GENTLEMEN,

APETITION having been presented to the House
of Commons, against the Return of SIR WM GEARY, as
one of the Representatives of this county in Parliament, wheteby

the same day a very fine French ship corvette of 50 guns, and a brig, the description of the latter not known. Capt. Maies, of the Nevis, who brought the account, saw the treasure removed at Crookhaven from the prize into the Seahorse: She was from the Havannah, bound to Cadiz.

Extract of a letter from Portsmouth, dated Oct. 2, to a Gentleman at Exeter:

"A small American sloop having lately made several trips to and from this port, her frequent sailing, and so soon returning, excited some suspicion, that she might be the conveyance of improper intelligence from hence to France; and one of their crew having made a deposition that their frequent trips from hence were to France; and that a person was daily expected on board, who always went and returned with the vessel, a proper officer was appointed to watch her motions, and observe who went on board her: a genteel dressed man was this morning seen to go on board her, and the vessel immediately got under weigh; and the man making his report of what he had observed, two Custom-house officers took boats, and boarded the sloop, just as she was clearing the mouth of the harbour, and going into the cabin, found the person who had just gone on board, and who, from his appearance, seemed to be just come from a journey, in it, with a small trunk by him; which, on opening, was found full of papers: these it is said, from those which have been opened are of a very important nature, and that there is no doubt of his being a spy to the French; as the sloop has been to and from this port no less than fifteen times in the course of about three months, with only an interval of about six days each time. It is said, on his being apprehended he attempted to tear some papers lying by him, but was prevented; he was brought on shore about twelve o'clock, and immediately sent off for London with the two officers who apprehended him."

Portsmouth, Oct. 6. "Arrived the Charon man of war, of 44 guns, with the Thomas and Ellis, Mary, and Eagle transports, from the West Indies, last from Ireland; also arrived the Royal Sovereign man of war, Adm. Gardner, with the fleet under his command, from a cruise off Brest."

A letter from Captain Byng, Commander of his Majesty's ship Mercury, of 28 guns, dated St. John's Newfoundland, Sept. 9, states that all was then safe at that place, and that they were not under the least apprehension of a visit from the French, though it had been reported that a squadron of the enemy's ships had been seen on the coast. No mention is made in this letter of the Bay of Bulls being destroyed, or any other mischief having been done by the French; the letter was received by a ship arrived at Dartmouth from a place about ten miles from St. John's.

Wednesday and Thursday the Hereford march for Denge's barracks, to relieve the Gloucester, who are to be stationed here during the winter. The Montgomery for Ashford barracks; and the East Suffolk for Tunbridge.

Barham camp breaks up this day; the Cornwall and West Middlesex are to come into barracks in this city; and the Monmouth and Brecon march for Lewes; the first division passed through this morning on their route by Maidstone and Tunbridge.

Yesterday the advanced troops of the first or royal regiment of dragoons, commanded by Major-General Philip Goldworthy, marched into the royal cavalry barracks near Vauxhall; the remainder of the regiment follow this day.

Sunday the 2d inst. died at Town Malling, Miss Geary, daughter of the late Admiral Sir Frederick Geary, baronet, sister to Sir William Geary, one of the representatives in parliament for this county.

On Friday the 30th ult. died at Folkitone, much regretted by all that knew her, Mrs Andrews, wife of Mr. Andrews, tide-surveyor at that port.

Thomas Macdonald, Esq. Counsellor at Law, has
been appointed one of the two Commissioners to go
to America, on the part of his Majesty, pursuant to
the late treaty with the United States.

The Commission which is to be held in America
to decide the claims of British subjects against the
inhabitants of the United States is to consist of five
Members. Two are to be appointed by his Majesty;
two by the American Executive Government, and
the fifth by the unanimous voice of the other four,
or if not unanimous, by lot, as prescribed by the
Treaty. The United States engage to make good
the decision of the Commissioners, who are to proceed
on the principles, that satisfaction could not have
been obtained in the ordinary course of judicial pro-
cess, and that the losses sustained had not arisen from
the negligence of the claimants.

