M R. **TEMPLE LUTTRELL** observed, on Tuesday last in the House of Commons, that by an order of that House the evidence of the late Court Martial at Portsmouth, with the judgment thereof, had been laid upon the table, and as the trial ordered by the Admiralty Board on Sir Hugh Palliser, was said to be from the criminality deducible from the said evidence, he thought it the duty of the House to see how the charges contained in the notice given to the Vice Admiral corresponded with the same. In order to which he should move in a fuller house "that an humble address be presented to his Majesty, praying that the proper officers might be directed to lay before the House a copy of the charge delivered, with the notice given to Sir Hugh Palliser," and this, he said, he should offer the first opportunity, understanding as he did, that the Court Martial was appointed for Thursday se'nnight the 18th instant.

HOUSE of COMMONS.
Thursday, March 11.

Sir Philip Jennings Clerke moved, "That the Speaker do quit the Chair, in order that a Committee might be formed of the whole House, to consider of the propriety of excluding all members of the House from having by themselves, or agents for them, any contract with government but at a public bidding."

Mr. George Onflow spoke very warmly, though pertinently against the motion. The measure, he insisted upon, it, was fraught with consequences of the worst kind. Should the House resolve to have all contracts disposed of at a public auction, or bidding, it would oblige us to expose the demands, and consequently the concerns and situation of our fleets and armies. This he thought of no little importance. Besides how were we to get responsible people to contract with? At present the First Lord of the Treasury himself was responsible. He, and he alone was answerable for the due performance of every commercial bargain. How cruel, and how ridiculous too, would it be to exclude merchants from the House, who had no other

Several literal amendments were made, and clause A was modified.

The House, after sitting about an hour and a half, rose a little after five o'clock, and adjourned. The bill is of course to be read a third time to-morrow.

HOUSE of COMMONS.

Thursday July 1.

The House, in expectation of receiving the Militia bill with the amendments made, and the clauses introduced into it by the other House, sat till half after four, but the Speaker at length understanding that the bill was not to be returned till to-morrow, the House adjourned before five o'clock.

A letter received a few days ago from a person on board Sir Charles Hardy's fleet, that a frigate that was sent out to look for the French fleet saw them on the 20th inst. in lat. 48. 40, and the next day joined our fleet.

The last dispatches from the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, are of a very serious nature. They contain an account of various meetings of many considerable men in that country, who, after waiting till they were tired, for a relief from the English Parliament, have at last adopted resolutions for themselves, which they intend to propose to the English Government next session. Should they be refused, Ministry may have the same game to play with Ireland, as they have with America.

The Edgar, a fine new ship of 74 guns, which was launched at Woolwich on Wednesday, has already got her lower masts in: She is now carried into dock to have a copper sheathing; and three hundred riggers are put on board to rig her; so that she will be ready soon to go to Long-Reach, when she will take in her guns and sea stores in a month.

The new ship Edgar, launched on Wednesday, is the fourth ship of that name in the British navy. The first was built in King William's reign and being after thirty years service condemned, was broke up in the Medway; the second Edgar was blown up by accident at Spithead about fifty years ago, and all the crew perished. There is at this time a red buoy on her remains, which the seamen term the "bloody boy." The third Edgar was built at Plymouth, but proved so bad a failer, that after only seven years service, she was destined to lay as a break-water at Sheerness; the fourth (the present) under Capt. Elliot, whose behaviour against the noted Thurot last war is well known, bids fair to eclipse all her predecessors.

From the most authentic return to the Admiralty of the number of men the first grand press procured at the different ports, it amounted to 6579.

The apprehensions we lately had of an invasion seem now pretty much subsided, neither the Ministry nor the minority any longer maintain that language, and the general opinion adopted is, that the French are endeavouring by their menaces, and fleet, to keep our naval force at home, while the Spaniards, strengthened considerably by the French, proceed to America, for the purpose of rooting us out from that quarter of the world, and establishing the independency of the colonies.

As the act for laying a duty on post-horses, &c. is to commence on Tuesday next the 6th inst. the following particulars extracted therefrom, being what materially concerns the traveller, are published for general information:

"On and after the 6th day of July, every person going post is to pay the duty of a penny per mile for each horse so hired, to the inn-keeper, post-master, or other person, letting such horses, who, at the same time, is to deliver to him a stamp-office ticket, expressing the number of horses and miles he has paid for, and the day of the month. This ticket is to be left at the first turnpike the traveller comes to, otherwise the turnpike-man must not let him pass till he has paid him eighteen-pence for each horse for such his neglect, which money the turnpike-man may keep for his own use.

"Every person who hires horses by the day, or for less than the day, is to pay the duty of one penny per mile for each horse, to the inn-keeper, post-master, or other person who lets the same, before they are used, provided the distance he is going is declared at the time of hiring; but if the distance is not declared, then he is to pay one shilling for each horse he hires, and is to receive likewise a stamp-office ticket, expressing the number of horses, and having the words "for a day" printed thereon, and is likewise to declare whether he intends to return the same day, in which case the inn-keeper, &c. is to write upon the ticket, "to return;" and if he actually does return before twelve o'clock at night, then such money is to be returned to him by the inn-keeper, post-master and other person, who receive the same.

"MEM.—This ticket for a day is to be shewn at the several turnpikes, but is not to be left at any."
