packed up, and the whole party set off in a post
coach between eight and nine o'clock to Bow-
street, London.—After they came down stairs,
Sparrow made an attempt to shoot himself, but
was prevented. He afterwards assured Mr. De-
tilli that what effects he had not with him, were
at the lady's lodgings in town.

LONDON.**

SECRET treaties are now negotiating between our Court, the Prussian, Russia, and the Swede; the French too are following the example, by opening negotiations with Portugal, Sardinia, and Denmark.

News of the greatest importance is daily expected from New England, the Provinces whereof are to be the great object of the present campaign in America. It is now publickly known that the plan which has been long in contemplation is at length to be carried into execution; that the entire conquest of Rhode Island, Connecticut, New Hampshire, and Massachusetts Bay, is to precede any farther operations towards the South; and that those Provinces, as they have been the most obnoxious to government, are to be made to feel the severest chastisement. It is even said, that the troops are to proceed as in an enemy's country; that their orders are to live at large; and that when an entire conquest is made of the above Provinces, grants of the lands are to be made to the conquerors; the present inhabitants, who are a surly, rebellious set of republicans by principle, are to be driven out, and a new race of inhabitants to succeed. Perhaps the latter part of the above plan may be too rigorously represented; but it is most certain, that a number of confiscations will take place; and that as is usual in cases of the like kind, the land, so confiscated will be disposed of to those who shew themselves most active in the cause of their country. The above intelligence, which may in general be depended upon, accounts for the inactivity of the troops under General Howe, at New York, and the delay in opening the campaign, as it is intended that both armies shall act at once; that under General Burgoyne on the West, in which are more than 2000 Savages; while the main army is to proceed from the East, and effect a junction; this done, both armies, supported by a powerful fleet, are to invest Boston on all sides, the garrison of which, if on summons, they refuse to surrender, will probably be put to the sword.

The exact words of the express received on Tuesday night last from Trente, were, "His Royal Highness the Duke is at this moment so ill, that it is next to an impossibility he can live six hours."
