

Dear Parishioners of Bridge, Patrixbourne and Bekesbourne.

I propose to begin Confirmation Classes on Thursday evening, the 7th January. The class for the younger people will be at 7 o'clock and that for adults will be at 8 o'clock. Both classes will be at the Vicarage. I do so hope that many who have not yet been confirmed will come to these classes. The date of the Confirmation will be the 8th April 1965. Confirmation is the laying on of hands by the Bishop with prayer. I ask your prayers for those who will be prepared, so that all may share in this preparation.

I am hoping to form a Young Wives Group in the parish of Bridge and Patrixbourne. There will be a meeting at 7.30 p.m. on Wednesday, the 13th January at Bridge School, to discuss the formation and all will be welcome. Do make a real effort to come, and especially do I invite all young wives who have recently come to live in the village.

Once again we begin a New Year with a sense of facing the unknown, with a sure faith that we can leave all things in the loving hands of God. So we pray anew "Thy will be done" in all the varied events and circumstances of our pilgrim way. May I commend for your spiritual use the prayer at the end of this letter.

We now enter the season of the Epiphany. How should we envisage an Epiphany (from a Greek word meaning "Manifestation", and so the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles represented and personified in the Magi) to sophisticated Western civilization? "Nations shall come to the light and Kings to the brightness of thy rising."

There was no Christmas for the first three centuries. Strange though it may seem now, the early Church did not observe the feast of the Nativity; that was a distinctly Western innovation - perhaps to supplant the Mithraic birth of the Sun. True to their genius, the Eastern churches celebrated rather the illumination of the life-giving light which then came into the wood. In the words of the Christmas Gospel "In Him was light and the light was the light of the world." Through him God had brought Christians "out of darkness into his own marvellous light. The darkness is past and the true light now shineth."

# A NEW YEAR PRAYER

O God, the Shepherd of the faithful, who leddest Thine ancient people as with a pillar of cloud by day and of fire by night; be though to us a light in darkness and a shade from the heat of noon. Suffer us not to wander from Thy ways, nor to tarry in the doing of Thy commandments; but so direct and rule us by Thy Spirit that we may abide in Thy love all our days, and finally attain to the inheritance that fadeth not away, in the life of the world to come; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Holy Ghost, ever one God, world without end. Amen.

# ANNUAL QUOTA

At a meeting of the Canterbury Diocesan Conference held on 26th October 1964 a three-yearly Budget was approved. Annual expenditure is estimated at £72,500; this shows an increase of approximately 40% over expenditure for the current year.

East Bridge Deanery (of which this Parish forms a part) has been allocated an annual quota of £2,624. It has been decided that the basis of allocation of the quota within the Deanery will have to be altered. As

a result of this alteration the quota for the Parish of Bridge with Patrixbourne will be increased from £117 to approximately £240 (over 100%).

The P.C.C. held a Special Meeting on 2nd December to consider the position. On our existing income it would seem doubtful whether we shall be able to meet the new quota in full, but it was decided that we should do

our utmost to honour it.

The response to the appeal for additional funds which was made last month has been disappointing. In view of the unexpectedly heavy call upon our resources it is even more important that increased financial support should be forthcoming, and we urge all those parishioners who have the welfare of their Church at heart to give the matter serious consideration.

Dear Parishioners of Bridge, Patrixbourne and Bekesbourne,

Within the next few months we shall be hearing quite a lot about Mutual Responsibility and Interdependence (M.R.I.). Recent developments in Church life throughout the world have faced the Church of England and its dioceses with a number of urgent matters which need effective action. One of the great problems seems to be how to promote and co-ordinate, both within the parishes and dioceses:-

(i) Mutual Responsibility and Interdependence, (ii) The Mission of the Church, which can be

divided into

(a) Evangelism at home

(b) Support for the Church overseas.
(iii) Joint Christian co-operation in practical matters, together with better mutual understanding with other Christians, which would come under the heading of Ecumenical activities. I hope to preach about these subjects at our Churches during Lent.

