The Committee members present signed the document
hereby indicating their approval.

A general discussion ensued on three main subjects:

- (a) Is a fighting fund required now that it is known that the Bridge Bloom Rural District Council intend to seek an injunction to control the activities of Great Western Festivals Ltd?
- (b) Should the appeal for funds be launched immediately and if so should the possible contributors be told how much would be required both in total and from individuals?
- (c) How can the Society most effectively publicise its activities and cash requirements?

Resolved:

- (a) The Society's legal representative should be invited to inform the Committee of the necessary procedure.
- (b) Meanwhile the Fighting Fund should be launched immediately, the possible contributors should be informed that the target figure is £15,000 required to cover all foreseeable legal contingencies. They should also be informed that each household target would be £10-00 but that some people would be able to pay more and some less.

The Fighting Fund Committee would accept responsibility for printing a leaflet stating this and would distribute the appeals through the local villages.

- (c) The Fighting Fund Committee would approach Mr Dougall with the object of appointing him the PRO for the Society with the duties of publicising the aims and activities of the Society.

Lord Cornwallis and Sir John Davis should be approached and informed of the opposition to "Pop Festivals" with the object of enlisting their support in opposition.

Canterbury Trades should be invited to support opposition to the Pop Festivals

Consideration should be given to trying to influence British Rail against organising special trains.

Copies of an Anti Pop Festival poster which is designed by a local artist should be available for the Committee's approval.

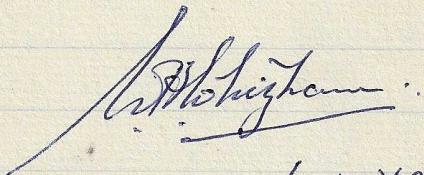
While the Kingston petition has been sent in copy form to the Minister for the Environment, the Bridge petition should be sent to Mr Baker. The Basden petition which is now being finalised should be sent to Mr Baker.

Consideration must be given to the most effective method of using the petitions and the originals must be kept by the Committee.

Mr Fowler informed the Committee that Mrs Palmer, Blean House, Station Road, Canterbury, had kindly promised to distribute publicity pamphlets through newspapers sent out from his place of business.

There being no further business, the Chairman closed the meeting at 9 p.m.

Chairman's opening remarks announced that Mr Goulden had kindly made the offer to attend to give his advice on legal aspects of the situation.

That it was the Chairman's view that Lord Harlech was most probably seeking a way to withdraw from Great Western Festivals Ltd.

That General Woodrow, as a resident very close to Cleethor Park should be encouraged to support opposition to the "Festival" plans.

That the British Rail Executive was to meet on Monday 3rd January to discuss their attitude towards the running of special trains to serve the "Festivals".

That the Bridgeman RDC had resolved to oppose the proposed "Festivals" and had appointed an Executive Committee to act in furthering the Council's actions.

Mr Goulden then outlined the requirements of the "Fighting Fund" in that while the initial financial risks were to be borne by the BBRDC and other bodies who might become involved, subscriptions would still be required.

Since the BBRDC were to seek an injunction against the committing of a public nuisance, it may well be

necessary also to seek an injunction against committing a private nuisance.

Therefore money should be available as an indemnity to the private litigants.

If the BBRDC, for example, became satisfied that they should not proceed because of assurances which might be given by Great Western Festivals Ltd; would these undertakings be satisfactory to the private individuals? Therefore, there should be a parallel proceeding and fund raising should be carried on.

The "target" figures should be £3000 initially up to a total of £15,000.

The private plaintiffs should now consent to proceed with the firm of Fulley Page Fielding & Penbrook and should instruct them to proceed.

If any of the proposed plaintiffs were hesitant the Committee should reassure them.

Speed of action is very necessary because of the probable length of legal procedure.

An injunction is the only sure way of stopping the "festivals" taking place because Planning Matters are so easily extended, perfectly legally, and therefore may be valueless in practice.

The private plaintiffs should ideally number 10 while 8 would be acceptable.

A general discussion ensued.

Mr Whigham offered to contact General Woodrow and a telephone conversation took place between the General and Mr Goulden. General Woodrow felt that since he is in residence only part of the time he is not suited to be a plaintiff. Therefore no further persuasion was thought to be necessary.

The list of private plaintiffs was discussed and the following were considered to be suitable:

Mrs Champion, Mrs Mitchell, Prof. Astley, Mr Baker,

The Kent CC seem to be unaware of the strength

of public feeling about the proposed "Festivals". There will be a meeting of the KCC tomorrow 6th January with the BBRDC, Mr Goudeon, officers from the Canterbury County Council, the Water Companies and the Kent Rivers Authority.

