Ewes met with a heavy sale.—Wethers sold from 34s. to 48s. per head;—Ewes from 21s. to 33s. per head;—and Lambs from 17s. to 26s. per head. There was a large slew of horses, of all descriptions, but they experienced a very dull sale.

TRIANON DECREE.

The difficulties respecting the construction of the French Decree of the 5th Aug. we shall be enabled progressively to remove. To day an express on this subject arrived from Ostend, which quitted that port on Thursday last. The following contains the information received:—

Ostend, August 15. We have not been able to transmit any licences for the import of articles allowed by the decree you before obtained from us, and it is certain that sugar and coffee will not be permitted to be landed without them, even though they arrive in a ship under a neutral flag. Some of the other commodities may perhaps be allowed an entry with the sugar and coffee, unless, as I imagine, licences should be granted by the Emperor for all kinds of colonial produce contained in the Tariff. As soon as we procure them they shall be sent to England, but we cannot give you any idea when they may be obtained. At first the Emperor signified that he would sign them (as they must be under his own hand), but he quickly changed his mind and refused. We hear, however, that he has again consented, and if he do not find reason to alter his opinion, we may shortly expect them from Paris.

Letters were this morning received from Amsterdam to the date of the 19th inst. mentioning that Bonaparte was expected to arrive in that city on the 20th inst. (this day.)

The Fisiardi has arrived from the Baltic with dispatches for Ministers, which were forwarded to London in a chaise and four, from the Eastern coast. Their contents have not transpired, but they are supposed to refer to the proceedings on the business of the election in the Swedish Diet, and a rumour was circulated on 'Change, that they contained an account of the arrival of Gustavus Adolphus in his late dominions, which had produced a strong sensation in the country. We do not attach credit to this report, notwithstanding the countenance given to it in a paragraph in the German Papers.

SPANISH AFFAIRS.

Letters have to-day been received by a ship from Tarragona after a voyage of only about 10 days. At this very late date the French had made no progress in their attempts upon the East of Spain, and Tortosa and Tarragona were expected to make a vigorous defence whenever the French should think proper to commence the siege they have so long threatened. By the same opportunity dispatches were received by Government from Gen. Dovle-

FRENCH COMMERCIAL DECREE.

The whole conversation of to-day has been respecting the commercial arrangement published at Paris in the form of a Decree. Its validity has been doubted on three grounds. 1st. The date being on Sunday the 5th August. 2nd. The tariff being fixed according to the 100 Killagrammes (204 lbs. English) for the most precious as well as the coarsest articles contrary to usage. 3d. The extravagant duties imposed on some articles wholly disproportioned to their value. The custom in France since the Revolution of transacting public business on Sunday's disposes, in a moment, of the first objection, and the others we think a short explanation would remove. We, ourselves, received two copies from distinct and unconnected quarters, and we cannot at all account for this coincidence if the alleged Decree be a trick of trade, as some conjecture, to answer the purposes of mercenary speculators.

On the subject of the Decree, the following extract of a letter has been transmitted to us, but we have not seen the original; we do not pledge ourselves for its accuracy:

Paris, August 9. The decree you will receive with this letter has been published here, and may be considered of much importance. Bonaparte is convinced that he cannot do without colonial produce, and that after all his prohibitions, by decrees, and after all his attempts to prevent its introduction by *dequanniers*, it will find its way into his empire through the north, if it cannot creep in through the south. The consequence of this has been, that the northern kingdoms have derived all the advantage from the revenue they have thus acquired by its admission through their ports, paying no duties at their custom houses. Bonaparte is at present known to be in want of money, and he has no other means of filling his coffers, emptied by the expensive war in Spain. Under these circumstances this plan has been adopted for the purpose of re-

This scheme, we understand, has been for a long time in contemplation, and it is upon that subject that the Chamber of Commerce has held so many meetings. That the trade would have been opened in this manner we had no conception till the Decree appeared. This is supposed to have delayed the Emperor's journey to Holland; but now it is settled, he will take his departure immediately, to arrange the affairs of that country.

