Friday, May 23.
London.
 At a late hour yesterday morning were received, by express, the *Rivolt* of Wednesday. Minn, it seems, still eludes his pursuers, if, indeed, he is pursued. Milan, it is said, has abandoned the strong positions he had, and retired upon Barcelona. The following are extracts:—

ground, large gaps were made through the hedges from the road, and speculators agreed to give so much for the damage done. The ring was formed on the slope of a hill, on the top of which many scores of the fair sex had assembled. The Commander of all the fighting forces arrived in the ring at half-past twelve o'clock, and his appearance was hailed with demonstrations of joy. Spring and Neate soon after hailed their beavers within the ropes, each hailed with enthusiasm by their respective parties. The foot people occupied eight or ten rows (seated) of an immense ring, with rings of standing people behind, enclosed by vehicles half a dozen deep. The seconds were, Cribb and Painter, for Spring, and Belcher and Farmer, for Neate. The coloured fagle, the blue bird's eye, for Spring, and a yellowman for Neate, were then interwoven together on one of the P. C. stakes. The men shook hands at the first meeting, and again, as usual, after *peeling*. Average betting, 5 to 4 on Spring, and both men were figures for the scutcher, in form. Neate weighed about 13st. 8 or 9lbs. and Spring, about 13st. 2lbs.

THE SET-TO.
 Round 1. The attitudes of the men to get the first blow, was a remarkably fine specimen of science; and it lasted ten minutes before a blow was struck. Spring's teints were numerous with the left hand, apparently to get his adversary in. Neate was trying his heavy-hitting left hand, which spoilt Gas; but Spring would not have it. At length Spring retreated, a *la Andal*, to a corner, when Neate let loose at him; but Spring parried the left hand, and returned a punch of the head, with quickness of one of the skillful light weights. A close followed, and some half-arm hitting took place, and both went down—Neate undermost.

2. The men got immediately to work, and exchanged hits, meaning mischief. Spring hit and got away, and drew first blood from the nose in a rally. In closing, Spring had the best of *weaving*, and threw his adversary, but he went down with him. 2 to 1 on Spring.

3. Neate was *pijning* and open mouthed, and Spring was waiting for his advance with much caution; a rally followed after some scientific parries on both sides, and if Neate had a shadow of chance in the fight, it was in this round. Spring retreated again to a corner of the ring for the purpose of *unmuzzling* his jaw; and threw his adversary heavy.

4. Spring made some scientific parries, and Neate was much distressed in the bellows line. Spring gave him a right handed rattler upon the smeller, broke ground, and left him to feel it a little. Here Neate seemed to drop his right hand, which was pulled up below the elbow. Spring let fly with his left hand at the opening, and gave his adversary a heavy throtter, and threw him from the close.

5. A short round in favour of Spring, who hit his adversary hard on the upper part of the head, and threw him.

6. Neate made wild play with his left hand at the body, long from proper distance, and he was returned upon each time until made very groggy. Spring's last hit was upon the head, which turned his adversary round, and he complimented him with the left hand, and Neate took his time to go down upon his face, as if he was picking a place. He had received a heavy blow on the side, and he was glad to put a stop to such work, and did not go down with the blow, but a second or two after it was delivered. Loud murmurs and many *ungentlemanly* epithets from Spring's friends. The umpire of the last mentioned reminded Neate that it was to be a fair stand up fight.

From the distress of the man in wind and punishment, a harsh construction should not be put upon the act, which perhaps was quite unintentionable.

7. The poundage was begging. Neate was dead beat; his arm which had previously been hurt, was dropped very low, and he was floored with blows—the left staggering him and the right finishing him.

8. Spring hit his man, who had lost all power, all over the ring. Neate made some feeble efforts to hit with the left hand wild and a long way out of distance, and he was dropped again by a right-handed blow. On time being called, he went up to Spring and held out the right hand, placing his left upon the hurt, which is rather the rupture of a tendon, and not a break, as a surgeon on the ground stated. Spring shook the hand and won the battle.

REMARKS.—Thus this said honorary title, which has been so often tossed about, is safely fixed on Spring, in an easy conquest, and there is no danger of any one wresting it from him. But he has declared off fighting any more. He exhibited the finest science, and, as a Bristol Gentleman in the fancy observed, in allusion to Neate's hurt in the arm, if he had six arms he could not have won. His beating the Gas man ranked him high, but Gas was a more boy to him in length, weight and strength; and that manly rush of Gas with the right hand, was the very thing for his left to meet with effect. Spring is another kind of a man, a better fighter, stronger, and a quicker and stronger hitter. Spring won it, without receiving a blow of the slightest consequence, in 34 minutes.

