After an excellent dinner, provided in Mr. Jarvis's best style, a quantity of strawberries, of various sorts, were placed on the table by several gentlemen then present, when it was proposed that a fund be raised for the purpose of awarding prizes to the best growers of that delicious fruit next season.

The half-yearly examination of the children belonging to the National Schools took place on Friday evening, at St. Dunstan's, and was repeated on Sunday evening in the presence of the parents of the children. The spectacle, on both occasions, was most gratifying. The children acquitted themselves to the satisfaction of all who were present, particularly the two classes of the infant school. 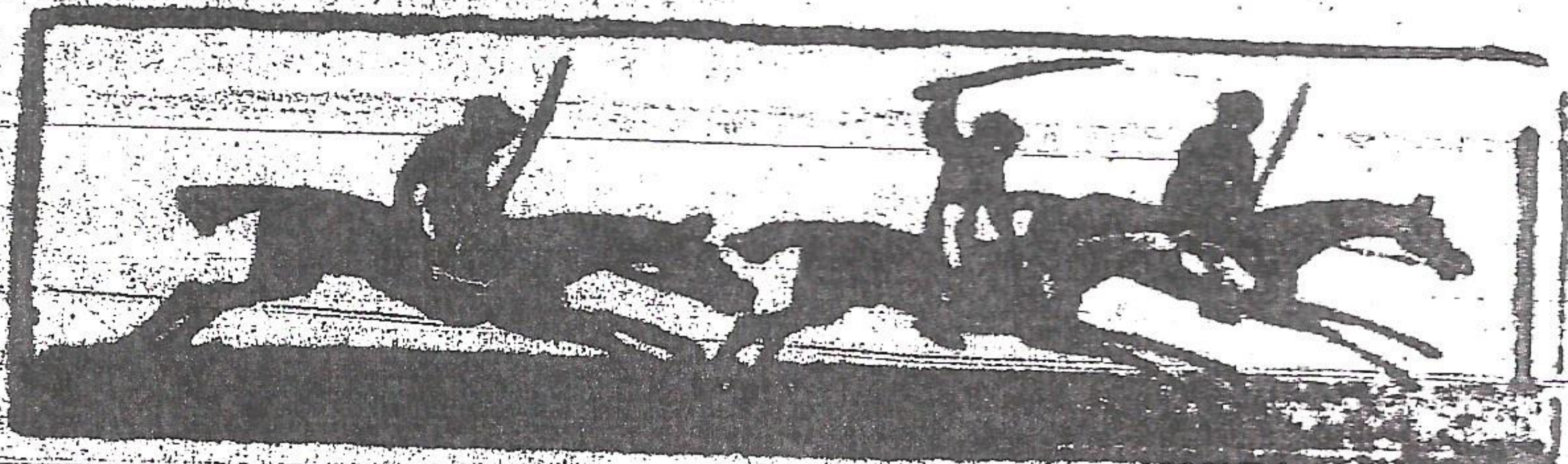