The release of all American property is talked of, though we do not know how to credit it, and it will be a matter of much difficulty, since the sales have already begun. It is mentioned that another Minister is to be sent out to the United States for the purpose of inducing that country to a reconciliation with France, and to a war with England; but I apprehend that this is merely a speculation, founded upon these proceedings so favourable to commerce in neutral vessels.

This decree has produced a powerful sensation here, though indeed the immense duties will act in a great degree as a prohibition of the introduction of the articles.

After some painful uncertainty respecting the captures by the Danes, of a large proportion of the Baltic fleet, the names of the vessels which have fallen into their hands, have been received, and we are happy to find that no inconsiderable number of them are Americans, in which our underwriters, whether in London or the out-ports have no concern.

We have just received information from the residence of the Spanish Minister, who, we learn, has in the course of to-day received no intelligence whatever from the Peninsula. Nothing has arrived in any other quarter from thence, but we hourly expect to satisfy the public curiosity, and we hope to appease the general anxiety on affairs in that direction.

Adjutant General's Office, at the head of the Recruiting Department.
The Stirlingshire Militia are ordered to occupy the barracks at Ramsgate, relinquished by the 91st. The 52d regiment has marched from Ashford to Shorncliffe barracks.
Admiral Otway, is appointed to the command on the Leith station; and Sir Charles Hamilton to that at Woolwich.
Mr. W. Bentham of Sheerness, is appointed Vice Consul for the United States of America.
Mr. White, master in the navy, is appointed superintending master of the port of Chatham, in lieu of Mr. Salmon, deceased, and is to have charge of the gun-boats in Hoo Creek.
At a Special Court of Burghmote, held at Gravesend on Wednesday the 8th instant, the unanimous thanks of the Court, and Freedom of the Corporation, were voted to Capt. Samuel Mottley, of the Royal Navy, as a public testimonial of the high opinion entertained of him by every class of the inhabitants, during a residence of seven years, as Regulating Officer of the impress service at that port.
The Treasurer of the Navy has lately taken away the licences from two Agents, for petty officers and seamen, at Portsmouth, for compelling some seamen belonging to the Elizabeth, when commanded by the Hon. Captain Curzon, to take slops in part payment of some prize-money which those agents had received for the seamen. We insert this not only in the hope that this example will have an useful operation on all other agents for petty officers and seamen, (as they must now be convinced there is a protection for seamen which will be rendered effectual) but in order also that the captains and officers in his Majesty's Navy, who are always disposed to protect the seamen under their command, may be aware of the advantages to be derived from following the very laudable example of Admiral Curzon, who made the complaint in this case.
On the 1st inst his Majesty's sloop Raven, whilst cruising off Blackenburgh, picked up a small boat, with four French prisoners on board her, who had made their escape from one of the prison ships at Chatham. They had been at sea four days, without any thing to subsist on, excepting a few ears of wheat, and were consequently nearly exhausted. They effected their escape by slipping down the seat at the head, and swimming on shore, where they took the boat and proceeded to sea.
His Majesty has been pleased to approve the proceedings of the General Court Martial lately held at Maidstone on Robert Chilman, a private in the Bearsted and Malling Regiment of Local Militia, for disobedience of orders and mutinous and improper behaviour, while the regiment was embodied; by which he has been found guilty of all the charges, and sentenced to receive 800 lashes, which are to be inflicted on him at Chatham, to which garrison he is to be marched for that purpose.
A very distressing accident occurred on the West Pier of Ramsgate Harbour, about five in the afternoon of Sunday last:—A sickly youth, about ten years old, who had been sent by his friends to that place for the benefit of the sea air, was left for a few minutes (at the child's request) in a small carriage, in which he was usually drawn by a female servant, when the force of the wind put the carriage in motion, and before the servant could regain it, it was overturned, and the child unfortunately precipitated into the water, a height of nearly 20 feet, from whence it was immediately taken up; with a leg and an arm broken (occasioned, it is supposed, by having struck the wall in its fall) and otherwise so much injured, that faint hopes are entertained of its recovery. The servant, to whom no blame is attributed, was much attached to the child, and has suffered great distress of mind in consequence of the accident.
