Antwerp has waited upon the restoration of the pictures of art, of which that ancient city Buonaparte. From the effect his disposition to make a considerable booty, which, while it is a monument of French oppression, is a source of national degradation.

It is stated, that the Duke of Wellington, who is mentioned there; a circumstance which is reported of a plot for attempting to have been discovered, or that such a scheme too extravagant, but are now convinced that there is no reason to apprehend it, and that the circumstance of French troops being in numbers so considerable at Paris, in numbers so considerable.

The packet from Smyrna I learn, is expected to arrive in seven days, from Toulencourt, being there under the white flag, and two schooners, struck the salute of 21 guns, hoisted the tricolor, and were Government packets, just arrived, and that ten days ago off the coast of the Mediterranean, a squadron under Turkish colours, arrived with Brussels Papers.

News of the surrender of the city of Montmedy and Meziere, which were blockaded. From Basle, Barbegre, the Commandant, broken off the negotiation at that fort, and had demanded the inhabitants of Basle, not to be alarmed and consternation. The British army, which arrived at Ostend of Thursday last, consisting of 5000 men, had arrived at Wellington, and arrived yesterday morning.

a better state of things;" but the writer enters into no particulars, and it is evident that the minister of the police not only exercises his authority in the Tuilleries, but also at the Paris post-office.

"The private communications are somewhat more explicit as to the state of things in Languedoc, and we are told not only that 600 victims have fallen in the contests of the political and religious bigots at Nismes, but that thousands have been sacrificed in these furious contests. The publicity given to such transactions equally in the journals of the capital and the provinces is the ostensible motive for the restraint on the liberty of the press imposed by the Royal Ordinance of the 8th inst.

"It is further said in the confidential letters, that a general spirit of disorganization prevails in the provinces, South of the Loire, which many of the Prefects have no power, and others have no inclination to prevent.

"Expectations were entertained at Paris, that the New Treaty between Louis and the Allied Sovereigns would soon appear, and it was rumoured that the additional articles with Great Britain were to comprehend some trading arrangements, which would in a great degree supersede the necessity of a separate Treaty of Commerce. Among these it is asserted, is a clause by which the silks of France are to be admitted under moderate duties, into Great Britain, and the cotton manufactures of this country are to be introduced under the like favourable circumstances into France.

London.

We received yesterday morning the Paris Papers
of Friday last. The French official Gazette of Fri-
day announces the cessation of naval hostilities be-
tween this country and France. Subjoined to this
notice is a Note from Lord Castlereagh to Prince
Talleyrand, inclosing a dispatch from Earl Bathurst
to the Lords of the Admiralty, which follows. Lord
Castlereagh informs Prince Talleyrand that he has
received orders from the Prince Regent to inform
him, for the information of the King of France, that
as soon as the news was received in England of the
surrender of Napoléon Buonaparte to the naval forces
of Great Britain, his Royal Highness immediately
ordered that all hostilities upon the French coasts
should cease.

The French papers contain little besides of much
interest, if we except the arrival of the Duchess of
Angouleme in Paris, who has already acquired per-
manent claims to the admiration of Europe. The
cavalry of the National Guard, a strong detachment
of *Genlarmerie*, and a numerous concourse of Ge-
neral and superior officers had proceeded to meet
the Princess. On her arrival in Paris she is said to
have been received with the strongest demonstration
of respect and joy by all classes of the inhabitants.

The French Government does not appear to execute very harshly its late ordinances against the persons implicated in Buonaparte's enterprize, St. Jean D'Angely, who stood very high in his confidence, and acted a prominent part in recent events, has been placed in a state of surveillance on his own estate. Marshal Davoust, it is said, has arrived in Paris; and if the account be true, he has received assurances of the King's pardon.

The following are some extracts:—
 Paris, July 28. Faithful to the principles of alliance formed between the great Powers of Europe, and solely directed against the man, who, usurping anew the supreme power in France, has caused to re-appear all the calamities which arise from war—his Royal Highness the Prince Regent of England, who has shewn himself constantly animated with a desire to put a term to those evils, having been informed that Napoleon Buonaparte has surrendered to the naval forces of Great Britain, hastened to make hostilities upon the coast of France immediately cease. His Excellency Lord Castlereagh has given to the Ministry of the King the official notification of these orders; and the following Note has been addressed to this effect to his Highness the Prince of Talleyrand:—

NOTE.

