution which was considered a few months since, as the subject of inexhaustible panegyric.

We were on Wednesday evening favoured with the Paris Journals to the 16th inclusive. We have only leisure to mark the general outline of their contents.

The attention of the French Editors is chiefly directed to the change of politics in the Cabinet of St. Petersburg, and to the assembling of a very large Russian force on the borders of the Vistula. The army increases daily, and is calculated to amount to one hundred thousand men. It is to take a position on the Danube, during the Negotiations for Peace. This circumstance explains the cause of the numerous reinforcements which have been and still continue to be sent from France and Holland, to strengthen the positions of the enemy in Germany—at the same time the Chief Consul urges the ratification of the Preliminaries signed at Paris, before the Russians can be in a state to interfere with any effect in the general Peace of the Continent. So late as 14th inst. large bodies of troops were sent off from Paris to the Frontiers.

A very interesting order has been published by the Minister of the Interior, in regard to the Emigrants, in which it is said—"it is not sufficient that the Emigrants should do no harm; but their return must not even give rise to inquietude." Again—"the Government can no more restore the property of the purchasers of national estates to returned Emigrants, that it can restore France herself to the Bourbons."

The French Journals continue to observe the most profound silence respecting the signature of the Preliminaries of Peace on the 29th ult.

Accounts have at length been received of the Fleet which lately sailed to the northward. A cutter arrived at Yarmouth with dispatches from Admiral Dickson reports, that the Fleet was left sailing for Elsinour.

It is with pleasure we have to record an additional instance of the enterprising spirit and successful exertion of our cruizers. The Inspector sloop, Captain Sayer, has cut out of a port in Friesland several merchant vessels, which are safely arrived in Yarmouth Roads.

In consequence of intelligence received from the Continent, a Cabinet Council, at which most of his Majesty's Ministers attended, was held, on Wednesday morning, at the Office of the Secretary of State for the War Department.

The Court of Directors of the East-India Company gave a grand dinner on Wednesday at the London Tavern, in compliment to General Harris, who distinguished himself in the taking of Seringapatam. The Chancellor of the Exchequer and other Members of Administration, and the Lords of the Admiralty, were present.

The New Thames and Medway Canal (the line of which has been lately begun to be staked out by the engineer,) promises to be of great local and public utility, and though but eight miles and an half in length, will supersede the necessity of going 47 miles by water, between London and Rochester.

It appears by the papers of entries, that 10,000 qrs. of wheat arrived last Tuesday in the port of London, and vast quantities are daily expected: combining, therefore, the prospect of an abundant harvest with the vast quantities of corn daily imported, and now on their passage, bread will experience a reduction in price, which even the speculations of monopoly cannot counteract.

A Letter received on Wednesday from a very respectable Gentleman on a visit at Ludlow, in Shropshire, mentions the following very distressing particulars:—

The following ships sailed from Yarmouth roads on Saturday: nine men of war, four bombs, five gun-brigs, two sloops, and two cutters, to join an Admiral and a fleet of transports without.

The Gazette of Saturday night contains a relation of one of the most gallant achievements of the whole war, and will be read with national exultation and delight. It does not appear that the superiority of our gallant Tars, upon this occasion, was owing to firing at the hull of the French vessel; for they had no artillery to fire, and were not a fourth part in number to the enemy, who had three 24 and four 6-pounders on board and was defended by three batteries on his own shore! What will the Moniteur now think of its late elaborate disquisition?

Some impediments to the departure of the Turkish Ambassador have arisen from the absence of the King, and the great inconvenience that would result from his Excellency going to Weymouth to take leave. These matters have, however, been adjusted by a letter from his Majesty, and the Ambassador will on Thursday set off for Yarmouth, where he will embark for Cuxhaven.

Saturday Mr. H. a salesman, was taken into custody in Spitalfields market, on a charge of foresalling, by purchasing a quantity of fruit and vegetables on their way to the market. He offered 500l. bail, which was refused.

No person is allowed to shoot upon the Duke of Beaufort's and Lord Abingavenny's estates in Wales, without a licence under their hands, and that only enables them to kill two brace of Grouse in one day, in company with a game-keeper.

At the Assizes of Gloucester a cause was tried, in which Elizabeth Jones was plaintiff, and John Brock Wood, esq. defendant, for breach of promise of marriage. The deceit and desertion were fully established; and to the satisfaction of a very crowded court, a Special Jury found a verdict for the plaintiff, with 1000l.

Portsmouth, Aug. 7, Sailed this evening, under convoy of the Eurydice and Termagant men of war, all the transports with troops and military stores intended for the secret expedition.

The Danish ship Eliza, from Bourdeau for Bremen, with wine; and Vrow Magdalena, Stramms, from Bourdeaux to Hamburg, are captured, and brought in here.