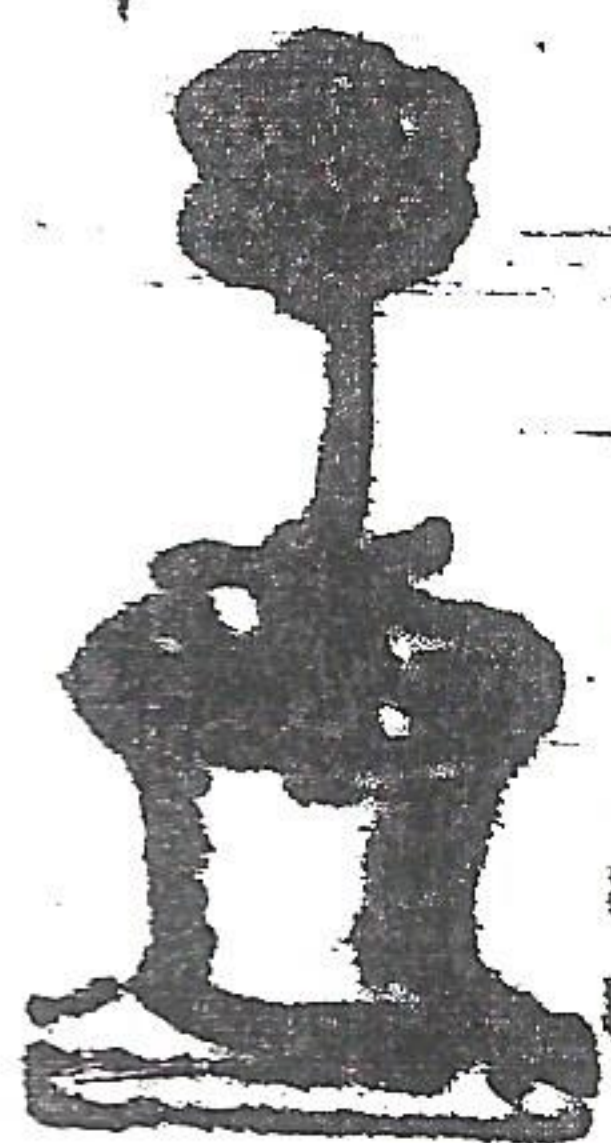

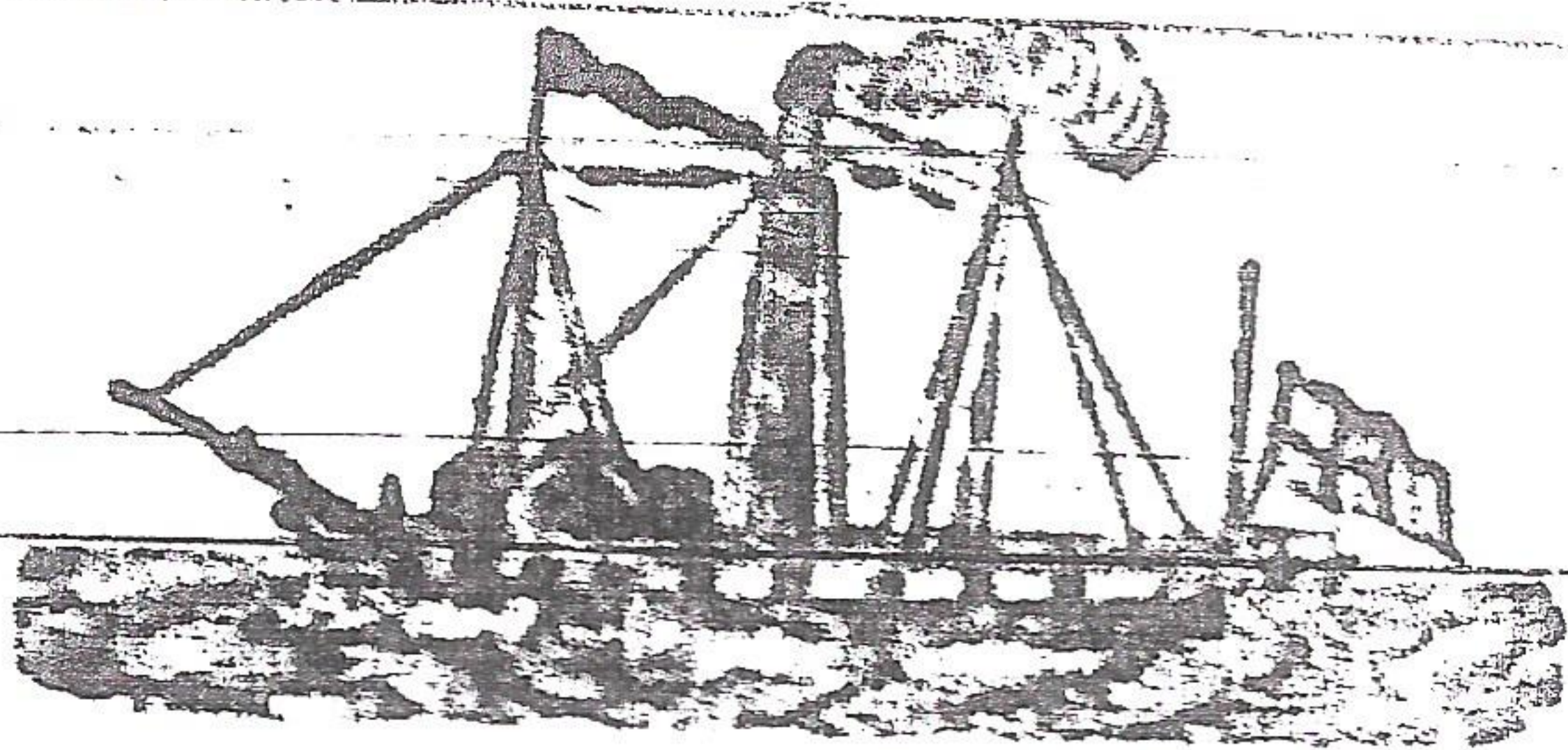

FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE

The New York papers received to the account of the happy termination of the tween the state of South Carolina and the Government, which at one time threatened consequences to the federal union of North America, last act of Congress for reducing gradually the scale of duties, and for limiting in the next years custom-house tax on to the wants of the southern states. They consider this act a great improvement of the existing system, and an engagement that the industry shall henceforward be released from regulations. They therefore rejoice in the fact that they have gained over their manufacturing rivals of the north, and look forward to the time when they shall be able to exchange the produce of their labour in the most profitable markets of the world, having to divide their gains with those states which perfect or more expensive manufactured goods required the protection of high duties.

The distinction between nullifiers and seceders for the present abolished; the storm which threatened the dissolution of the union has blown harmless, and all the apparatus of warlike expeditions are rendered useless. The South Carolina Convention organizing resistance to the enforcement of the law has, in consequence, resigned its office, and its ordinance has nullified its own nullification acts.

Turkey.—A number of communications received from Constantinople and other parts of the Empire, but the intelligence they contain is exceedingly contradictory. One account states that the Sultan is determined not to relinquish his conquests, and will push on to the Bosphorus, and attain whatever may be the consequence, as he regards the dissatisfaction of the people of Constantinople as their desire to rid themselves of the government of the Sultan. Advices received through Vienna, on the contrary, that the war is actually at an end, and that Ibrahim is preparing to retire after having signed a treaty of peace signed by his father, Mehemet Ali Pacha the Ambassador of the Sultan. In relation to this statement there appears to be no doubt, as the Pacha of Egypt has, as it was rumoured, refused his assent to the propositions of the French Emperor. Admiral Roussin; but was solely by the Pacha of Egypt, (to him) much more advanced than the Plenipotentiary of the Porte. Under circumstances it is supposed that the Russian fleet will turn immediately to Sebastopol. Smyrna has been ready surrendered by Ibrahim to the ancient Pacha's deliverance to the Egyptians was the ancient Pacha's discontented with the Government of the Sultan, on the remonstrances of the European Powers, he withdrew his troops, and trade is now commencing; under the flag of the Sultan.