The Eagle Star Insurance Company and six other Insurance Companies are seeking support from the K.C.C. in opposing the "Festival" promotions.

The Parish Councils should raise a rate to assist the Lifting Fund.

The Canterbury Society requests literature from the Society.

The Canterbury Chamber of Trade request 600 sets of literature for distribution among the members.

Members of the Committee expressed the view that the committee should meet frequently to ensure up to date knowledge of the situation and to prepare press statements in time to meet the Newspapers' deadlines.

Further discussion took place on the interviews and film making for the BBC 24 Hours programme. The members involved were reasonably satisfied that they had presented a good case and the programme would prove to be in favour of the protesters rather than the promoters.

Mr Rumsey informed the meeting that he had seen samples of the "Pot" leaflet in the hands of the BBC staff on Saturday morning. He had specifically asked the producer and interviewer not to publicise this leaflet in connection with the Society as we were in no way responsible for it. The interviewees had replied that he could not be concerned with the "minutiae" of the situation. The same request was made to them later in the day and it was felt that the BBC probably would not use that leaflet.

The general view of the Committee was that we could not control the actions of people unconnected with the Society or expect to control the BBC's use of material.

Plans were finalised for the Fund Raising venture in Canterbury as follows:

40 girls from the staff of the Town & County Agency would meet at the County Hotel on Saturday 30th January at 9.30 a.m. Their objective to meet as many of Canterbury's 600 traders as they could in the day. Identity badges would be worn. Subscription forms would be provided and funds sought from the traders. They would report back to the Society's Committee Members at 5.30 p.m.

The cost of the day's operation would be £120.00.

Mr Mason of the County Hotel had offered a room free of charge and would also make a donation.

Wards of Faversham had given the badges at an nominal cost of £1.50.

publicise our efforts as follows:

Students - it is known that the University students are to survey the subject of Pop Festivals among the Students' Union.

Resolved: Prof. Astley will act as liaison to arrange a meeting with Mr Parker, the Vice President of Internal Affairs and representative students and Miss Mitchell, Mr Cobbett, Mr Kirk and Mrs Kirk representing the Society.

It was felt that efforts should be made to obtain support from Christchurch College.

Resolved: Mr W Whigham would discuss this with Dr. Mason, the Principal, to see if a meeting of representatives could be arranged.

It was felt that a similar meeting might be arranged with students from Merton College of Physical Education.

Resolved: The publicity sub committee should investigate the possibility of arranging a meeting.

Parish Meetings - Invitations had been received to speak at Bishopboune and Bridge Parish Meetings on the 2nd February. Timetables and speakers were finally arranged:-

Bishopboune - Mrs Fagg, Mr Baker and Mr Cobbett.

Bridge - Mr Shirley, Mr Whigham, Col Elliott and Mr Rumsey.

Canterbury Society - An invitation to address the Canterbury Society had been accepted. Mr Baker and Mr Rumsey would give a short talk on Friday 28th February.

The Committee raised the question "Would there be adequate publicity in Bridge to draw an audience to the Parish Meeting?"

Mrs Kirk assured the meeting that adequate posters were being prepared and would be posted the next day.

There being no further business, the meeting closed at 9.15 p.m.

Chairman opened the meeting by conveying the information that the Promoters, Great Western Festivals Ltd., had given a legally binding undertaking that "no major "Pop Festival" would be held within 20 miles of Beckenbourne". He commented that this undertaking is as wide reaching in its effect as can be expected, wider than could have been expected to have been achieved by the injunction. Mr Crouch M.P. has informed Mr Whigham that this has been the best mounted effort he has ever heard of in all the country. Chairman thanked all persons who had subscribed to this success.

Mr Goulden informed the meeting that the situation now satisfied the Society as far as the Promoters were concerned and that Charlton Park must now be seen as an unsuitable "Pop Festival" location at any time. However Col. Underwood could, as a private individual, seek to promote similar festivals independently on his own personal interest. Therefore a writ has been served on him in the form of an injunction to restrain from holding or causing to be held Popular or Folk Music Festivals at Charlton Park so as to cause nuisance or damage to Plaintiffs.

Nuisance or damage is as far as our rights go and this refers to the Plaintiffs' premises.

There are still no means to ensure perpetual relief from similar gatherings.

