


Arthur Swan from Bridge who worked as stable lad at Bifrons, probably 1935/36. Had sisters living in Bridge & Patrixbourne




Uncle Bert, farmer at Brickfileds Farm, with a bull formerly owned by Miss Ramsay


























Another winner for Nailbourne gardeners
















Charles Louis Secondat, Baron de Montesquieu, who was born in 1749 and died at Bridge in 1824.