A second and very manly battle for a purse took place between Pope, a farrier, from Hampshire, and Parsons, a Bristol man, who stood much cutting up for about 12 minutes. It was a harassing day for man and horse, and the Inns through all the towns, from Andover to Egham, were full, and not a post horse could be had at any price excepting by those who had been retained, and most of those were beat to a stand-still. UNION-HALL.—Important to Bakers & Sellers of Bread.—R. Pell, of Deptford, a bread-seller, appeared to complain of — Worcester, who had been taken into custody for improperly extorting money from the complainant. It appeared that he went into Mr. Pell's shop, and asked to purchase a loaf, which was accordingly handed to him. "Now," said he, "I have often heard, and now I am convinced, that you have subjected yourself to the penalty under the late Act of Parliament, for selling your bread without weighing it in the presence of the purchaser. I have got ten informations to lay against you, the penalty for which will amount to five pounds, with the expences, and unless you make me a compensation, I shall lodge them immediately, as I am an Officer at Union Hall." He then received 10s. The fact was, that he was not an officer, but is a person, who, as was alleged, makes a living by going about laying informations against bakers. The Magistrate said, if there had been only a slight alteration in the charge, he would have committed him for a robbery. As it was, he lamented he could do nothing but discharge him. Stating, at the same time, that when such charges against bakers, or bread-sellers, were regularly brought before a Magistrate, and proved, the informant was entitled to half of the penalty; therefore he would advise Mr. Pell, as well as every other person in his line, never to sell a loaf of bread without weighing it in the presence of the purchaser, whether that was required or not.

MARGATE.—Theatricals Extraordinary.—Mr. Garner, the Librarian of Margate, performed the part of *Shylock* at that Theatre on Saturday last, for the benefit of Mr. W. Reed.—Mr. Garner is 76 years of age; yet we have an excellent portraiture of the sordid Jew. Mr. W. ALARMING FIRE.—Wednesday afternoon, about two
o'clock, a dreadful fire broke out in the plumbers of Mr.
James Holmes, in St. James's-street, Dover, occasioned
we understand, by the bursting of a bottle filled with tur-
pentine, the contents of which communicated with the
fire for melting the lead, and speedily set the premises in
a blaze; which being formed mostly of combustible ma-
terials, burnt with amazing rapidity. All the engines in
the town were soon on the spot, and every assistance in
their power was rendered by the inhabitants, the Royal
Artillery, and men of the coast blockade; but we are con-
cerned to state, that the premises where the fire com-
menced, with the workshop belonging to Mr. Edward
Marks, carpenter, and the bakehouse of Mr. W. Marks,
were entirely consumed. The house of Mr. Wm. Marks
has nothing standing but the walls, the inside being nearly
all pulled to pieces, and almost all the furniture of the
different houses destroyed. We are happy to learn that
no lives were lost. The buildings are partly insured, but
we understand to a much less amount than the injury sus-
tained.

DARING OUTRAGES.—On Monday night a carpenter's
shop, at Bridge, was broken open; the depredators stole
from the tools there deposited several implements for
breaking open doors, and on their departure left a right-
hand glove. The villains then proceeded to the church,

In doing so he should redeem the pledge which he had given some weeks ago, of entering into the details of the course pursued by Ministers in the foreign negotiations, which were of unexampled magnitude, and he felt the importance of the duty he had to perform.— The Ministers had pursued one plain definite course, that of endeavouring to preserve the peace of Europe, and of this country in particular. He would advert, first, to the state of Europe in September, when these transactions commenced; about which time he took the Seal of Office. He found in his Office a record, and which was now amongst the Records of this country; that Record laid down the principle of non-interference with the indepen- dence of Europe. But when that Record was drawn up, the case of Spain was not contemplated. When the Duke of Wellington, however, went to Paris on his way to Verona, he found the condition of Spain was likely to engross a part of the discussions, he wrote over for instructions. He (Mr. Canning) wrote for answer, that to any menace or force against Spain, from whatever quarter it might come, the Ministers of England would not be party to any such proceedings. The Duke of Wellington was instructed to state as much whenever the proper time arrived.—(Hear, hear.)—It was not expected that the case of Spain would be discussed, least of all that it would be agitated by France. The speech of Louis XVIII on closing the Session of 1822 led particularly to that opinion. It would be seen, therefore, that the instructions did not originally contemplate such question; certainly not that half Europe would be required by France to join her against Spain. The British Minister was asked whether, under particular circumstances, this country would countenance certain support. He declined giving any hypothetical answer to any hypothetical case. The British Plenipotentiary, on the contrary, demanded the cause of offence. That question was discussed at Verona for weeks, and our Minister maintained to the latest hour of his remaining at Verona the position laid down. On the Duke's return to Paris there appeared to be a disposition there to preserve peace if possible, but down to that period there had been no communication with Spain on the subject. The reason he would explain. There was great outcry, it would be remembered, regarding the attacks made on our vessels by the flags of the unacknowledged independent colonies of South America. Decided steps were adopted by the British Government, and then a communication was made to Spain, but the Spanish Court set up obsolete rights regarding constructive blockade.— Eventually Sir W. A'Court succeeded, and half a million was set apart by Spain to provide redress. Every disposition was evinced to afford redress, and our Government was simultaneously pursuing two objects—the redress of our own trade in the colonies, and the defence of the European Spanish dominions against the threats of France.— As to the opinion respecting Sir W. It was thought that such appointment was countenancing Neapolitan politics, it was whimsical enough that the Ministers of the three powers were against the appointment, as calculated to support the Ministers of Spain. He hardly knew Sir W. A'Court personally, but that Minister had acted as honestly to promote the interests of Spain as Ministers could do. Afterwards, at Verona Spain called on the Duke to interfere for its protection, but that was declined at such crisis.—France and Spain were placed in a painful situation, France seemed to think war could not be averted, and the negotiation of England continued, for the dangers of war were obvious to Spain, to France, and eventually to all Europe.—(hear.) The question had reduced itself to one of peace or war between France and Spain; to him that was the unqualified question which was at issue. But one course could be pursued. He then alluded to the proceedings of the Duke of Wellington and his address to the Court of Madrid, and observed, that it was couched in language of friendship. It spoke the honest feelings of a true friend. The speech of the French Minister, a most extraordinary document, then was published to justify the attack on Spain (hear). There was an end of all negotiation, if the doctrine there inculcated were to be adhered to, and it was not to be forgotten by any British Minister (hear) that the doctrine struck at the British Constitution itself (loud cheers.) He next adverted to the communication which had taken place with Madrid through Lord F. Somerset. The concluding dispatch was from himself (Mr. C.) to our Minister in Paris. There might be cause for the war, but was the cause urgent?—The Ministers thought it was not.—they were resolved on neutrality, he meant honest neutrality.—Left speaking.