One of the impressions made by the Toronto Congress in 1963 was an overwhelming sense of the initiative of God and of the Church's need for a transforming renewal. The whole conception of Mutual Responsibility and Interdependence is based on a sense of this need. What we are really asking for is the rebirth of the Anglican Communion. Christian revival, that sense of the Holy Spirit and the Lord's continual presence, comes on the side of obedience to the promptings of the Holy Spirit, in witness and in mission. A mission is an act of sending. So a mission begins by meaning the act of sending and is extended to mean the people sent and the mission with which they are sent. Each Christian has in himself a mission and is a mission. If God's purpose is all-consuming, and we are called to share His purpose, the Christian then has enlisted in urgently important business. This conception of new relationships in mission runs right through the new thought prevailing in the Christian Churches. It is now irrelevant to talk of "giving" and "receiving" Churches. Mission is not only giving to others, but is a sharing and receiving. It is mutual, united obedience to the one God whose mission it is. So we need to examine rigorously the sense in which we use the word "mission" as describing something we do for somebody else.

It would perhaps be apposite if I said something about Ecumenism. The ecumenical

movement is both an idea and an historical fact. The idea in its abstract purity is simple enough; it is an invitation to the churches professing faith in Jesus Christ to come together, in the hope that in some future date they will all be one. The coming together, to hold dialogue is the immediate goal of the idea. The final union is a desired consequence. It is very important to keep these two facets distinct. The final union of the Churches nust be God's work, excercised in His good time. The coming together is man's work, not indeed without God's grace, yet always with a human appeal to man's action founded on divine trust. The rest lies in the hands of God, whose will the ecumenist will accept with faith and obedience.

I was so pleased to be able to welcome the number of Young Wives to our Group. I do hope we shall go on from strength to strength. We would welcome all new arrivals in the village. The Young Wives meet on alternate Wednesdays at 7.30 p.m. at Bridge School. The dates will be found in the Calendar.

# HON. TREASURER'S REPORT

1964 has again proved to be a comparatively favourable year. On the Receipts side Church Collections show a welcome increase of £12, which is nullified by a reduction of £13 in the Free Will Offering income. The Parish Magazine shows a net saving of £35 over the previous year. Special Efforts shows an increase of no less than £65, due chiefly to the successful Christmas Market.

On the Payments side there has been a saving compared with 1963 under all headings, except "Wages and Salaries", which have increased by £40. Donations to Missions and Charities at £107 show a reduction of £21.

As a result of the above increases in Income and reductions in Expenditure we have been able to set aside £300 to the Reserve Fund, and we have finished up with an increase of approximately £50 in the Balance in Hand. Looking into the future, the following considerations must be taken into account:-

In 1964 the cost of running the two churches amounted to only £806, a remarkably low figure.

1. Repairs and Maintenance. In 1964 we had to pay only £27 under this head, an exceptionally low figure. It is anticipated that the repairs which are in progress at Bridge Church will be paid for out of a Capital Fund which should be available, and that it will not fall upon normal income.

2. The Diocesan Quota for 1965 has been set at £239, an increase of £121 over 1964.

3. During 1964 the Parish Magazine was produced at a very low cost; owing to a change in circumstances the cost has already increased considerably and the magazine is bound to show a loss during 1965.

Everything points to the necessity of increasing the subscriptions to the Free Will Offering, which should be our main source of income.



Dear Parishioners of Bridge, Patrixbourne and Bekesbourne,

Throughout Lent I hope we shall look outward on the world-wide mission of the Church, and also to the mission on our doorstep, and inwards to examine our resources and our structure. Mission is the responsibility of the whole Church, even if only some of its members are given the privilege of being in the front line. Of course, by no means all Church members admit or accept this kind of responsibility. That is why so much of our missionary work has been and still is the special concern of voluntary missionary societies, who give it priority. They do this, however, not instead of the Church but on behalf of the Church. "We proclaim Christ Jesus as Lord and ourselves as your servants." In these two phrases we have the live main aspects of mission. In the first we present and interpret the Gospel: in the second we practise and illustrate it.

As it reaches out into the world the Church has two things to offer - a message and a pattern of service. First the message. St. Paul regarded the Christian Gospel as a life-and-death matter, both for the Church and for the world. It was a matter of lifeand-death for the Church to preach it and for all men to hear it. The missionary is the result of the continuous explosion of the gospel. So for the true Christian there is no reluctance about missionary obedience; it is an inner compulsion. Something has happened, so dramatic, so dynamic for our existence, that we must talk about it. In other words, why don't we talk more about our faith and what it means to us? Why are we not missionaries in the dynamic sense of bringing others outside into the inside of the Christian Church?