It is particularly incumbent on the Officers of all
our ports to take care, that the vessels returning
from any of the Eastern or Western parts of the
World, perform a Quarantine. The Crews of the
Indiamen, returned from the Transport service, are
in general in good health; but on board some of the
ships, this is said to be by no means the case.

Wednesday a Court of Directors was held at the
India House, when the business of the Volunteer
Corps was taken into consideration.—The Gentle-

The same military enterprise and success—the same vapouring vanity—the same *caecothos scribendi*—and probably the same ambition.

Beaulieu, the pupil and fellow-soldier of the great Laudohn, is no doubt a very able officer; but Italy is not the proper theatre for him to act upon. He is there quite out of his province; but on the borders of the Rhine, and on the frontiers of France, “the Wolf of the Ardennes” is acquainted with every inch of ground; and if his health permit, will be a most useful assistant to the Archduke Charles.

The inhabitants of that part of Poland now in the possession of the Empress of Russia, have been obliged to adopt the ritual of the Greek church, and the Jews to change their Sabbath from Saturday to Sunday.

A singular circumstance attended the surrender of the town and fortrefs of Derbent to the Russians:—the Deputy, who transmitted the keys to the Russian General, was the identical person that delivered them up to Peter the Great, and is at this present time about 120 years of age.

The Captain of a Venetian vessel, arrived at Salonica, spoke the snow Falmouth, on the 25th of May, off Cape St. Angelo, bound from Smyrna to London; a few hours after he fell in with a French privateer, steering the same course: in the evening he heard some guns fire, and supposes the Falmouth is taken.

Ehrenbreitstein, which stopped the career of the French in the last campaign, and has hitherto resisted them in the present, is one of the strongest fortresses upon the Rhine. It is built upon a solid rock, out of which most of its works are cut, and has the river Rhine running at its bottom.

CHANGE OF FORTUNE.—During the troubles in the reign of King Charles I. a country girl went up to London in search of a place, as a servant maid, but not succeeding, she applied herself to carrying out beer for a brew-house, and was one of those then called tub-women.

The brewer, observing a well-looking girl in this low occupation, took her into his family as a servant; and after a while, the behaving herself with so much prudence and decorum, he married her; but he died when she was yet a young woman, and left her a large fortune.

The business of the brewery was dropped, and the young woman was recommended to Mr. Hyde, a gentleman of skill in the law, to settle her husband's affairs.

Hyde, (who was afterwards the great Earl of Clarendon) finding the widow's fortune very considerable, married her. Of this marriage, there was no other issue than a daughter, who was afterwards the wife of JAMES II. and mother of MARY and ANNE, Queens of England!

APPROACHING PLENTY.—Last week was imported at Liverpool, 5,239 bushels of Indian corn from America; 2,990 quarters of wheat from Prussia; and 8,155 quarters, 1,022 bushels of oats, 1,056 bolls, and 70 bags of oatmeal, from Ireland.

A farmer in Hereford, last week, offered to enter into an engagement, to sell on the 30th of this month, good marketable wheat at 9s. 6d. per bushel. But such is the expectation of plenty this harvest, that he could not find a customer.

CLIMATE.—The variability of the climate has been such for some days past, that the greatest caution should be used in the article of diet—By an excellent Fahrenheit's Thermometer, in a south-west aspect, the variations for the last four days have been as follows:—

They then walked in form round the stone three times, and returned in boats to their old quarters, the Crown Inn, where a sumptuous dinner was provided for them. Invitations were sent to the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common Council of the City of Rochester; to the Members and High Sheriff of the county; to the Port Admiral and General Officers of the barracks; to the Russian Admirals and Captains, and many other gentlemen of the neighbourhood, who all, (to the number of 60 and upwards) expressed great pleasure at the elegancy of the entertainment, which was set off in such a style as might have done credit to the first tavern in London.