In view of this injunction, Col. Underwood does not appear to offer a threat to establish a permanent "Pop Festival" site. His solicitors have been warned this evening that we mean business and their reply indicated that an undertaking will be forthcoming.

Mr Goulden then advised that if a suitable undertaking were given it should be accepted. An undertaking to restrict numbers attending and nuisance would be as much as we could expect in law.

The alternative of a total ban on Col. Underwood does not seem to be relevant for the limited period of 1972; the Night Assemblies Bill will take over for 1973.

An alternative undertaking by Col. Underwood for all time could not bind the land so would apply only until Col. Underwood left.

Mr Goulden expressed his conclusion that acceptance of a suitable undertaking is the best possible course of action. It is desirable to draw the case to a close quickly and neatly. The undertaking would be binding in law and Col. Underwood would be very foolish to break its conditions.

The Society would remain in being to keep a watchful eye on any future undesirable promotions.

Chairman requested the views of the Committee after making the observation that "we may not hold the funds for any usage other than those covered by the rules, i.e. for supporting litigation, therefore funds are for use only in this case. It is the Chairman's view that the Plaintiffs should instruct the Solicitor to exercise his right to discretion to conclude this case as quickly as is reasonably possible."

A discussion then ensued as noted below:-

Col. Elliott: Considering Col. Underwood's present position, a nuisance can still be committed. However, Col. Underwood has his rights, too. Therefore we should seek the assurance with the terms clearly defined so as not to victimise the Underwoods. If we seek assurances in line with the terms of the Night Assemblies Bill this would be satisfactory.

Are we now on our own without the backing of the BBRDC?

Col. Elliott indicated that he was also speaking on behalf of Mr & Mrs. Nicholls, Mrs. Mitchell, Mr. & Mrs. Champion and Mr. Gold.

Professor Austey :- We are assuming that the High Assemblies Bill will become law - if it does not we must reconsider.

We can not bind Col. Underwood permanently - is it possible that we can restrain him from carrying out works to make festivals possible, e.g. Fort Buildings?

Mr. Goulden :- I have reported to the Local Authorities that it would be proper for them to assist the local residents. This is being considered and BBRDC have replied "In principle we feel it right to make considerable assistance. The Clerk is taking up this question with the District Auditor".

The Kent County Council may go along with Bridge Bleas.

Mr Baker :- If Col. Underwood mortgaged his property would he still be bound?

Mr Goulden :- One cannot impose a restrictive covenant on land unless it were in favour of other land.

Mr Baker :- If Col. Underwood broke his undertaking would we be liable for damages?

Mr Goulden :- If he broke his undertaking we would go for the injunction, no damages liability would be involved.

Mr. & Mrs. Atkin :- We agree with Col. Elliott.

Col. Willows :- The outcome of this cannot be assured, we must have a written undertaking of support from BBRDC before we proceed.

Mr. Goulden :- Up to the time of issue of the Writ no liabilities for legal costs were involved, now any costs are very adequately backed.

Chairman :- The Charlton Park site has been banned - The KCC and BBRDC were fully in support and their backing is

still available. This will be considered by the Executive Council in two days' time.

Mr. Goulden :- Our "kitty" of £5000 in the indemnity fund is available.

Up to the collapse of Great Western Festivals Ltd the charges for legal actions will be met by the BBRDC backed by the K.C.C.

I consider that Col. Underwood most probably will not contest and I will advise his solicitors that this Society will not seek to be vindictive.

Mr Cobbold :- I agree with the principles expressed and advise continuing vigilance.

Mr Baker :- If he held a festival, what would constitute a nuisance?

Mr Goulden :- Interference with the proper enjoyment of one's property. Noise law is not very strong, for example, one night's disturbed sleep can not constitute a nuisance in law.

The breakthrough in stopping this particular festival was in proving the potential danger of water pollution.

The Chairman at this stage appealed for expedition and trust in the lawyers to take the appropriate action.

Mr Goulden repeated his opinion that Col. Underwood will collapse within a week.

Col. Elliott proposed that "We Plaintiffs agree that we proceed with the action and allow Mr. Goulden to use his discretion."

The motion was seconded by Mrs. Fowler and carried unanimously.

Chairman announced that Mr. Pope of Leeves & Naylor has kindly offered to audit the Society's accounts free of charge and this offer is gratefully accepted.