Secondly, the other main aspect of mission is a pattern of service. All work done in God's name and

inspired by His love is a continuing proclamation of Christ. The one thing that matters is obedience. To this the Church is committed. And if our Christian obedience is to make any impact on this world, secular, religious or pagan, it must be a total obedience of the total Christian community in every congregation. Each one of us must discover our own area of obedience in praying, in giving, in witnessing and in serving. The present is the living thing which the Creator thrusts continually into our hands. Now is the moment to choose God, to do His will. I propose to give a series of sermons throughout Lent on these and kindred subjects. I do hope you will come.







On Sunday, 6th June, we keep the feast of Whit Sunday. It is the birthday of the Holy Catholic Church. The breath of God has come upon it, even the life-giving Spirit of God. It lives, will live to eternity and its members, through this power of the Holy Spirit in progressive ages, have become an exceeding great army.

We note in the Epistle for Whit Sunday the outward signs which attended the coming of the Holy Ghost:

The fire, distributing from the one source, in separate tongues, is the evidence of this one Gift, the same to all, yet divided to every man severally as God wills.

Sunday, the 13th June, is Trinity Sunday, when we affirm our belief in the Holy Trinity in the words of the Athanatian Creed: "and the Catholic Faith is this, that we worship one God in Trinity, and Trinity in Unity". At St. Mary's, Patrixbourne, at Mattins we shall say the Creed of Athanasius in place of the Apostles Creed.

May I say a few words to those newly confirmed in April. I do so hope and pray that you will come regularly to Holy Communion and Divine Service and especially on Whit Sunday, when we are all reminded of the wonderful Gift of the Holy Spirit at our own Confirmation.

I would like to draw your attention to a letter from Mr. Poole who has taken over the direction of the Bridge Youth Club. I appeal to the men of our parish who may be interested in this work, for their help and encouragement.

We are holding the Deanery Missionary Festival at St. Peter's, Bridge, on Wednesday the 16th June at 7.30 p.m. As Rural Dean I ask for your personal support and presence. The Rev. Alban Patola of the Diocese of Nagpur, India, will be the preacher. Afterwards there will be refreshments and a Bring and Buy stall at Bridge Village Hall. I hope as a result a good gift for the work of the Church Overseas will be obtained.

We are looking forward as we go to press to a most enjoyable afternoon at Bekesbourne May Fayre and to our Church Fete at Bridge. May I say thank you to all helpers and to all of you who have given so generously to make these events a success. Full details next month.



#### CHRIST CHURCH COLLEGE, CANTERBURY

We have been asked by the Principal to bring the following to the notice of our parishioners, in case any are able and willing to offer accommodation.

#### CHRIST CHURCH COLLEGE, CANTERBURY (Cont'd.)

The present buildings of this College of Education were completed in July 1964. In addition to a chapel, refectory, assembly hall and teaching rooms, there is study-bedroom accommodation on the site for 225 students, 60 of these for men. The policy of the Department of Education and Science is to provide enough residential blocks for only a proportion of students, so that every resident student must spend one or two years of his college life in a billet.

Christ Church College began in 1962 with a small entry of students. When they leave this July to start their work as teachers they will be replaced by new entry which is more than double their numbers. During the present academic year there have been about 90 students in billets, but for the new session the college will need approximately 70 additional places. Since its establishment the College has been very fortunate indeed in its billet hostesses who have done much to make students feel at home and provided good facilities for them to work in quiet. But more homes are needed. Perhaps you know somebody who could help. Anyone who is interested is asked to write to the Lodgings Officer, Christ Church College, Canterbury, for details of the kind of accommodation wanted and the rate of payments made. The Lodgings Officer will call and talk things over with all prospective hostesses who return a registration card.

August is the great holiday month, so I start by wishing you all a very happy holiday and especially a word to the children: that you will all come back to school in September refreshed and strengthened for your new year's work.

The word "holiday" comes from the words Holy Day. The first holidays were always Holy Days and Saints' Days or special days in our Lord's life. Work stopped to enable all to go to Church to thank and praise God. So let us try to do the same, then we shall enjoy our holidays all the more.