In the preceding page will be found a detailed account of the launching of the Prince Regent, at Chatham, on Saturday last. She went off the Stocks in the most handsome manner, in the view of at least 10,000 spectators. Her motion was most majestically grand and beyond description gratifying to every beholder. Lord Melville the first Lord of the Admiralty, named the ship, and according to the usual custom, threw the bottle of wine against her head, wishing her prosperity.

A short time previous to the launch, a fatal accident happened to a warrant officer of the Spartiate, who in getting out of the port of the Prince Regent, missed his hold of the accommodation ladder and fell to the

discharged by proclamation.

The General Quarter Sessions for Rochester, were held yesterday se'night, before Edward Boys, esq. Mayor, and the Justices— William Collins and Eliza Bailey were convicted of an unprovoked and violent assault upon Thomas Lambard, in January last, and the former was sentenced to three months imprisonment, and the latter to one month's imprisonment in the goal of that city.

William Pratt was prosecuted by the Secretary at War, for enlisting into the 10th Regiment of Foot, being then a Militia-man, and thereby fraudulently obtaining the bounty money. The facts were clearly proved by the parties who enlisted him, and his identity in the East Suffolk Militia being satisfactorily established, he was convicted and sentenced to one month's imprisonment.

James Styles, a private of the West Kent Militia, was tried for a similar offence and found guilty; and it appearing to the Court he had been before convicted of a like offence, he was sentenced to three months' imprisonment.

Joseph Batsouetto, an Italian, was tried for a singular and inhuman assault upon George Chiffey, by biting a piece from his cheek. The defendant it appeared was intoxicated, and ill using a young woman, when upon the prosecutor's interference, the assault, was committed. The Jury convicted the prisoner, and he was sentenced to three months' imprisonment.

Some observations were made to the Court relative to the usual mode of selecting the Foreman of the Grand Jury from the Members of the Corporation, it being complained of as amounting to a certainty of these members summoned attending in rotation, thereby encroaching upon the principles of Juries being taken indiscriminately from the persons eligible to serve.— The Recorder, on the part of the Bench, intimated that inquiry would be made as to the custom, of which he was unacquainted, and that due consideration should be given to the subject.

DARING ROBBERY.—A robbery attended with aggravating circumstances, was committed between the hours of five and six o'clock on Monday afternoon, in the house of Brooks, a shepherd, in the employ of Mr. Henry Crossdill, of Tyler Hill, near this City. In the early part of the afternoon of the above day, a man had been to the cottage, soliciting alms, and from his apparently earnest representations of distress and hunger, he was relieved, and a quantity of victuals given to him by the wife of Brooks: he was, however, subsequently observed lurking about the premises by a part of the family, who expressed an apprehension of the man's intention. About four o'clock Brooks went from home, leaving his wife, who also went out in a short time after. The man, it would seem, watched the opportunity of their absence, and with the aid of a knife, took out a pane of glass, and throwing up the sash, entered the house, and stole a quantity of tea, four silver spoons, a silver watch, a pair of silver studs, three silk handkerchiefs, and two cotton ones, together with a waistcoat and other articles of a portable nature; but it would seem he was disturbed by the return of Brooks, as upon entering the premises, Brooks found the back door, leading to the wood open, and upon calling his wife from a neighbouring house, and remonstrating with her upon the impropriety of leaving the door open, the robbery was immediately discovered. A search was commenced, and it was ascertained that the object of their suspicion had been to a public-house in North-lane, and there divided the tea between two men, acquaintances of the fellow, and from their statement, a constable traced the robber, and overtook him at Renville pond, near Bridge, with part of the property in his possession. After an examination of the prisoner, by the Rev. C. Hughes, of Bridge-place, he was committed to St. Augustine's Gaol.