Col. Elliott reported that there is currently £5,500 invested with the Bradford Building Society. It is his opinion

that this fund should be held until early December at which time there should be a complete audit and refund made to contributors. Mr Goulden reported on Great Western Festivals Ltd's claim that libel had been committed. He has replied stating that the pamphlets referred to have been identified as printed on the 14 Dec. i.e. 2 days before Great Western Festivals Ltd were registered and 14 days before the formation of this Society. We gladly undertake not to distribute those pamphlets since we never did in the first place.

Mr Goulden would like to meet the Committee to report on the outcome two weeks from tonight, i.e. 22nd February, unless cancelled.

Mr Kirk requested the general view - should publicity be continued?

Discussion evoked the general opinion that we should bow out gracefully and at the end of the term Mr Goulden could make a public announcement on

- Col. Underwood's undertaking
- The Society's cash situation.

The Chairman explained that the meeting had been called to consider the attitude and possible actions of the Society towards the proposed plans of Brett's to develop gravel pit workings at Beckenbourne. Certain interested local landowners had been invited to state their views.

Mr Aspinwall. The workings would have a disastrous effect on his valuable animals, and the breeding of rare specimens would be at risk. If the scheme was permitted, he would have to transport his whole menagerie elsewhere - a colossal task.

Mr Spencer. The proposal was detrimental to the environment on the grounds of noise, pollution and nuisance value. The gravel beds were deep, and there was a possibility of diversion of existing water sources.

Mr Parrott. Water pollution, and the danger of diminishing spring sources were factors to be considered - also traffic hazards and danger to school children on the narrow roads. In answer to a question by Mr Fowler, Mr Parrott said underground water might be polluted by oil from machinery.

Mr Hayle endorsed the previous remarks. His waterless beds, and business would be threatened.

The Chairman said that local residents were most concerned about the threat to the environment. Possibly the Company

Concerned had adequate reserves of gravel elsewhere.
 Mr J. Purchese. The A2 Longup Bridge, opposed the scheme whole heartedly, mainly on the factors of traffic hazards. Many additional heavy vehicles would be superimposed on an inadequate road system. It was estimated that an additional 40 lorries IN and 40 lorries OUT per day might be involved.

Brig. Slade-Powell. The Ickham, Wingham and District Society would oppose the plan, and would support the Nailbourne. Mr Fagg stated that Bridge Bleas RDC would be discussing this matter on 11 September. Any objections should be lodged by that date.

Mr Harvey, in answer to a question by Mrs Kirk, explained that an objection could be made on any reasonable grounds - in this case, on personal, amenity and the traffic hazard factors.

Mrs Shirley proposed, seconded by Mr Baker, that the Nailbourne Society object to the proposed gravel workings, on the grounds raised by previous speakers. The motion was carried unanimously.

After discussion, it was decided that Mr Harvey should write a letter to Kent, to be signed by the Chairman, and to be handed in to the RDC in good time before the meeting on 11 Sept next.

1. CHAIRMAN'S ADDRESS.

Mr Whigham presented a report on the events leading up to the formation of the Society, and the subsequent progress and success in the campaign to prevent the holding of massive pop. festivals at Charlton Park. (The full text is attached at page 161.).

2. TREASURER'S REPORT ^{from}

Col. ELLIST moved the adoption of the accounts (P. 161.) He reminded the meeting that responsibility for raising, retaining and returning monies had been given to the Finance Subcommittee, one rep. from each of the four parishes most concerned. It had been decided to return 95% of subscriptions over £5.00 to all Life Members, and 95% of subscriptions of £5 or over to those who had decided not to remain with the Society. This high rate of return had been possible (apart from the fact that Kent County Council and BridgeBear RDC had 'shouldered' most of the expenses) because:

(a) Some subscribers had required no return whatsoever.

(b) Only 22 individuals had declined to remain members. Therefore even with this high return percentage, a sum of approx £150.00 was left with the Society. To date the full amount due for return (£3500 approx) had been redistributed, except for a few outstanding cheques.

This exercise would not have been so trouble-free without the help and advice of Mr Michael Pope, who had also audited the accounts, without fee.

The Society owed its gratitude to Mr Pope for this service. Mr Tom Carter proposed the adoption of the accounts. There were no queries. Dr Blatchby seconded the motion which was carried unanimously.

3 ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Chairman. It was proposed by Col Elliott and seconded by Mr Carter that Mr Walter Whigham be reelected as Chairman. (Carried unanimously)

Secretary? Mr Runnery signified his desire to retire due to pressure of other work. After discussion it was proposed by Mr Baker and seconded by Mr Whigham that Col. Elliott be elected to hold both offices until or unless some major operation might arise, which would require extra consideration. (Carried unanimously)

Asst Treasurers. Proposed by Mr Runnery and seconded by Mr Fagg that Messrs Baker, Fowler and Mr Carter be reelected as Asst. treasurers.