“The day passed with the greatest conviviality: many loyal and constitutional toasts were given, and the whole concluded much to the satisfaction of every one present.

“His Lordship, friends, and attendants sailed this morning at half after ten on his return to London.”

As there were not any passengers came in the vessel (for it sailed yesterday morning from Dunkirk at a moment's notice,) no intelligence could be obtained, the orders for the Captain were, after landing his dispatches, to sail again immediately for France, and this he did without coming into the harbour."

going all claim to the government of the Belgic Provinces.

This is not confirmed by the Mail; it is however evident a continuation of the truce is expected, meanwhile troops are dispatching with all haste from the Rhine to Italy, but it is supposed they must arrive there too late to answer any good purpose.

The military movements on the side of Westphalia are also very great, the object of which is not clearly defined.

The preparations of Spain, on the other hand, are of a magnitude which does not accord with the pacific professions of that Court. In a word, the general aspect of things was never at any former period of the war more gloomy.

An official letter from General Hoche, dated 25th Floreal, announces that Sapeaux, and all the rebels under his command in the departments of Mayenne, Mayenne et Loire, and the Loire Inferieure, have recognized the power of the Republic, and surrendered their arms. This was the strongest army of Chouans.—The rest must inevitably follow.

We received on Saturday, by Express the Paris Journals of the 18th inst. Their contents are important. They announce fresh Victories on the Side of Italy, and the conclusion of a Peace between the Republic and the King of Sardinia.

The Duke of Parma has obtained a Suspension of Hostilities by very important sacrifices, and is negotiating for Peace to be purchased probably by greater.

It was on Monday reported that the Emperor had made peace with the French Republic. We merely give this as the rumour of the day, tho' it may be naturally expected that his Imperial Majesty, finding it impossible to check the progress of the French in Italy, will adopt pacific plans for the preservation of his Milanese territories, now in the power of an invading and victorious enemy.

The Lord Lieutenant has, by Proclamation, taken off the Embargo upon the exportation of Corn, meal, malt, flour, and potatoes, to Great Britain from Ireland, laid upon those articles the 5th of February last.

It is confidently said, in the Paris papers, that it is the order of the Executive Directory, that the French shall not be first to recommence hostilities, on the Rhine; but shall act on the defensive. It is added, that the successes of the Republican arms in Italy are of a nature so decisive, that they ought naturally to force the House of Austria to demand Peace; if it does not wish to lose its territory and influence in Italy.

The Navigation of the Scheldt has been completely restored, and several vessels have arrived at Antwerp.

A letter from a Marine in Barbadoes, to his brother in Birmingham, dated the 12th of April, 1796, says, "I have the pleasure to inform you, that St. Lucie and St. Vincent are retaken from the French, and once more in our possession. We are now under orders for Guadaloupe, and trust my next will acquaint you of the retaking of all the British Islands from the Republicans."

Receifer, May 19. "Our city is now all alive, and the freemen here assume no little consequence, as a great opposition is expected at the ensuing general election. The four following gentlemen intend to offer themselves viz. Admiral Sir Richard King, Bart. and George Bull; Esq. our present members; who are to be opposed by the Hon. Mr. Tuston, brother to the Earl of Thanet, and Mr. Charles Turner; the latter is an auctioneer of this city."

