ST PETER'S CHURCH, BRIDGE

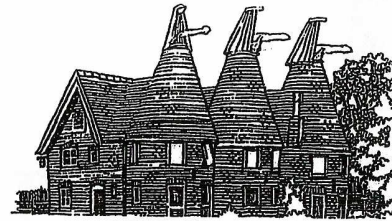
There is no mention of the village of Bridge in the Domesday Book of 1086, though there is a reference to a 'Hundred of Brige' which is thought to have been a meeting point on the Roman road from London to Dover for villagers along the Nailbourne.

The Church as seen today is the result of the extensive restoration work that was undertaken in 1859-60 by the architect Giles Gilbert Scott, when the walls were completely refaced with the dark knapped flint, a fine example of the Kentish craft and Bathstone facings.

There are two original doorways, the west doorway through which you enter the Church, and a small one in the north east corner by the side of the chancel showing deep chevron mouldings. The west doorway is mid-to-late 12th century. The 3-light west window above it which contains much original masonry is in the early perpendicular style and the one late-medieval survival, possibly dating from the late 14th century.

The octagonal font is carved out of rare Cornish red serpentine marble and is considered to be of outstanding workmanship with the bowl supported by a central pillar surrounded by eight shafts, all in the same material.

The two-rank organ dates from 1860 and is typical of its period, it was renovated in 1975. The Church interior was cleared and repainted by a team from the congregation in 1998.
