**FOREIGN AFFAIRS,**

FROM THE PARIS PAPERS.

*Paris, July 30.* A letter from Lagnhorn dated July 9, states, that the English, after carrying away all their effects, quitted that port on the 19th.

*Rome, July 12.* The Pope went out this day, for the first time since his arrival. He went in the midst of a great concourse of people to officiate at the Basilique Vatican, where he met the King and Queen of Sardinia, and the Duke of Chablais, their uncle, who arrived the 16th. After officiating, the King and Queen had a long conference with his Holiness. At night the Cupola and Palace of the Vatican were illuminated. A regulation has been published, by which the old Papal government is re-established, with some modifications, in the provinces of Ancona and Perouse, occupied hitherto by the Imperial troops. For their more easy administration, they will be divided into seven jurisdictions, to be governed by seven prelates, with the title of Delegates.

*Turin, July 16.* Some French soldiers have been assassinated by the inhabitants of the villages through which they passed solitarily. It might be thought to be the effect of the discontent of the people, at not seeing the restoration of the King to his Piedmontese States, if it were not known that the same men who assassinated the French soldiers, also assassinated the Austrians.—What leads to the ferment in the public mind, is the report that Piedmont will either wholly or in part be united to the Cisalpine Republic. A Gazette of Milan, even assures us that a deputation from the provisional government had repaired to Gen. Massena, in order to prevail on him to interest himself in favour of this union.

The city of Ferrara has been evacuated by the Austrian troops, who have only left a garrison in the citadel, in conformity to the convention of June 16. The city and country are occupied by a division of French troops, and the Cisalpine government is at this moment in a train of organization.

*Vienna, July 16.* The recruiting goes on with great activity, as well at Vienna as throughout the Hereditary States. All the regiments are to be completed.—The day of the arrival of her Majesty the Queen of Naples is not yet known; it is certain that her Imperial Majesties will meet that Princess at Neustadt. F. M. Count Stzaray has lately arrived here.

**L O N D O N.**

We received yesterday Paris papers to the 9th inst. a day later than those which arrived on Saturday. We received a manuscript bulletin, the papers contain no news of any consequence, the bulletin is important—it is as follows:

“The Decree, prohibiting the importation of British merchandize into France, is revoked.”

Yesterday morning arrived a Mail from Jamaica, brought to Falmouth by the Swan cutter, in 45 days. On her passage, in latitude 32. 8. longitude 55. West, we fell in with a schooner, pierced for 16 guns, floating even with the water, apparently American: she had lost her masts, bowsprit, and rudder.

We have the satisfaction to announce, that the fleet from the Baltic is safe arrived off Bridlington in Yorkshire under convoy of the Sally.

The following ships sailed from Yarmouth roads on Saturday: nine men of war, four bombs, five gun-brigs, two sloops, and two cutters, to join an Admiral and a fleet of transports without.

In consequence of the continuance of fine weather, and the plentiful supplies of grain of all kinds, fine HOUSEHOLD FLOUR is now sold at ABBOTS MILL at SIXTY-FIVE shillings the sack, and ROUGH MEAL at TEN shillings a bushel.

The annual wool fair at Ashford, on Saturday se'nnight, was attended by a great number of growers, and several dealers, but no business done; 13l. per pack being asked which was declined on the part of the dealers, who offered 12l. for fleece wool, 8l. for lamb wool, and 5l. for locks.

Early on Wednesday morning the apartments of Lieut. Pym, of the Royal Horse Artillery, in Saint George's Place, in this city, were entered, and a desk broke open, from which cash to the amount of from 20l. to 30l. was stolen, with which the perpetrator escaped undiscovered.

On Saturday was committed to St. Dunstan's Gaol, John Gardner, charged with having feloniously broke open and entered the dwelling house of Wm. Amos, in Gaston, and stolen thereout six silver tea spoons, of the value of ten shillings, the property of the said Wm. Amos.