Committee. (Carried unanimously)

Col. R. Drake-Brockman, Secretary of the Committee for the Preservation of Rural Kent explained the situation about Amenity Societies. Mr. Elliott proposed, and Mr. Burrows Seconded a motion that measures be taken to affiliate the Society to:

- (b) The Kent Federation of Amenity Societies (£2.50)
- (c) The Civic Trust. (nil)

(Carried unanimously).

 Building Fund and at bank.
3. The gravel business had been initiated on 26 June 73,
 in a letter from Mr A. HARVIE, Solicitor to the Hon Sec, stating

5. A meeting was held at Fawcett Crannington Farm, attended by Col. Elliott, Maurice Spencer, Hayle, Mayo Parrott, Osborne (for Copehill) and Brig. Stedman-Pasell, when the decision of the Finance Sub-committee was explained. Mr Harvey was also present.

To avoid any misunderstanding Mr Harvie sent ^{also} a letter to Mr Harvey on 23 July (copy filed), emphasising the limited nature of the Society's support.

6. The Public Inquiry began on 18 Sept, and with a 'break', lasted some 14 full working days. Mr T. Purchese represented the Society. The Committee thanked Mr Purchese for his conscientious ^{work} and excellent evidence at the Inquiry.

Mr Purchese paid tribute to both the quality and the quantity of Mr Harvey's legal activities both before and during the Inquiry.

7. Mr Foster stated that he had visited Mr Harvey, when it became apparent that the Inquiry's duration would exceed expectations, and confirmed the Society's limited ^{civil service} ~~discretion~~.

7. A final letter from Mr Harvey, dated 29 Oct (filed) was read by the Committee, and discussed.

The Society had been affiliated to the Committee
for the Preservation of Rural Kent, and to the Kent
Federation of Community Societies. After discussion,
PROPOSED by Mr Baker, Seconded by Mr Carter, to discontinue
membership of the KFC and KFAS. Carried unanimously.

It was also decided not to proceed with registration with
the Civic Trust, as to do so would involve the
amendment or cancellation of Rule 23.

ITEM 3. Treasurer's Report.

The period under review covers 15 months, during which there were two major items -

(c) The Wind-up of the Pop Festival accounts, which had involved returning £3496 to various Subscribers. The No 2 acc was closed, after 6 months from issue of last cheque, on 1 May 1973. There was a ^{credit} balance of £28, due to un-presented cheques, which was transferred to General acc.

16. The Beckenham Crayford P.I. Public Inquiry,

held during Sept, Oct 1973 had far exceeded anticipation both in longevity and complexity. The Committee had decided to support Kent CC, and in particular certain local residents (mostly members) who were most concerned with the threat to the environment of the Nailthorpe Valley.

Originally it had been decided to limit expenditure by the Society proper, to £200 plus running costs, paper, printing etc. However due to the extraordinary expense, both in time and office work, incurred by the Solicitor Mr Hawrie (who was representing both local residents and the Society), this sum was increased to £310. As local residents had raised £350, this made a total of £660 paid to solicitor. The £350 passed through General account as a contra entry, and is not shown in the balance sheet.

Both local residents and the Society owe a debt of gratitude to Mr Hawrie, whose personal efforts exceeded the norm in such cases.

ITEM 4 Accounts. Proposed by Mr Foster, Seconded by Mr Purchese, that accounts be adopted. Carried unanimously.

The Hon Treasurer informed the meeting that he had written to those ordinary members whose subscriptions lapsed at the end of 1973. Only 4 had responded, with subscriptions. In fact the running costs of the Society, and costs of printing, stamp & stationery etc had all increased, were dependent on interest from the capital invested in Building Society - at present about £675. It is apparent that if any money should be required to meet the expenses of some campaign in defence of some aspect of the environment, special measures to raise money would be essential. Legal costs etc - say, a Public Inquiry - are way beyond the means of an amateur Society or individual.

As a contribution to expenses, a collecting box had been placed at the back of the hall, a practice usual in other Societies. (Note. Sum raised £2.75).

The Society had contributed £3.50 to Ettam Society, £2.00 to Channel Tunnel opposition comp., and £2.00 to Defenders of Kent.