May 17, 1796.—On Monday last the Grand Anniversary of Free and Accepted Masons was held at the Rose Inn in Dartford, which was more numerously attended than on any former occasion.—The procession to church was headed by William Perfect, Esq. Provincial Grand Master, whose hat (in honour of the Grand Master his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales) was decorated with feathers inserted in an enamelled tablet bearing the arms of Kent—and the Lady Masons of Dartford elegantly dressed in purple and white, joining in the train, had a novel and beautiful effect.—An excellent discourse, adequate to the occasion, was preached by the Rev. J. Inwood, Provincial Grand Chaplain, from the 14th chapter of St. Paul's epistle to the Romans and 16th verse, "Let not your Good be evil spoken of—" (which we understand is to be printed at the request of the Society.)—An Oration, of considerable length, was pronounced by the Provincial Grand Master, and received with reiterated bursts of applause.—After which the Fraternity sat down to an elegant dinner, and the afternoon was passed with that harmony and uninterrupted festivity which invariably distinguishes the Meetings of Free and Accepted Masons.—A Ball was given in the evening to the Lady Masons of Dartford, as a token of grateful regard and esteem for the honour they had conferred on the Fraternity, by so kindly joining in their procession.

WEDNESDAY the trial of Rt. T. Croft field, for conspiring with Le Maitre, Higgings and Smith, to shoot his Majesty with a poisoned arrow, came on at the Old Bailey at nine o'clock in the morning; at eleven at night, after some consultation between the judges and jury, the court adjourned to Thursday morning.

Vice Admiral M'Bride was to sail on Wednesday to the North Seas, to relieve Adm. Duncan; he has under his command, besides the *Russel*, of 74 guns, Capt. Larcom, in which his flag is hoisted, the *Robust*, of 74 guns, Capt. Thornborough; *Ramilies*, of 74 guns, Capt. Sir Richard Bickerton; Director, of 64 guns, Capt. Bligh; and Shannon frigate, of 32 guns, Capt. Fraser. The Russian Squadron, of two 64 gun ships, and two frigates of 36 guns each, commanded by Adm. Hanickoff, are to sail under Adm. M'Bride. They have been thoroughly repaired at Chatham and Sheerness, and are in excellent condition—The *Venus* frigate (a capture by the Russians from the Swedes last war) of 40 guns, Capt. Chevalier Bodeske, is esteemed the swiftest sailing frigate in all the North Seas.

From the few letters which have yet been delivered out of those brought by the Leeward Islands mail, it appears, that two men of war, and a private armed ship, had been dispatched from Barbadoes by the Admiral, with forces, to join in an attack upon St. Martin's, which was expected to fall a prize to this expedition.

The Rev. Mr. Peters, well known for his sacred paintings, is inducted into a Prebendal Stall in the Cathedral Church of Lincoln.

Portsmouth, May 10. Arrived the Resolution Cutter, from Adm. Sir John Jervis in the Mediterranean, with dispatches.

We have the pleasure to state, that the Princess Charlotte outward-bound East India ship, which got on shore on Silfea Bill, on Saturday last, was this morning got off, after her guns were taken out, and the water started; but in coming into this Harbour this evening, she struck on the East side of the Channel, and is likely to receive further damage.

Chatham, May 11. Friday sailed from hence to Blackstake the *Parnett Effrasia* Russian ship; same day the Philip Russian ship also, was ordered here to be repaired, the *Cyane* sloop was this day undocked.

Monday the *Peter* was undocked, and on Tuesday the *Parmene* docked to be repaired, same day the *Defiance* was also undocked.

Wednesday failed to Sheerness to lay as a receiving ship, the *Aolus* frigate; the *Bellepoule*, intended for the same service, will also sail this week.

The following ships in commission here are nearly ready for sea, *Montague*, 74 guns, Captain Knight; *Defiance*, 75; *Jones*; *L'Oiseau*, 38; *Stephens*; *Tamer*, 38; *Bayley*; *Clyde*, 38; *Cunningham*; and *Cyane* sloop, 18 guns, Manning.

The *Ville de Paris* is daily expected to be commissioned, and the hands belonging to the Royal Sovereign, it is said, are to be turned over to her.

the same, one was discovered two miles within the rocks and another near Egvo, under French colours; the weather being calm the *Kite* was towed within gun shot of the enemy, who imagined that any hostile act would infringe the neutrality, consequently those advantages were embraced which their defective knowledge of the treaty afforded.