Yesterday was committed to St. Dunstan's gaol, James West, alias Alsworth, charged on a violent suspicion of having been concerned with two men, not yet taken, in feloniously assaulting William Patterson, in the parish of Patricborne, on Monday the 4th day of Aug. inst. and in feloniously taking from his person about six or seven guineas, his property; and also with having been concerned with the said two men in feloniously and burglariously entering the dwelling-house of the said Wm Patterson, and stealing therefrom a canvas bag, containing to the amount of 40 guineas in gold, and 5 guineas, 13 seven shilling pieces, 3 half crowns and a silver watch, the property of the said Wm Patterson.

On Tuesday last was committed to Westgate gaol in this city, John Carter, charged with feloniously stealing a pair of pocket pistols and two epaulets, the property of Humphrey Sibthorpe, esq. colonel of the South Lincoln Militia, and of articles from out of a room in the King's Head Inn, and also for stealing a gold neckerchief pin, the property of Avis Pitt, of the Fountain Inn. It appears he has committed various thefts of a like description from a gentleman in whose room he slept at the Antwerp Inn, at Dover; and likewise from the Mistress of the Three Kings at Deal; the articles lost being all found in his possession. He is a youth of about 14 years old, of genteel appearance and address, and of a family of respectability in London.

In this proclamation her Majesty declares, "that foreseeing the manifold mischiefs which daily grow more and more unto the City of London, by access of people to inhabit the same, not only by reason that such multitudes would hardly be governed by ordinary justice, but would not be provided with food and other necessaries for man's relief upon reasonable prices: and finally, that such numbers of people inhabiting small rooms whereof many be very poor, and such as must live by begging or worse means, and being heaped up together with many families of children in one house or small tenement, it must follow, if any plague or universal sickness come amongst them, it would spread through the whole city, and into all parts of the realm. For remedy whereof, she commands all manner of persons to desist from any new buildings within three miles of any of the gates of London, and only one family to inhabit one house."

Never was there so many fine horses in the list of any race as at York this week, and the display of equipage upon the ground is expected to be equally grand. All the old English families of the county vie with each other in the number and splendor of their carriages, liveries, horses, servants, &c. This evening arrived the Phoenix-cutter, with Captain Duval, of the navy, charged with dispatches from the fleet under the command of Admiral Dickson. We learn that one of his Majesty's ships was sent into Eisleneur with colours flying: she went among the Danish men of war lying there, who did not shew any disrespect to our flag, in consequence of which Admiral Dickson and the whole fleet anchored before the castle, where they are to remain till all differences are adjusted.

**Plymouth, Aug. 25.** This morning a number of French prisoners to the amount of about 300, were taken from the prison at this place, to be removed to the prison at Bristol; among whom, a lieutenant, late of his Majesty's ship *Dance*, of 24 guns, recognized an old acquaintance that belonged to the ship at the time she was carried into Brest, by the mutinous part of the crew, in which transaction it was stated that this man was an active ringleader, and the person who held a pistol to the head of Lord Proby, the commander. He was immediately taken into custody, and secured, and does not deny the charge alleged against him. He is a native of Guernsey, and, by being conversant with the French language, escaped earlier detection.

of Cronenburg in the best state of her new. By letters from Yarmouth, dated on Friday, we learn the arrival here of the Martin sloop of war, which left Elsinour, on the 21st.—Admiral Dickson had a most boisterous passage thither. His force consists of seven ships of the line, one fifty, two frigates, one sloop, four bomb-vessels, and five gun-vessels; but it does not appear that the transports had accompanied him into the Sound. Our 74's are placed alongside the Danish ships of the line; our frigates against theirs; and the bombs, &c. are stationed close to the Castle of Cronenburg, waiting the result of Lord Whitworth's negotiations.—Every ship was prepared for action.

The Emperor has resolved to remit the collection of the revenues, for one season, in the provinces that have suffered most materially, and has adopted every measure that policy and humanity could suggest for the relief of the sufferers.

Letters from Madrid, dated August 8th, in the French papers, state that the Spanish Court takes the greatest interest in the re-establishment of harmony between the French Government and the Holy See. The Spanish Envoy to his Holiness, who is a Member of the Sacred College, is said to be commissioned to negotiate, in order to terminate the difference between the Church and France.

The late overland dispatch brought recent accounts from Canton, stating, that an uncommon succession of rain had laid entire districts in China under water. The great river Hoambo had been swollen to such excess, as totally to wash from its banks many of the villages which adorned them, and inundate all the adjacent country. Such of the inhabitants as escaped this awful visitation, had fled with the remains of their property to the hills.

