

LOG BOOK

Instructions by the Board of Education on the Keeping of a School Log-Book.

1. The log-book should be stoutly bound and contain not less than 300 ruled pages. It must be kept by the principal teacher, who is required to enter in it, from time to time, such events as the introduction of new books, apparatus, or courses of instruction, any plan of lessons approved by the Board, the visits of managers, absence, illness, or failure of duty on the part of any of the school staff, or any special circumstance affecting the school that may, for the sake of future reference or for any other reason, deserve to be recorded. No reflections or opinions of a general character are to be entered in the log-book.

Entries in the log-book should be made by the head teacher at the end of each school week, and at such other times as occasion may require. No entries should be made by other persons except by the Correspondent, by the managers who check the registers periodically, and by the Inspector.

The log-book should contain an explanation of the reason for the closing of the school on all occasions on which it is closed. It should also contain an account of all important variations in the attendance, and all deviations from the ordinary routine of the school. (*Code of Regulations for Public Elementary Schools, Art. 85 (g), and Schedule VII., 1903.*)

2. Log-books should be kept as a permanent record. (*Revised Instructions, Appendix II., 1902.*)

3. As soon as the Inspector's annual report is received, a list of the school staff, as settled by the decision of the Board, must be entered in the log-book, and signed by the Correspondent of the managers. This entry will show what was the school staff at the beginning of the school year. An entry must be made of any change in the staff occurring during the school year (*Art. 72, Code 1902.*)

4. Entries made in a log-book should not be erased, but may be cancelled or altered by a subsequent entry.

With regard to the curriculum.
 I am very glad to see that more work of a practical nature, and more handicraft are being introduced into the Schools, and I am convinced that no better forms of hand and eye training exist than cardboard modelling and woodwork.

Besides being useful (for many useful articles can be made by quite young children), these subjects provide valuable mind-training, developing the faculties of attention, accuracy, perseverance and invention, and, moreover, they exercise the child's powers of constructiveness and judgment to a remarkable degree.

Most of us are able to do a little in the paper-modelling and cardboard modelling lines, incorporating them with such subjects as Arithmetic and Drawing, but Woodwork—even light Woodwork—is out of the question, unless we have room that we can devote specially to the work. [Doubtful. Ed.]

Date of Inspection June 19th. Rev. H.C. Johnson

All divisions in the school were examined in Old
Testament & New Testament, Division 1 was also questioned
upon the Prayer Book, & Divisions 2 & 3 upon the Catechism.
The knowledge of the Bible shown throughout the school was
very good indeed; the facts were well known, & the
children had a good appreciation of their meaning & their
application. The Old Testament was particularly well
known. Divisions 2 & 3 repeated the text of the Catechism
correctly, & were also able to give good and intelligent
answers on its meaning. The repetition in these
Classes was also very good. The replies of the first
division to their master's questions on the origin of
and reasons for the Prayer Book were very good;
this subject had evidently been very carefully taught.
The written exercises of this class showed that they
were able to reproduce good accounts of historic
Bible incidents, as well as of the text of the Catechism.
The written work of Divisions 2 & 3 was generally good
and neat. The whole school passed a very good
examination. The children were in excellent order, and
the tone of the school is maintained at a high level.