Captain Malbon, of the *Kite*, apprehensive the shot from the guns might injure the inhabitants on shore, prudently determined to board her, and on that service dispatched his first Lieutenant, Mr. Chivers, assisted by two officers of the same rank, with boats, manned and armed. Upon their approach, every disposition for defence was apparently made, but the issue was favourable to the boarders in consequence of number. By the exertions of Captain Malbon, the *Kite* was towed three miles the same night to the other cutters under Dutch colours, lest she might profit by the knowledge of the fate of her ally, and escape before day-light, and the same success attended his efforts. Captain Halsted's remaining object was to take possession of the prizes, which he did; they were found without rudders or sails: the following day all the vessels were at sea.

Dover, May 12. A vessel arrived yesterday from Calais, and another this morning; the latter brought several English and German prisoners. The French have stopped all communication between Calais and Dover; but they will permit passengers to land and embark at Dieppe. It is however supposed this will not be long continued.

Three French frigates and four corvettes sailed by Calais the day before yesterday, took pilots from Calais, and bore away for Dunkirk Roads.

The French papers, down to the 6th inst. are received, containing several accounts of victories obtained by the French armies in Italy. It appears certain the King of Sardinia is in treaty for a Peace with France.

Wednesday the first division of the Essex Foot Cavalry, commanded by Colonel Montague Bergey, marched into this city; the remainder follow this day. They are to be stationed in the Isle of Thanet, and other parts of the coast. They are a fine body of men, and have a truly military appearance.

It is confidently said there will be an encampment upon Barham-Down, and some regiments have been mentioned; but if a general election should take place in the ensuing summer, it will probably make a considerable change in the military arrangement.

A letter has been received at Dover from a young man at Havre, a midshipman belonging to Sir Sydney Smith's vessel, which says they are treated well.

A few days since was married at Wye, by the Rev. Mr. Parsons, Mr. Jesse Tanton, a merchant of Lenham, to Miss Ann Austen, of Wye.

Thursday the 5th inst. died at Ramsgate, whither she had gone for the benefit of her health, the lady of Francis Freeling, etc. Principal Surveyor of the General Post Office. Her memory will long be venerated with affection, and her loss deplored, by a numerous circle of afflicted friends.

Monday the 23rd inst. died in the 74th year of her age, Mrs. Earl, a widow lady, of Maidstone.

It is thought that Mr. Bird and Mr. Jettemes will walk over the course of Coventry without opposition, at the ensuing General Election.

The period of the Dissolution of Parliament was conjectured by the best informed men to be intended for the 13th inst. but it was found impossible to get through the public business so early. Indeed, there are some doubts whether it can be concluded during the present month; and as the encampments take place early in June, some persons suppose the dissolution will not happen till October next, although we believe the period not so distant.

General Election—Tuesday at the Meeting of the Whig Club, Mr. Fox took an opportunity of mentioning, that from a variety of circumstances, a Dissolution of Parliament might certainly be expected before their next meeting on the 7th of June, he therefore earnestly solicited the support of his friends, being informed, that the same gentleman (Mr. Tooke) who had opposed him for Westminster, had resolved to stand another contest.

Early Potatoes—On the 21st ult. James Lindsay, farmer in Bisland, parish of Riccarton, Ayrshire, dug in an open field new potatoes of this year's growth, as large as hen eggs, and planted the ground over again for a second crop.

Mr. Grey's proposed motion to bring forward a charge of IMPEACHMENT against Mr. Pitt was very unexpectedly put off on Wednesday for want of sufficient Members to make a House. We expected one of the longest and most interesting debates we have had for many years past.

A letter from Mr. Budds, his Majesty's Consul at Alicant, dated March 10, 1796, to Mr. Vague, states, "Since writing the circular, an American brig has arrived here in three days from Algiers. The master has reported to the Pratique boat, that the Regency has declared war against the Danes, and had already captured and carried in there seven prizes, laden with brandy, wine, &c. &c. and the cruizers were all at sea."