The chief feast of August is that of St. Bartholomew on the 24th. He was one of the twelve Apostles and was always closely connected with Philip.



#### THE SWISS GLASS WINDOWS IN PATRIXBOURNE CHURCH

The oldest and best glass in the church consists of 18 panels of Swiss enamel glass paintings, which were presented to the church by the first Marchioness Conyngham in 1837. Lady Conyngham probably acquired these paintings when making what was called "The Grand Tour", which consisted of visiting the cultural centres of Europe and was the thing to do in fashionable society at the beginning of the 19th century.

There used to be a guide to Patrixbourne Church written in 1930 by the Revd. Knight, Vicar at that time, and he gives a brief description of the windows and says they are Flemish glass paintings.

Later on, however, a full and detailed description was published in 1933 by Mr. N.E. Toke in Archaelogia Cantiana. There are several excellent half-tone illustrations in the text and it is on Mr. Toke's treatise that these notes are based.

The glass is not Flemish but Swiss, the artists mostly coming from Basle, Zurich and Lucerne in north west Switzerland, and many of the coats of arms and badges depicted are those of Swiss families living at the time the windows were painted, which was between 1530 and 1670. They are of a mixed character; some are of Biblical origin and some purely secular, and they are fine specimens of the glass painters' art and have stood up to the ravages of time in a remarkable manner. There are 18 panels in all: ten of them in the lancet windows at the East end of the chancel, and eight are in the South window of the Bifrons Chapel. These last are exposed to full sunlight for most of the day and yet they are in very good condition, for strong sunlight, on account of the ultra-violet ray content, is liable to break down the colours; yet these panels are in excellent shape and there seems to have been little deterioration in the hundred and more years that they have been in position.

A great number of these glass enamel paintings were produced in the 16th and 17th centuries and they commemorated alliances between families, gifts between towns, guilds and corporations, birthday and christening presents and so on. Although most of them originated in Switzerland they were by no means confined to this country, but were common all over the Continent and many found their way to England. The amount of detail in some of the panels in the church is extraordinary, and the visitor who wishes to make a careful study would be well advised to use a pair of good binoculars when examining them.

This enamel glass is not the stained glass we are accustomed to in churches. Stained glass consists of a mosaic of pieces of glass coloured right through, each of which has been cut out of a sheet of "pot metal" - i.e. glass fused and coloured in a crucible. This mosaic of glass is then painted to give indispensable details such as faces, drapery and so on, the whole being held together by strips of lead. Then it is mounted in an iron frame or armature and forms the church windows with which we are familiar.

In enamel glass the subject is painted on to a sheet of plain white glass with a vitreous pigment consisting of finely powdered glass mixed with oxide or other chemical to give the colour, and the painting is then fused into the glass sheet in a kiln or furnace.

At the time that these panels were made, the glass painter's craft was very much of a do-ityourself business. The artist had to grind and
make up his own colours, build his furnaces and in
fact do the whole lot from scratch, except that he
might get some of his raw materials from the local
alchemist. These people, though often charlatans,
knew a great deal more chemistry than we credit them,
for in the intervals of knocking up love philtres
or a choice slow poison for one's rival, they carried
out much practical and valuable research and would
doubtless do quite a good trade in the metallic
oxides and other chemicals required by the artists;
gold and copper for the reds, cobalt for the blues
and silver for the yellow stain.

In order to help him with his work on the windows, Mr. Toke got into touch with a Professor Lindemann, who at that time (probably in the late 1920s) was head of the Swiss National Museum at Zurich, where there is a very fine collection of Swiss enamel glass.

The whole of the consultation seems to have been carried out by voluminous correspondence: Toke does not appear to have visited Zurich nor did Lindemann come to Patrixbourne! Toke, who was an expert photographer, produced photos of the panels and sent them to the Professor, who gave his opinion when he saw the prints, which would have been in black and white only, for the day of colour transparency as we know it now had not yet arrived. What a pity that the two did not meet here, when we would have had a much more authoritative account of these beautiful paintings! However, they managed quite well!



My dear People,

The life of the Church in the world is, like the life of its members, exposed to special trials, temptations and dangers. At one time it is lukewarmness, at another pride and arrogance; at one time encroachment on the part of the State, at another apathy on the part of her rulers; at one time the self-assertion, at another the unfaithfulness of those within the fold.

