Parish Council: The chairman, Cllr Malcolm Mitchell, presided over the November meeting in the Conrad Hall last Wednesday, November 20, welcoming Mr Rodney Chew, Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinator for the area.

Unruly dogs: A complaint had been received at a previous meeting about unruly dogs at Bourne Park and had been reported to the police.

The council was told that the nuisance was persisting and it was agreed that the council would again approach the police to find

out what action, if any, had been taken.

The clerk, Gerald Wenham, reported that the accounts for 2000 and 2001 had been satisfactorily audited.

It was agreed to refund to the City Council the balance of the grant received of £15,000 to buy the new playground equipment as the city was about to pay the invoice for £14,720, plus Vat.

It was agreed to ask the City Council to confirm that it was giving the new equipment in Neame Meadow recreation field to the parish council.

The council also agreed to pay £60 for the repairs which had been carried out to the wrought iron fence around Neame Meadow, damaged when a dead cherry tree was felled

Tenders had been sought for strimming and other maintenance work around Neame Meadow, including clearance of weed growth and other obstructions from the Nailbourne bed. Several had been received. All tenders will be considered at the January council meeting.

Precept: The finance officer, Cllr Colin Baker, submitted a comprehensive survey of the options open to the council in fixing the parish rate demand for the coming year, the council accepting the lowest at £2,480, an increase of 3.76 per cent over the current financial year. The other options involved possible increase of five per cent and 12 per cent.

The council also seeking a concurrent function grant of £742 from the City Council, the same as last year, plus three per cent.

In order to obtain proper public liability cover for the new play equipment in Neame Meadow the insurers will require an annual inspection by a qualified engineer and the maintenance by the council of a record of weekly inspections carried out by a council member of someone specifically appointed to ensure there were no obvious hazards.

It was agreed to approach the RoSPA to carry out the inspection

Flood prevention: The chairman said he and Cllr Ian Burniston had attended a meeting of the River Nailbourne and Lesser Stour River Management Group where concern had been expressed about the effect of the proposed airport at Cliffe.

Because of the displacement of wildlife from the internationally important bird sanctuary measures would have to be taken which might be to convert the Wantsum channel area back to marshland.

The group is writing to the Civil Aviation Authority objecting to the airport proposal, particularly as it could mean that flooding the marshland might mean the flow of the Stour could be held up.

It was also reported that the ground had reached saturation point following the above average rainfall in November so that further rainfall would raise the water table.

However current levels did not give cause for concern but they will continue to be monitored at Bekesbourne and Lyminge by the Environment Agency's telemetry equipment and warnings would be issued if considered necessary.

The chairman also reported that he had received an offer, which he had accepted, to plant a tree in Neame Meadow in memory of the late Richard Neame who had given the land to the council two years