By letters from Alicant, March 24, we learn, "that six English vessels have been captured by a privateer, and carried into that port, also one Spanish vessel with wines for Yarmouth."

Letters from Leghorn, dated the 2d of April, says, that all the vessels in that harbour have been damaged in a storm, and that six vessels, including an English frigate, have been stranded. The same letters say, that the Bey of Tunis has declared war against the English, on account of the capture of several French vessels in that harbour."

pantaloon, and on changing chaise at the King's head, Hounslow, he requested to go to the privy, where he cut his own throat, but missing one of the arteries, did not effect his purpose.—He then came out, and concealing the fact got into the chaise, and came to town to Mr. Addington's, in Vine-street, where one of the Officers observed his cravat and hand bloody, and immediately found what had happened. Mr. Addington then sent directly for a Surgeon, who sewed up the wound, and he now lies at Carpmel's, in Bow-street, in a fair way of recovery. The whole of the property that he had got with him, out of so large a sum, did not amount to more than 100 guineas. As soon as he recovers, he will undergo an examination at Bow street.

This unfortunate young man belongs to a very respectable family in Ireland, and was nephew to the late Sir Hugh Palliser. Weston left his native country when 18 years of age, on account of having defrauded his father and uncle of several sums of money. As they would not give him any further countenance, he came to London, where he was almost destitute of every necessary; and applied to Mr. Bonus, a countryman of his, who recommended him to Mr. Cowan, of Ely Place, to manage his Army Agency Business. His attention to business was such as soon gained him the confidence of his employer. Mr. Cowan, about two years ago, having occasion to be absent in the country, gave Weston the unlimited order to draw upon his Banker for any sums he might want; to this implicit confidence of his employer, he may date the origin of his ruin; for having no person to overlook or to be a check upon him, he was tempted to hazard a large sum of money at a gambling-house, in Pall-Mall, which he lost; and having gamed away nearly the whole property of his Employer, he was at length induced, by the fatal hope of recovering it, to forge the name of General Tonym, to a Warrant of Attorney, whereby he received upwards of 10,000*l.* at the Bank, which did not uphold his extravagance more than two nights.

This matter lay undiscovered for some time, as he remitted the General's Dividends regularly as they became due; he likewise obtained from his cousin, Mr. Walter, (now Sir Hugh Walter) a large part of the fortunes left him by his uncles, under the idea of laying it out to advantage in the Stocks, all of which was sunk at the gaming-table. This brought him to such a state of desperation, that to obtain more money at any rate—at any risk, he had the audacity to take a woman to the Bank to personate the sister of General Tonym, and in consequence obtained another considerable sum. This he had a favourable opportunity of doing, as he was in the habit of transacting money affairs for that Lady, who met him about two months ago at the Panorama, where she accused him of neglecting her payments; and observed, that she had been under the necessity of writing to her brother at Ipswich, that day to endeavour to enforce her payments; he immediately set off for Ipswich, and arrived at the post office in time next morning to intercept her letter to her brother, which he answered, as from the General, to the Lady's satisfaction. Finding at length that he could hold it out no longer, he set off about four o'clock on Friday for Liverpool, attended by the servant of Mr. Cowan, who accompanied him as far as Finchley Common; when they parted, the servant returned home, and was immediately taken into custody, under the supposition that he was his confidant, as his name was signed as witness to the Warrant of Attorney.

Savoy and Nice; but she required that this cession should not be definitive till the General Peace, and that France should give his Sardinian Majesty compensation and indemnity.

This the French Government would not consent to, and the negotiations were immediately broken off.

On the subject of Peace the Paris Papers mention nothing positive. Some of them report, that the armistice is to be removed; others that it will be immediately terminated. In the mean time the preparations on the Rhine for commencing hostilities are continued with undiminished vigour.