The strength of the members is the strength of the body; if the members of the Church exhibit a weakened spiritual condition, it is the Church which suffers.

The thought of the 16th Sunday after Trinity is that we ask God to let His continual pity cleanse and defend the Church of which He has made us members. We think perhaps more to-day of the Church in its corporate capacity, and because it cannot continue in safety without His succour we ask Him to preserve it evermore by His help and goodness.

The riches of God's Grace are poured out for the strengthening of the inner life of His people. We seek a fellowship with an eye to the Gospel. Our spirits should ever be tender to the glory of God. Remember always that a solitary Christian is a contradiction of the Church. Saintliness is essential in our Christian character, but saintliness is essentially a corporate function - a fellowship realised together within the context of Holy Church. We as Christians should never be dispirited. The act of God in Christ will never be out of date. In praising God revealed in Jesus Christ we, His Church will keep our spirit whole with His Grace to serve Him in fellowship together.

There is truly a very real Christian emotion that true fellowship within the Church brings: it is the way we feel in fragmentary moments of true spiritual insight, that every human being would have to feel toward each other in the light of God's tender love toward mankind.

St. Luke's Day is on Monday, 18th October. On this day, and on the Sunday preceding (17th October) special prayers will be offered in our churches for all members of the medical profession and nurses and for all who seek to prevent suffering and to care for those who are sick in mind and body. There is a growing desire beginning to be felt in all spheres of the Church's life for a new understanding of our Lord's healing ministry and the implication of it for the lives of those in sickness to-day.

This year United Nations' Day, 24th October, falls on a Sunday and this will be honoured in many Cathedrals and Churches, including our's. I shall preach on this theme at Evensong at St. Peter's Church Bridge. In the twentieth year of its life the United Nations, facing as it does great problems and dangers, needs the prayers and faith of all Christian people.

### THE SWISS ENAMEL GLASS WINDOWS IN PATRIXBOURNE CHURCH

#### The Panels.

Taking the windows in the chancel first, we will begin with the North Lancet, the one on the left when facing the Altar.

#### 1. At the top. The Garden of Gethsamane.

This panel is in beautiful and rich colours. Christ is shown in a purple robe, praying. An angel appears before Him from the clouds bearing a cross and a cup.

### THE SYISS ENAMEL GLASS WINDOWS IN PATRIXBOURNE CHURCH.

Below are three Apostles asleep: the one on the right with a sword is St. Peter: St. John is in the middle and St. James is on the left.

There is an inscription in German which, translated, reads "The laudable city of Lucerne", which presumably was where the artist lived.

The lower part of the panel is filled with heraldic shields, one of which bears the double-headed eagle, the insignia of the Holy Roman Empire.

The painting is unsigned and undated. The borders of white roses and purple squares are pot metal and simply fill in the window space; they are not part of the painting.

#### 2. North Lancet. The Crucifixion.

Mary, the Mother of Our Lord, stands at the right of the cross and St. John is on the left. The woman at the foot of the cross is Mary Magdalene. Also at the top of the panel there is an inscription in German asking for prayers of intercession and forgiveness and for life eternal in the world to come.

Then there are two figures, one on each side, and they are the patron saints of the donors - St. Michael trampling on the Devil, a dragon, and St. Anne with the Infant Christ. The little girl is supposed to represent the Virgin Mary.

Below are the two donors who commissioned the artist. Their names are Michael Bysler and Anna Walcher: he is in black and wears a sword and she is in a long, sweeping black dress, evidently the fashion at that time, for this dress appears again in other panels in the church.

The artist is Peter Bock of Altdorf and the date 1589. This is the only painting in the chancel windows which is signed by the artist. These artists in glass painting took in pupils and apprentices and formed "schools" in much the same way as did the Old Masters such as Rubens and Canaletto.



### THE SWISS ENAMEL GLASS WINDOWS IN PATRIXBOURNE CHURCH

#### Central Lancet

Top. Knight in Armour, and below, an Angel together with a bugle and other devices, forming a crest or coat of arms.

The figure in armour is in characteristic attitude, feet astride and hand on hip defying all comers, and appears several times in these panels. In some cases the knights carry standards and were probably military leaders in Switzerland of considerable influence and importance.