The Sheriff's Jury has had three different meetings during the last week, for ascertaining the property of Messrs. Boyd, Benfield, and Co. under an extent from the Crown, which had a demand on the estate for 200,000l. The affairs of this House are so complicated, that the Jury has not yet come to any decision upon the claim.

Major General W. Popliam was, on the 2d of January confirmed in the command of the Bengal troops on the coast, in the room of the late Major-General J. Erskine.

Sir G. Leith, Bart. has been appointed Lieutenant-Governor of Prince of Wales's Island, in India.

The voluntary contributions of the inhabitants of Bengal, in aid of the war, &c. amounted on the 19th of December last to 139,332l. 15s. 2d.

We are happy to inform our readers that the dreadful fire which raged upwards of five weeks on Radnor Forest is at last extinguished, by the late providential fall of rain, after having burnt above four miles in extent, over several hundred acres of ground, and in some places to the depth of three feet in the turbarry, involving, it is feared, the ruin of those small farmers who unfortunately had their sheep-walks within the ravages of the flames.—Thus the kind hand of Providence arrested the progress of, and finally extinguished this tremendous fire; when the united exertions of an immense concourse of people from New Radnor and its neighbourhood, who were employed in cutting trenches, &c. had proved abortive. The fire has chiefly been confined to the hills, the property of the Earl of Oxford, Mr. Lewis, and Mr. Lewin.

Cambridge, August 29. The Rev. John Churton has been instituted by the Bishop of Hereford to the Rectories of Barwarton and Whenton, Salop.—The Rev. Joseph Langford has been presented to the first portion of Pontesbury, Shropshire, by his uncle, John Hand, Esq. of Whitechurch.

The fall of rain has already much improved the crop of Turneps in Norfolk, which are by no means so defective as in other parts.

Oxford, August 30. On Tuesday the 19th instant, between the hours of five and six in the afternoon, there fell at Upper Heyford, in this county, a most violent storm of hail, accompanied with thunder and lightning, and succeeded by a tremendous gust of wind; a storm so dreadful in its effects, and so alarming to the beholder, was seldom or never experienced in this country. The hail, or more properly speaking, large irregular pieces of ice, of the size in general of an hen's egg, broke the windows of many houses that were in the direction of the storm, and the whole of Heyford affords a spectacle truly shocking; the corn, a greater part of which is barley, and very little of it cut, appears entirely threshed out by the violence of the hail: scarcely an ear

Margate, Aug. 28. Yesterday morning appeared with lowering clouds, presaging bad weather; several ships were driven from their moorings: The hoy lay at anchor four hours, about three miles off, and continued about seven o'clock, the boom struck against the pier, and ran the vessel foul of a collar along-side, fortunately no material damage was sustained, and the passengers, amounting only to 34, were landed in safety.

About nine o'clock rain set in, and fell in torrents, without intermission, through the day, which was truly of the sombre cast. The streets were deserted, and even the rattle-shops were neglected: The principal resort for the sporting gentlemen was Hughes's billiard-tables, in Hawley-square. A grand match was played, in part, between Hughes, the master of the tables here, and Evans, master of the tables in St. James's-street, London. They are considered as the two first players in England. The match was for a considerable sum, and the bettings amounted to 1600l. The odd game in 21 was the match. At one o'clock the play began; all the distinguished persons in Margate being present. The match was so equal that they won games and game till 8 games all. Hughes won the two next, lost the third, and won the fourth, then he won three out of four, which ultimately decided the match, eleven to nine in his favour. But a double game is usually to decide.

Yesterday evening, about six o'clock, the King George packet arrived, having been only 12 hours in coming; on board were 40 persons. A shocking catastrophe took place, when within five miles of this place.—The captain, as is usual, went round to receive the passengers, when an elderly man threw himself overboard—all was confusion—the jolly boat was lowered, and the drag-net thrown out, but an hour elapsed before he was taken up, and then the boat was a mile from the shore. On being brought on shore, he was carried into the Bay Boat (a public-house). The means recommended by

RETURN OF THE PR



We have the satisfaction to state the safe arrival of thirty-five sail of Merchantmen from Oporto, off Plymouth Sound on Friday last, under convoy of the Castor frigate.