By a vessel arrived at *Harwich*, the account of the *Dutch Fleet* having reached *Bergen*, in *Norway*, is confirmed, the whole object of their cruize being to convoy home their East Indianmen, that have lain in that Port during the Winter. The Master of the above vessel left the Dutch fleet in *Bergen*.

Bath, March 30. "At the Assizes for Somersetshire, before Mr. Baron Perryn and Mr. Justice Buller, four prisoners received sentence of death, viz. William Taylor for killing 22 sheep; Benjamin Govier, for stealing several handkerchiefs, and 4s. in halfpence; Edward Taylor, for killing 22 sheep, and stealing the wool; and Barzilai Hallett, for setting fire to a barn. W. Taylor and Benj. Govier were reprieved.

Doe on Dem, Barry and Love against Brent.

This cause which excited to much general attention and curiosity, came on to be tried before Mr. Justice Buller and a Special Jury on Monday.

It was an ejectment brought for the recovery of the manor of *Hutton* and other considerable estates in this county, which had been devised by the late *Charles Brent Coopey Brent, Esq.* to his widow *Mrs. Brent* the defendant, and whose claim was resisted on account of his supposed weakness of understanding, and undue influence used over him in obtaining his will.

Nearly twenty persons of great respectability were called to show that the late *Mr. Brent*, though a man labouring under deafness and a difficulty of utterance, really possessed a sound and disposing mind, and that the preference shown to his wife was produced by the predilection he bore to her, in consequence of her affectionate conduct towards him from their marriage in 1778 to his death in 1784.

After a vast body of parol and written evidence, and documents of different kinds to this effect had been regularly brought forward, the Counsel for the Plaintiffs, declared with the concurrence of his Clients, that from the general opinions and reports which had been circulated respecting the late *Mr. Brent*, his heirs at law had thought it incumbent on them to call on his widow to support her title under his will; yet as he felt he had not sufficient evidence to repel the strong and uniformly connected testimony which had been so forcibly adduced, he would not proceed so as to widen the breach between the parties, or throw imputations on a person whose conduct and title had been so clearly established.

Mr. Justice Buller then expressed his approbation of the judicious and candid course which the cause had taken: observing that the Plaintiffs, as heirs at law, had a fair right to call upon the Defendant to produce her evidence, and that the whole proceedings on both sides, in a case of such importance and value, had been conducted, so as to do credit to all the parties concerned.—The jury accordingly, to the satisfaction of every crowded Court, found a verdict for the Defendant.

Arrived the *Leander* frigate from the North Seas, and remains with ships as per last; and *Jane More*, for *Tortola*..

Yesterday *Major-General Grenfield* arrived here to take the command of the military in this district for six weeks, in the room of *General Norton*.

In the evening the *Right Hon. the Marquis Cornwallis*, Master-General of the Ordnance, arrived at the *Fountain*; and this morning he will review the *Royal Horse and Foot Artillery*, on his way to survey the batteries at *Dover* and other parts of the coast.

The *Derby* regiment of militia will march from the barracks in this city, in three divisions, (the first division moving to-morrow,) on their route for *East-Bourn* in *Sussex*.

At a General Board of the Governors, held at the *Kent and Canterbury Hospital* on *Tuesday* 30th instant, it appeared that from the institution to that day, 601 in-patients and out-patients had been admitted, 341 of whom have been cured or benefited, and 55 were then remaining under cure.

Suicide.—A few days since a respectable young man, in the neighbourhood of *Tunbridge Wells*, shot himself a few moments after having calmly given some directions to his servants. The cause of this rash action has been thus uncharitably accounted for—he had been married only a few days! *London Packet*.

At the last General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, holden for the Eastern parts of the County of Kent, on the 21th day of January, 1796, a COUNTY RATE was granted. And it was ordered that the specific Sums charged on each Parish, by such Rate, should be advertised, viz.