The two seamen, convicted of being concerned in the mutiny on board the Hermione, and the murder of their Officers, were on Thursday forenoon executed pursuant to their sentence: Watson on board the sheer hulk, at Spithead; and Allen, in the Braakel, in the harbour. The latter persisted in his innocence, as far as respected the murder, to the last moment of his existence. On the trial it was positively sworn, that, though then only fourteen years of age, he assisted in murdering his own master, one of the Lieutenants.

Weymouth, August 8.—This morning all the Royal Family, except the Duke of Cumberland and Princess Sophia, went on board the Cambrian frigate; they were saluted by the St. Fiorenzo and Syren, and also from Portland Castle. They dined on board, and did not return till half past 7 in the evening.

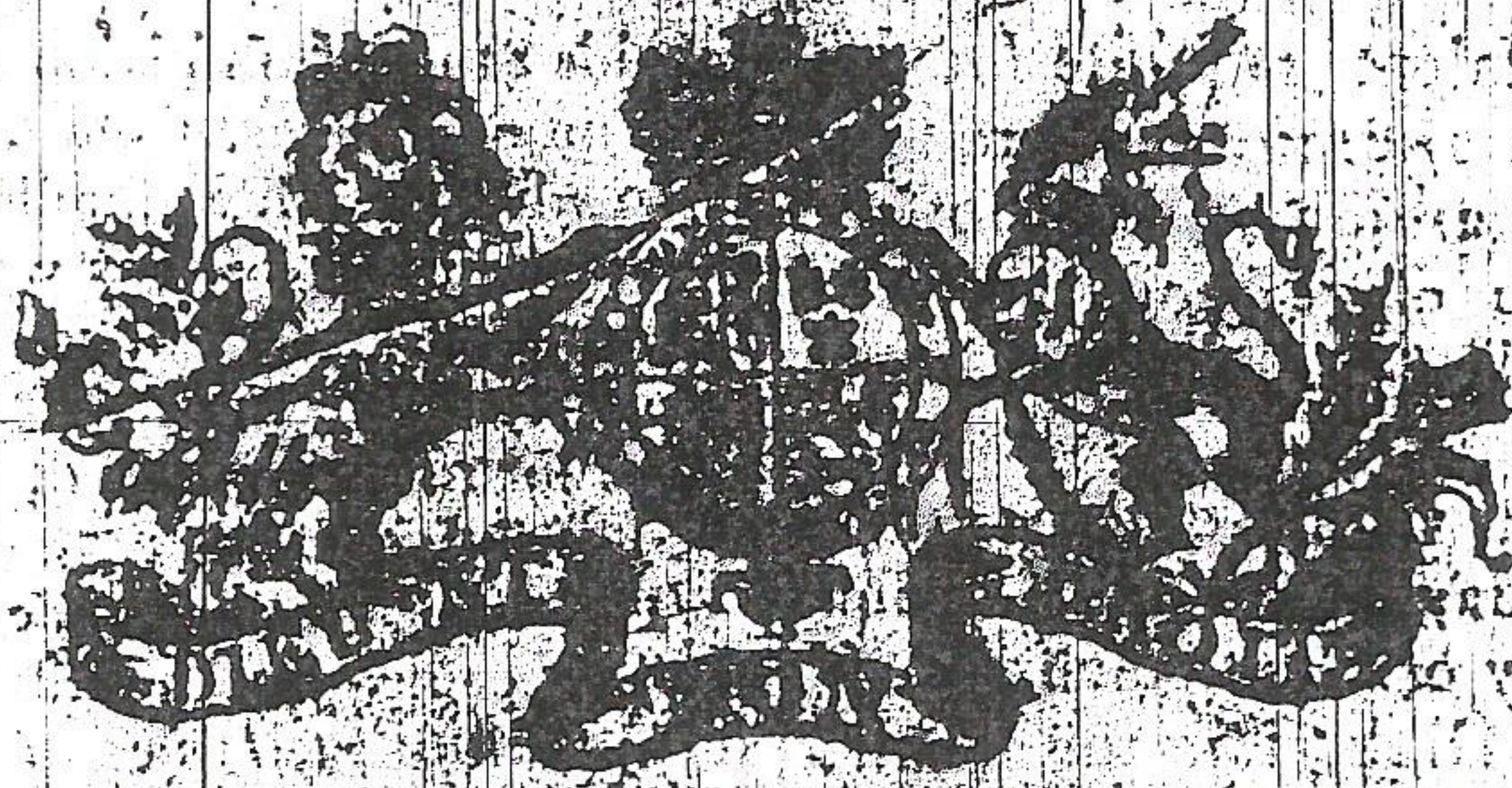