Orders were received on Friday at Plymouth, for all the men of war in readiness at that port to sail immediately to join the Channel fleet. The Royal Sovereign, Prince George, Princess Royal, and Bellona accordingly put to sea. These orders have given rise to a report that the combined fleets are about to put to sea.

In the Gazette of Saturday our readers will find an official account of the first operations of the grand armament under the command of Sir James Pulteney, which lately sailed from this country against Ferrol, in Spain, and which it appears have not been attended with success. A letter from Falmouth, received yesterday morning, gives the following particulars of this affair.

"The troops, to the amount of 11,000, it appears, were landed, and were to have attacked Ferrol by land by a *coup-de-main*, whilst the ships of war employed in the expedition battered the forts by sea; but on their attempting to enter the harbour, in order to commence the attack, it was found that the enemy (how is unaccountable and truly surprising) were apprized of the object of the expedition, and had, in consequence, carried a chain across the mouth of the harbour, and drawn their ships of war in a line, with springs on their cables, within it, so that it was impossible to enter.

"This totally deranged the plan of the attack; and it was resolved, on account of the impracticability of taking a place of such strength by assault with a body of troops comparatively so small, and deprived of the co-operation of the fleet, to re-embark, which was effected within about 12 hours after the disembarkation. A fleet of transports, with troops joined the squadron the same day.

The next object of the expedition is supposed to be Corunna, at which port, we are greatly apprehensive from the above statement, that similar precautions have been taken by the enemy.

The Spaniards, we are told in the last letters from the Havannah, are apprehensive of another invasion of Porto Rico.

Extract of a letter from on board the Canada, dated Aug. 28, 1800.

"From advice brought yesterday to the fleet by a cutter from Quiberon Bay, it is now past doubt, that the projected attack upon Belleisle is totally abandoned. The British armament that has lain off there for some weeks past, under Rear Admiral Sir J. B. Warren, and Lieut. Gen. Sir J. Pulteney, has sailed to the southward; so that we are here more in the dark than ever respecting its real destination. So formidable an appearance, however, off the French coast, created a very considerable degree of alarm in the enemy, as all the absent sailors from the best fleet were immediately compelled to join their respective ships, and all the fishermen, and other marines, in every craft along the coast, are put in the strictest requisition.

"Our Commander in Chief, Earl St. Vincent, has his flag on board the Royal George, where it will continue to fly till the arrival of the Ville de Paris, Capt. Grey. It is generally understood, that the St. Joseph, of 128 guns, one of his Lordship's Spanish prizes, has undergone a thorough repair, at his Lordship's desire, and is destined for his flag ship, as soon as she can be properly equipped for that purpose."

**PRICE OF CORN.**

It is with sincere concern we state, that with the ex-  
ception of rye, the price of all descriptions of grain in  
the Metropolis, experienced, during the last week, a  
further advance. In the country, the prices have fluctu-  
ated greatly. In some places there has been a fall in  
the price of wheat, to the amount of 10s. or 12s. per  
quarter, whilst in the immediate neighbourhood there  
has been an advance to still greater sums; did there ex-  
ist any real cause to warrant the existing fictitious scar-

At Northampton, wheat has advanced 20s. upon the  
prices quoted in our last; at Devizes 12s. at Stamford

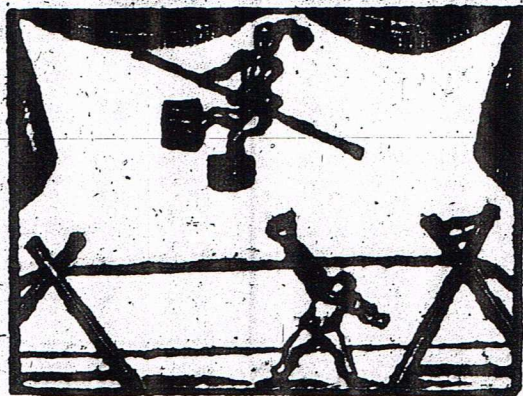
