PARISH COUNCIL: The monthly meeting, under the chairmanship of Cllr Colin Baker, was held in the Conrad Hall on Wednesday, April 28.

The major item under consideration was the draft report of the housing needs survey for the parish undertaken by the Kent Rural Community Council to discover if there was need for affordable housing to be built in the village. A questionnaire was delivered to every household in the parish during February and of 98 sent out, 53 were returned, representing a 54 per cent response rate. The survey revealed that high property prices coupled with no local authority or housing association property resulted in many local people being unable to find a home in the village. For a first time buyer an income in excess of £50,000 would be needed to buy a home on the open market and over £25,000 to rent in a nearby village.

From the analysis of the responses, the survey revealed a need for three or four affordable homes, all of them rentable properties, for local people. The council is to tell the KRCC that it has no adverse comment to make on the draft report and is asking housing enabler Jennifer Shaw to produce a definitive version.

Copies of the report can be had for £2 by contacting any parish councillor or the chairman (phone 01227 830715).

The matter will again be discussed at the meeting on Wednesday, June 16, to which Miss Shaw will be invited to comment on the final report. All villagers are urged to attend to find out more details about the scheme, should the council continue to pursue it.

In light of an increase in concurrent function grant money from Canterbury City Council a revised budget for the present financial year was approved. As a result the council was able to increase to £500 the grant to the Conrad Hall and to £275 the grant towards the upkeep of St Mary's Churchyard, which was considerable more than last year.

Councillors agreed to offer no objection to an application for the retention of a stable block at Bourne Park Stud, Bourne Park. It was reported that planning consent had been given by the City Council to a replacement conservatory

behind Grove Cottage, The Street, subject to the retention of trees and shrubs on the north and west boundaries.

Vice-chairman Malcolm Mitchell reported that he had attended a meeting of the City Council's development control committee at The Guildhall on Tuesday, April 27, when the application for the replacement of the gale damaged old Scout hut at The Manor House, with a single-storey studio/annexe building, came forward for consideration. He said that City Council planning officers had recommended approval, with the proviso that the structure should never be used as a dwelling, which was in line with the parish council's recommendation. The application was approved.

The next meeting will be in the Conrad Hall at 7.30pm on Wednesday, May 19. All villagers are welcome to attend.