"The Undersigned, Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs to his Britannic Majesty, has received orders from his Royal Highness the Prince Regent, to acquaint the Prince of Talleyrand, for the information of his Most Christian Majesty, that as soon as the news was received in England of the surrender of Napoleon Buonaparte to the naval forces of Great Britain, his Royal Highness immediately gave orders that all hostilities upon the coast of France should immediately cease. The Undersigned communicates, with the greatest pleasure to his Highness the Prince of Talleyrand, a Copy of the Order issued to this effect; and seizes this occasion of renewing to him the assurances of his distinguished consideration.

London, Thursday night.

“With the Malta and Gibraltar Mail we have advices from the former to the 25th June, and from the latter to the 2nd inst.—At Gibraltar bullion had been reduced in price as much as 12 per cent. the Exchange having fallen from 41d. to 36d.

“In addition to the articles before stated of the treaty between the Algerines and the Americans the Africans are to pay to their opponents a small consideration of 10,000 hard dollars for some specific damages sustained. The most important fact is that the Algerines have declared war against the Spaniards, and as usual with them no reason is assigned for this proceeding.

“By the French mail of to-day we have letters and papers from Paris to the 15th instant, accompanied for the first time with communications from the Peninsula, although it had been before announced that the customary intercourse had been re-established between Spain and France. On the authority so obtained we are enabled to contradict the assertions so frequently repeated in the Paris Journals, of its being the intention of the King of Spain to give his Royal Brethren the meeting in the French capital. The Spanish Ministry would be very reluctant to afford him such an opportunity of opening his eyes, by foreign assistance, to the true situation of his native country. There is much talk at the Court of Madrid of new expeditions to the south of America, but it is well known that nothing of this kind can be accomplished in the present state of the Spanish Treasury, and under the present pernicious system of Spanish policy.

Frankfort, Aug. 5. General Rigaud, who was made prisoner at Chalons by the troops of General Count Czernicheff, has been here for some days with other officers likewise prisoners.

Leige, Aug. 8. Some new columns of Prussian troops, forming part of the 6th corps, under the orders of General Tauenzien, have passed through this city, and to day the General is expected here.

Paris, Aug. 14.—The passage of the Diligencies, from Valenciennes to Brussels has been for three days permitted, but the Commandant of Mons it is said will forbid it for the future.

The scarcity of money continues, and trade in almost every department very sensibly feels the pressure. The commerce to South America is however in great activity, and the manufactories of Leeds, and especially of Manchester, for the market of the United States are fully engaged. Some cotton goods we are told have been shipped under special circumstances to Normandy.

“With the Malta and Gibraltar Mail we have advices from the former to the 25th June, and from the latter to the 2nd inst.—At Gibraltar bullion had been reduced in price as much as 12 per cent. the Exchange having fallen from 41d. to 36d.

“In addition to the articles before stated of the treaty between the Algerines and the Americans the Africans are to pay to their opponents a small consideration of 10,000 hard dollars for some specific damages sustained. The most important fact is that the Algerines have declared war against the Spaniards, and as usual with them no reason is assigned for this proceeding.

“By the French mail of to-day we have letters and papers from Paris to the 15th instant, accompanied for the first time with communications from the Peninsula, although it had been before announced that the customary intercourse had been re-established between Spain and France. On the authority so obtained we are enabled to contradict the assertions so frequently repeated in the Paris Journals, of its being the intention of the King of Spain to give his Royal Brethren the meeting in the French capital. The Spanish Ministry would be very reluctant to afford him such an opportunity of opening his eyes, by foreign assistance, to the true situation of his native country. There is much talk at the Court of Madrid of new expeditions to the south of America, but it is well known that nothing of this kind can be accomplished in the present state of the Spanish Treasury, and under the present pernicious system of Spanish policy.

FRENCH PAPERS.