The name of this one, according to Toke, who no doubt had it from Professor Lindemann, is Jacob Witte, but apart from this there is no information about Herr Witte. The date is 1579 and there is no artist's signature.

#### 2. Central Lancet - Roman Soldier.

He is a splendid figure in fine risch armour and wears the crimson cloak of a Roman general and carries a shield on which is the word "Victoria". Toke notes that this is a fragment of a larger painting representing an allegory of war, which is not altogether suitable for a central window immediately behind the Altar cross! It should change places with the crucifixion panel next to it in the North lancet. However, this would mean disturbing the panels, which are not of the same size, and remaking the window, so it might be best to leave it where it is. Unsigned and no date.

#### 3. Central Lancet.

The artist was evidently given a great deal to get into a small space and the result is somewhat crowded and confused.

At the top are two small pictures, the one on the left shows the Annunciation and the one on the right the Adoration of the Magi. On each side and standing in front of pillars are, on the left, an angel and on the right the Virgin Mary, holding a cup and a palm branch. There is a long inscription in German to the effect that when Christ was born in Bethlehem three chosen kings brought the offerings.

The names of the donors are at the foot of the panel and the date is 1589. The painting is attributed to Peter Bock of Altdorf, who was responsible for the Crucifixion panel in the North Lancet.

#### 4. Central Lancet.

Again, as with the painting above this one, there are two small insets at the top of the panel. Top left shows the Crucifixion with the implements and symbols of the Passion - the hammer and nails and so on, and on the right is another little picture of the Annunciation.

The two central figures represent St. John on the left and St. Elizabeth of Hungary on the right. She holds a loaf and a pitcher of water.

St. John bears a chalice from which a snake issues. There is a legend that an attempt was made to poison the saint but the poison rose up in the form of a serpent when he began to drink from the cup. There is no date or signature to the painting.

#### \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

The pictures in the central lancet are surrounded by a striped and blue border of pot metal glass to provide a setting for the Swiss panels, but it does not make a good background as it is confusing and detracts from the beauty of the pictures.



Dear People,

First may I ask for your loyal support of the Bridge and Patrixbourne Churches Christmas Market, which will be on Saturday, 11th December, from 3 o'clock in the afternoon until 5.30 p.m. I do hope you will make a real effort to come. Gifts and donations for the various stalls will be most gratefully received by the stall holders.

I am hoping to begin Confirmation classes early in January and I am preparing a list of those who would like to be presented for Confirmation, which I hope will be at the end of March. Will those who would like to join the classes let me know as soon as possible. I would also like to have an adult class, and if there are any of you who in the past have thought along these lines, perhaps they would care to come and see me at the Vicarage to talk it over.

Once again in our lifetime we are approaching the joyous season of Christmas-tide. God Incarnate and the correlative of the great mystery, man in God, are the main points of the teaching of the Christmas season. By the operation of the Holy Ghost the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity, born of a pure Virgin, became the Son of Man. We have to learn the reality of both natures in Christ; the human and the divine. He was "equal with God": this and nothing else. God of God; Very God of Very God - as we say in the Nicene Creed. This is what he claimed, and what the Church teaches.

And yet He "was made flesh and dwelt among us".
Listen to these words when the Gospel is read at the Holy Communion Service on Christmas Day. He "was made man".
He took upon Himself not merely one man's nature, but took our nature, and the nature of all humanity, of all races and kindreds, and of all ages and times. As His God-head is real, so was His manhood.

So Faith, illumined by the Holy Ghost, bows in humble adoration before the manger at Bethlehem in which we behold the mystery of God made Man.

Christmas proclaims "a great and mighty wonder". It recalls the birth "in that poor lowly stable with the oxen standing by", but it declares that this was "a wondrous birth". This Child came into history rather than out of it. The collect, epistle and gospel for Christmas and the best known hymns, like "Hark, the Herald Angels sing" are uncompromisingly theological. "Veiled in flesh the God-head see, Hail the Incarnate Deity". Meditate on this as you sing these words this Christmas. They set forth the great credal affirmation that He who was born at Bethlehem was one "who for us men and for our salvation came down from heaven and was made man".

My family join with me in wishing you and your families a holy and happy Christmas.

#### CHURCH DECORATING AT CHRISTMAS
